Red Cross Drive Begins in County

Coke County Chapter of the American Red Cross began its annual fund drive Thursday, March 1. The local drive is part of the 75th anniversary drive which is taking place all over the nation. Quota for Coke County is \$1150.

In a meeting of officers and directors at the Methodist Church in Bronte Tuesday night, all present officers and directors for the county chapter were re-elected for another year. They include: H. A. Springer, county chairman; Claude Word of Bronte and S. R. Young of Robert Lee, fund drive co-chairmen; H. O. Whitt, home service officer; J. B. Mackey, disaster chairman; Mary Ann Roane, secretary; B. D. Snead, treasurer; Mrs. John R. Harris, chapter nurse; Ben Oglesby, publicity chairman; Bob Knierim, L. T. Youngblood, Frank Keeney, all of Bronte, Gerald C. Allen, Freeman Clark and T. A. Richardson, all of Robert Lee, directors.

Fund chairman Claude Word announced Wednesday that he has lined up the following workers for Bronte; Rev. W. C. Craig, Mrs. Bill Luckett, Mr. and Mrs. I. C. Oden, Mrs. John R. Harris, Mrs. T. F. Sims, Jr., and Mrs. J. D.

Smith. He also announced that Mary Roane will accept donations at First National Bank and Matthew Caperton will sign up members at Caperton Chevrolet Co.

County Chairman H. A. Springer announced Thursday at noon that \$72.50 had already been collected for the Red Cross here.

Mr. Word said that more workers are needed and anyone who will help with the drive is urged to contact H. A. Springer.

In the Tuesday meeting James Hamilton, field representative of Sweetwater, told of some of the activities of Red Cross during the past year. He emphasized the many disasters which have occurred over the country and said that more Red Cross money has been expended this year on disaster victims than has been the case in a long time. Mr. Hamilton was stationed on the West Coast during the floods in northern California and told of some of his experiences in administering Red Cross relief to flood victims.

He pointed out that Red Cross quotas are slightly higher than last year, due to the great number of disasters in which Red Cross has been called in to help. Quota for the entire nation has been set at \$87,375,000.

Local Lions' Club will have Ladies Night Tuesday of next week, March 6. The program begins with supper at the School cafeteria at 7:00 o'clock. Program Planned Here in Observance of Public School Week; Everybody Is Invited

Public School Week will be observed all over the State of Texas next week, March 5 thru 10. The date was officially designated the first week in March in 1951 by the Governor of Texas and has become an outstanding annual event, with interest growing each of the last five years.

Purpose of public school week is to familiarize patrons with the operation of the schools and for patrons to become better acquainted with school administrators and teachers.

Local school superintendent Garland Black said that people are welcome to visit school any and all times but he particularly urges the patrons to visit during Public School Week. Visits to the school, said Mr. Black, are the only way patrons can get first hand information on how the school operates and what the public schools are teaching their children.

Goodfellow AF Band

First program given in connection with Public School Week will be given Monday afternoon, March 5, when the public is invited to a program of music by the Goodfellow Aarm Band from San Angelo. The program will be in the new auditorium at 2:15 p. m. and will consist mostly of popular numbers. The Goodfellow Band is making the appearance free of charge, in honor of Public School Week.

Parents "Back to School"

The "Parents Back to School" program, which proved popular last year, will begin at 7:30 p. m. Thursday, March 8, when parents and patrons will meet in the new auditorium to receive instructions concerning the various classes they may attend. A sample days schedule of classes will take place with 15 minutes allowed for each class. Teachers will be in their rooms to conduct the classes and answer parents questions.

Students will not participate giving parents a chance to visit any classes they choose.

Immediately following a social hour will be held in the new cafeteria.

It will be the first opportunity for many parents to see the new auditorium and cafeteria.

Supt. Black said that formal dedication will be held at a later date, since some items of equipment still have not arrived.

