Whenever, in the opinion of the Sheriff and or his alternates, tor-nadic conditions prevail and that there is a potential danger to all or a part of the County but nothing specific sighted he will declare an "Initial Alert" and the Dim-

an imminent threat. It should mean however that each individual, should take the normal precau-tions of preceeding without panic and undue haste to their prear-ranged location of safety. Should there be sighted an im-minent threat then the Sheriff and or his alternates will sound a "Series of Blasts" on the Dim-mit Fire Alarm System and in-formation by telephone and by mobile radio units will be sent out to all possible danger areas in the county.







SAFETY RULES "DO NOT PANIC"

ITS THAT TIME AGAIN!

To know what to do when a warning is received may mean the difference between life and death for your family!

WHAT TO DO: 1.

Each family should have a definite pre-arranged plan of what to do and where to go should an emergency arise.

11. PROTECTIVE MEASURES:

There is only one universal protection against tornadoes—caves. and underground excavations. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept clean, free from water, gas and debris and preferably equipped with a pick and shovel.

111. IF YOU ARE IN OPEN COUNTRY:
1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually travel, about 25 to 40 miles per hour and generally in a path no wider than 2 and 2 the block.

- 2 or 3 city blocks.
 2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or hole.
- 1V. IF IN A CITY OR TOWN:
 - Seek inside shelter, preferably in a steel reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!
 In homes: The southwest corner of the lowest floor or in the base-ment offers greatest safety. People living in brick or stome houses should seek other shelter, preferably in a storm cellar or the base-ment of a frame house. If time permits, electricity and fuel lines should be shut off. Windows on the north and east of the house may also be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
- V. IF IN SCHOOLS:

In city areas: Especially if school building is of good steel reinforced construction, stay inside,away from windows, remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMSE 2. In rural districts—remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch-if storm shelter is not available.

V1. IF IN FACTORIES AND INDUSTRIAL PLANTS:

On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for shutting off electricity circuits and fuel lines if the tornado approaches the plant. Workers should be moved to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

V11. DON'T PANIC:

Keep calm! It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slim. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected affected.

V111. KEEP INFORMED:

KEEP INFORMED: Keep tuned to your radio station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.



The picture shows one of the hazards of clean seed-hed pre-paration. Crop residues should be kept on the surface of the ground. Research data shows that any form of crop residues is more effective in reducing run-off and soil loss by erosion when kept on the surface of the ground than when turned under. The data also indicated that leaving the crop residues on the surface is more effective way of building up the organic matter content of improving the aggregation and of maintaining a high infilation rate of the soil than turning it under.


