Glenn and Snead Receive Promotions at Bronte Bank





School Census Set In Local District

All children living in Bronte School District will be enumerated by Census trustees during January, as required by state law.

Enumeration began Jan. 3 and will continue through Jan. 31, 1956. Children to be enumerated will be between the ages of 6-18 with children required to be 6 years of age on or before Sept. 1, 1956 and not over 18 on or before Sept. 1, 1956

Children between those ages should be listed even though they may be married and may or may not be in school at Bronte. Children must not be enumerated who were born on or before Sept. 1, 1938 or after Sept. 1, 1950.

of some of the structures remains to be done. Cost of the bridges was \$49,215. Money was provided for the building of them when property owners of precinct two voted 291 to 19 on a \$160,000 bond issue last December. Money to pave streets in Bronte was also derived from the issue.

In addition to the six new bridges which were constructed by Cage Bros. of San Antonio, employees of the precinct have built two new concrete bridges and moved three steel structures to new locations.

Commissioner Brock said that the precinct has about \$1,900 of the bond money left, which will be sufficient to complete the fill work which remains to be done.

Three of the new bridges which were contracted are on the Kickapoo Creeks on the old Union-Ft. Chadbourne road. Another is near Olga on Brush Creek, while the other two are located west of Blackwell in the extreme north part of the precinct. One is on Boosier Creek and the other is on Antelope Creek.

The two new bridges built by the county are located in the Hayrick vicinity, one near Carroll Robbins' place and the other near J. W. Labenske's home.

It was very interesting to me and I think that you would enjoy some of the facts bers took part. Sandwiches, potato sbout one. First they have to wash chips, cookies and cold drinks out the wash pots for the musmer and heat up the grum (kater) irons and also drag out the weskits, caps, and aprons for the biggest day of of the year.

They say that the American version of the Smorgasbord is not genuine but theirs is the real thing. The recipes of more than 50 dishes that they serve are handed down from mother to "datter" as they say for generations.

They say that some of the recipes are not easy to prepare. For instance the "krum kater" is a rich pastry as most all the Norwelgian pastries are, and are baked in something like a waffle iron and then rolled into a tube shape on something like a drum stick.

Here are the ingredients for the crum kater, a cup of cream, cup of sugar, 2 eggs and a teaspoon of vanilla and a wood stove. They say that they don't come out nice and crisp from a gas stove. This smorgasbord started out nany years ago to be a church supper to raise money for the Ladies Aid Society of their Lutheran Church. People all over Central Texas heard about it and began to buy tickets. 400 is their limit and they say they are grabbed up within two days after they go on sale.
