Drain fruit from juices and if not 2 cups, add enough water to make the amount. Heat and pour over jello. Stir until dissolved and then add the Cokes, fruit and

If you do not prefer the Cokes, they may be omitted and add 2 more cups of liquid.

This recipe may also be cut down to 1 pkg. jello and add small cans of fruit. A variation to this is to add one pkg. of Philadelphia Cream Cheese to the recipe.