Holiday Next Friday

School officials have decided to dismiss local schools next Friday, March 9, for the annual Fat Stock Show and rodeo at San Angelo. Friday is Youth Day and school children will be admitted free. Rodeo prices will be reduced to half price. Schools in San Angelo and Tom Green County are also being dismissed on Friday.

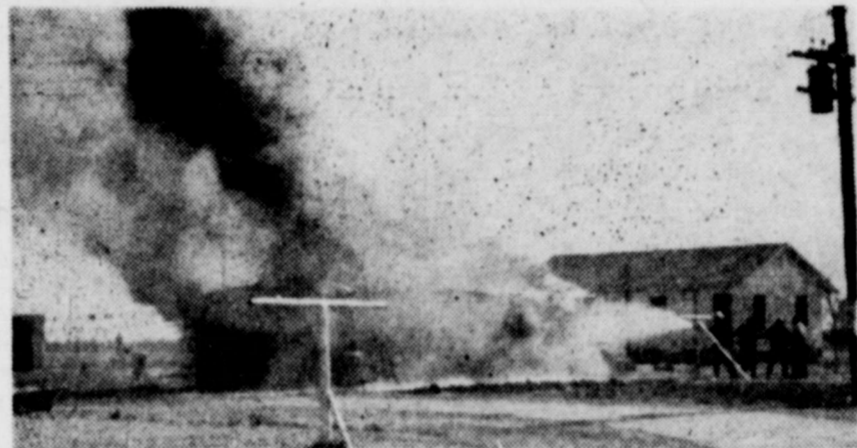
Engineer Makes Preliminary Check Of Park Site Here

Garage at Humble Camp Destroyed Wednesday by Fire

A double garage and its contents was destroyed by fire shortly after noon Wednesday in the Bronte Humble Camp. The garage belonged to Bill Clark of Bronte and W. C. Gardner of Breckenridge. At the time, however, contents of the garage belonged to Clark and to Mr. and Mrs. Benny Knight, who are renting from Gardner.

The fire started in the roof and was first seen by Mrs. Knight as they were eating lunch. The cause of the fire is thought to have been faulty wiring. A sheet iron structure, the flames were fanned by strong southerly winds and it was sometime before the Bronte Fire Department could bring the blaze under control.

Completely destroyed by the fire was Clark's car, which was not insured. Men arriving at the scene attempted to get the car out, but it was in gear and Clark had the keys with him. He was away working at the time. The Clarks also had an air conditioner and some clothes stored in the garage.

The Knights lost a deep freeze and its contents, their summer clothes which were stored there, and a tool chest. Both of the families lost numerous smaller items.

It was not known whether the garage itself was insured. Fire Chief Bill Thomas said the estimated damage was \$1600.

15 Percent of Coke Autos Have New Inspection Tags

Deputy Sheriff Frank Keese announced Tuesday the Department of Public Safety has notified him that only 15 per cent of Coke County cars and trucks have new inspection stickers. The department men emphasized that the deadline for having new stickers on all cars is April 15.

Caperton Chevrolet Co. and the Bronte Motor Co. and Home Motor Co. are official inspection stations in Bronte. Ivey Motor Co. and Vaughan Chevrolet are inspection stations in Robert Lee.

Operators of Bronte Inspection stations expressed the hope this week that local residents would not all wait until the last minute to have their cars inspected. To do so will not only work a hardship on them, but it is likely to inconvenience auto owners, as well.

Mr. Keese said that cars and trucks are supposed to be inspected and bear a sticker before 1956 license tags will be issued to them.

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Vaughan Named Chairman For Refugee Relief

Appointment of Robert Vaughan, Robert Lee Chevrolet dealer, as representative on the Governor's Committee for Refugee Relief Program has been announced by John H. Winters, Committee chairman. Mr. Vaughan will act on behalf of the State Committee in Coke County.

The Committee was appointed by Governor Allan Shivers at the request of President Eisenhower to inform the people of Texas on the Refugee Relief Program.

Under the Refugee Relief Act of 1953, 214,000 displaced persons were declared admissible to this country. Recent figures show slightly over 43,000 have obtained sponsors and have migrated to the United States.

Of this number it is estimated that less than 500 have been brought to Texas.

To be successful in helping displaced persons get a new start in life, the Refugee Program will need assurances from 30,000 to 40,000 sponsors by early in 1956.

A sponsor is required to give assurance that the refugee will be provided with employment and housing and will not become a public charge.

The refugee's qualifications to fill the job provided him are certified by overseas officials. The Governors' Committee noted that a large percentage of the refugees are classified as agricultural workers who could be absorbed easily

in the farming and ranching regions of Texas. Many skilled craftsmen are also looking for new homes in America.

"These refugees have escaped, in many instances, from prisons and concentration camps to wind up spending years in refugee camps waiting for resettlement," said Mr. Winters. "Texas is lagging in doing its part in this humanitarian program to which our nation has committed itself. Mr. Vaughan, as representative of the Governor's Committee for Refugee Relief Program in Coke County, will give the details of the Program to any employer or citizen interested in providing a new opportunity to a refugee."

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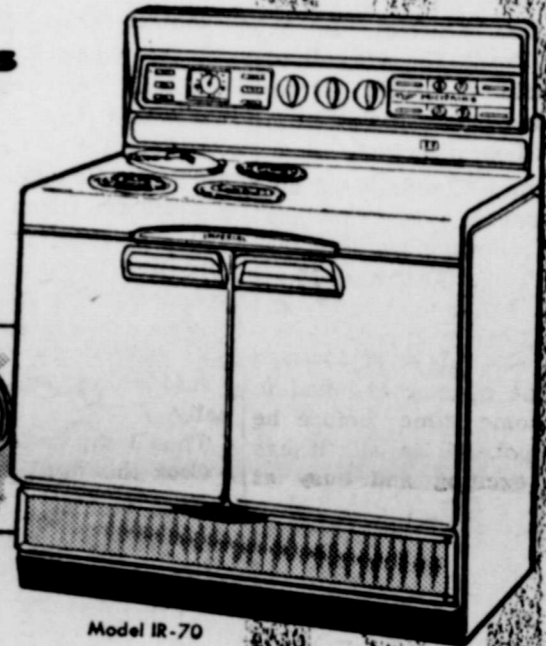

I heard the other day that Mrs. Matthew Caperton had this good recipe, so of course I got real busy trying to get it. It is called egg nog custard. She says that it is such a good dessert to make several days before you are expecting to have company, as it keeps nicely in the refrigerator.

Egg Nog Custard

2 egg yolks
Add ½ cup sugar to these gradually
Then 1 cup sweet milk
Cook this until a thin custard
Remove from fire and add
1 envelope of Knox gelatin that has been dissolved in ¼ cup cold water
Set aside to cool
When cold fold in 2 egg whites stiffly beaten
Last, fold in 1 cup cream, whipped and 1 tsp. vanilla extract
Pour this custard into an oblong pyrex dish that the bottom has been lined with a graham cracker crust.
Prepare that crust in the following manner:
14 graham crackers, rolled fine
3 tablespoons brown sugar
3 tablespoons butter (melted)
Work all this mixture and line the pan. Set this in a refrigerator until ready to use.

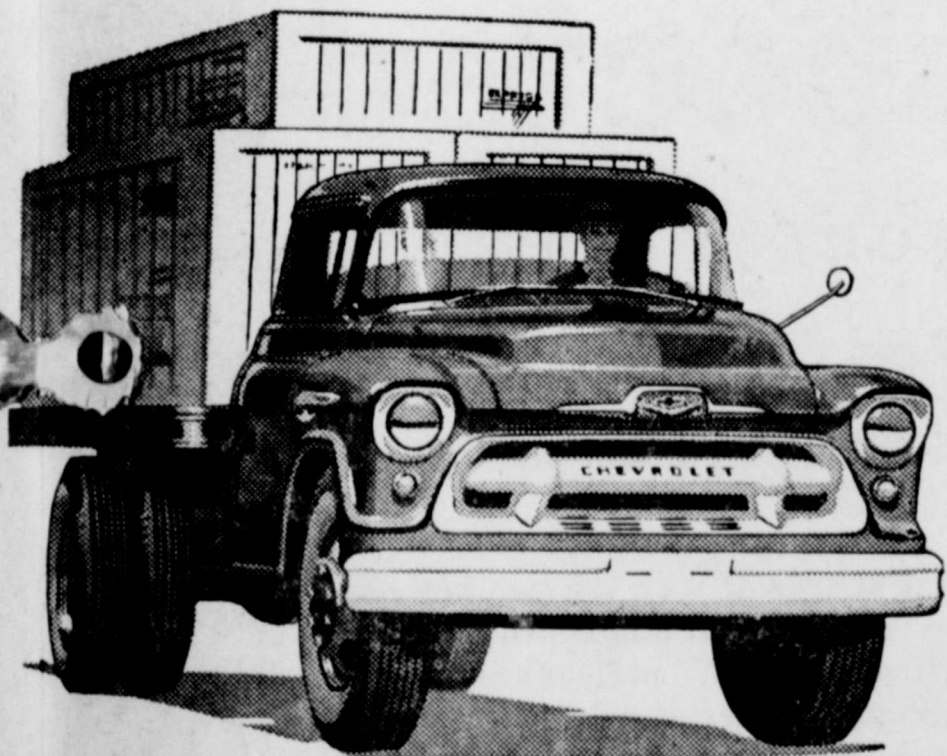

SCS NEWS

Construction work was completed on 4½ miles of field terraces and ½ miles of diversion terraces on the W. L. Taylor farm located at the Juniper Schoolhouse. The diversion terraces pick up the runoff water from pastureland above the field and carry it to a safe spill area, thus protecting terraces in the field.

The system is part of his plan as district cooperater with the SCD.

Technicians of the SCS designed, layed out and checked the terracing and the ASC County Committee made payment on establishment of the practices.

L. E. Smith and Son became district cooperators last week on a section north of Lometa school, that they recently purchased. They plan to construct terraces on the field, construct a not wire diversion, as well as range management, deferred grazing and seed ing and farming on the contour.

Terrace lines were run on C. E. Arrott's and L. E. Smith's ranches this week. They both plan to begin construction soon.

Level borders were layed out on 22 acres of land for Clark Glenn last week. This irrigation system is being organized to make more efficient use of irrigation water, less labor, and do a better job of conservation irrigation.

District cooperators should begin now to plan to shape their livestock to get ready for a 3 or 5 month deferred grazing period on part or all of their rangeland, according to A. V. Sheppard, range conservationist.

ASC Committee will make payment on rangeland deferred for 3 to 5 months during the growing season. Earliest starting date is April 1, 1956. A landowner may begin his five month deferment anytime between April 1 and June 15 Sheppard said.

for this precinct, said this week that he believes the projects can be financed on a county-wide basis very easily, with no increase in taxes. In fact, Brock said Sun and Humble oil companies, two of the largest taxpayers in Coke County have already approached the court in regard to a tax cut. According to Brock, the cut will likely have to be given unless the commissioners can show good reason why they need the money which is presently being paid by these companies.

Judge Jeff Dean said recently that he feels that using a small part of Coke County's huge tax receipts for a park and recreation fund would not be out of line, as most counties already have provisions made for such expenditures.

All the officials with whom your reporter has talked are of the

opinion that the projects for both Bronte and Robert Lee can be built with no increase in taxes, and that tax money is going to be lost unless it is spent for something which will benefit residents of the county.
