

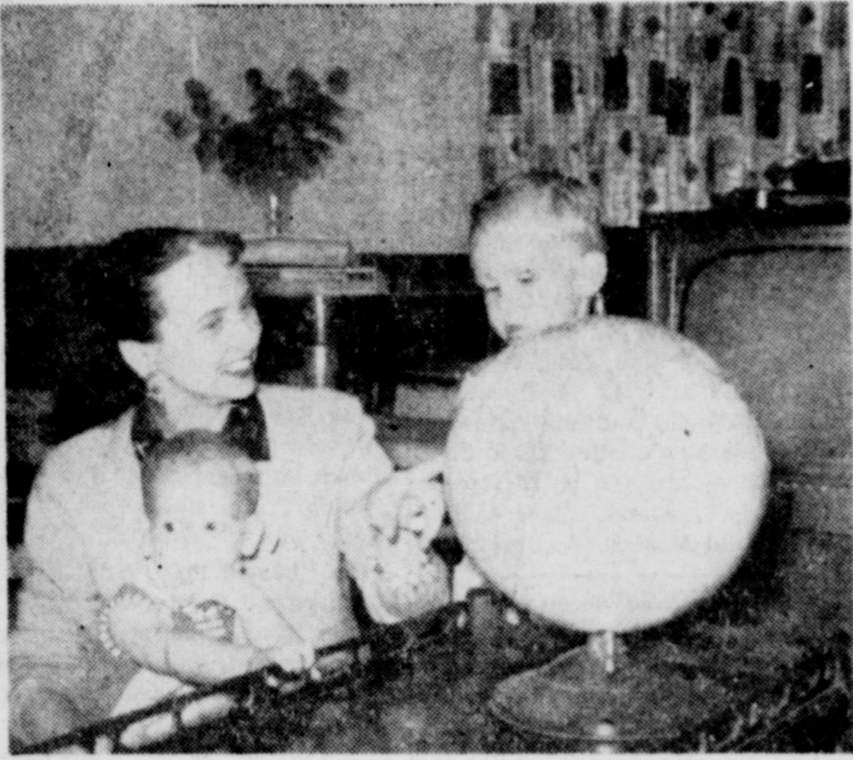

Mrs. W. E. Stewart and Little Sons Leave for 3 Years' Stay in Germany



THAT'S WHERE DADDY IS—Mrs. W. E. Stewart is pointing out Germany on the globe to her two sons, Scott and Bill, showing them where their father, Capt. W. E. Stewart is stationed. Mrs. Stewart and the boys left Monday for New York City, where they will spend a few days before going to Germany to join Captain Stewart. Son Bill looks pretty interested in the whole thing, but Scott, whom Mrs. Stewart is holding, doesn't seem to care particularly whether he goes to Germany or Timbuktu.

Mrs. W. E. Stewart and her two young sons, Bill and Scott, left San Angelo Monday by Continental Airline on the first leg of a long journey, one they have looked forward to for a long time. They are going to Frankfurt, Germany, to make their home for the next three years where Captain Stewart is stationed for a tour of duty with the Air Force. He is officer in charge of flying training and sets up the school for the squadron. They fly the B-50s. Mrs. Stewart and boys were on a one stop flight to New York. They went by Eastern Airlines after they got to Houston. They left San Angelo at 6:30 a. m. Monday and arrived at Idlewild Air Base in New York at 3:30 p.m. She will visit with a cousin and

family in New York until March 30th and then Uncle Sam will fly the family straight to Germany.

Her experience with flying has always been when she was alone and she said that take offs and landings always make her a little "woozy" but she always remedies the situation by laying her head on the back of the seat for a few minutes. But she wondered this time how she was going to get the chance to recover while caring for the boys, age 1 and 2. She recently purchased leather harnesses for the lads since she knew she couldn't carry them both and tend to the luggage etc., for their entire trip.

This is the first trip to a European country for the Stewarts and they are quite thrilled over it. Her husband has written that the climate there is quite different from ours. He said snow has been on the ground since he arrived the first of February and that the temperature has not gone above freezing since he has been there. So she feels that their winter clothes are going to be in use for some time yet. In fact she hoped the blizzard would be gone in New York by Monday.

Capt. Stewart took the family station wagon with him to New York as he went for transportation overseas. According to his latest letter, it had not arrived in Germany. The government sends the autos by ship, at the rate of 900 a month, and there were 1,000 cars ahead of his in February. They hope it arrives by the time the family does.

They are looking forward to a busy three years and they feel that it will be the experience of a lifetime. They want to see as much of Europe as possible during the three years.

"It's a long way from home and friends and relatives, but we feel that it is a wonderful opportunity for our family and we are looking forward to it" Mrs. Stewart said.

Before coming here, the Stewarts were stationed in El Paso. She and the boys have spent the past two months in the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. S. Whatley.

Bronte City Voting Set for Tuesday

Bronte's annual city election will be held Tuesday, April 3. Vacancies exist in the office of mayor and three of the aldermen. Only four candidates have filed for the four positions.

Mayor Ernest Ivey has filed his name for re-election, as have Aldermen Charlie Boecking, and Ben Oglesby. The other incumbent, Alderman Joe George Wilkins, is not seeking re-election. Candidate for his place on the council is Bill Thomas.

The election will be held at the city hall in Bronte, with D. K. Glenn serving as election judge.

The entire city council urged that everyone vote in the election, despite the fact that there are only four candidates running for the four positions. Mayor Ivey said, "We all hope everybody will vote, as we would like to know how the people feel about the way the city's business is being conducted."

Five Candidates On Ballot for School Trustee

Another candidate's name has been filed for school trustee, according to Supt. Garland Black. Mrs. J. M. Rippetoe's name was filed the first of the week. This brings the number of candidates for the two vacancies to five. Other candidates are Foy L. Moore, Hurlin Lee, Edward Cumbe and A. S. Whatley.

Moore is presently serving on the school board. The other vacancy is for the place occupied by M. D. Stephenson, whose term is also expiring this year. Stephenson has moved from the school district and is not seeking re-election.

The school trustee election will be held Saturday, April 7. Two boxes will be set up for voting. One will be at Bronte city hall and the other will be at the Tom Green store at Tennyson. D. K. Glenn will be presiding judge, with Mrs. Otis Smith serving as judge of the Bronte box and Tom Green judge for the Tennyson box.

Other members of the Bronte school board, whose terms have not expired, are Osmo Black, Marvin Corley, J. B. Mackey, Jacob B. Morrow and T. F. Sims, Jr.

Park Bond Voting Is Next Saturday

Public Meeting To Be Held to Talk About Park Bonds

A public meeting has been announced to discuss the park and recreation program bond vote. The meeting will be held Tuesday, April 4, at 2:30 p.m. at the Bronte Methodist Church. Members of the Bronte Home Demonstration Club are sponsoring the meeting as a public service.

County Auditor Weldon Fikes will be on hand to discuss the financial angles of the project, and he will also be ready to answer questions which those present may care to ask.

Mrs. H. A. Springer, president of the ladies HD club, said members of the club decided sponsoring the meeting would work in nicely with a study they are now making on "Family Living." It was the opinion of a majority of the ladies that the park and recreation project will do much to improve family living and family relationships in Coke County. Mrs. Springer said HD clubs are supposed to take no part in politics, but that they considered this as a club project to provide wholesome recreational facilities for the youth of the county.

The ladies said that anyone who is interested in learning the facts about whether or not Coke County can afford such a program is invited. Mr. Fikes, they said, as county auditor, is in a position to be well acquainted with the financial situation in this county.

Mr. Fikes was also scheduled to make another talk at Bronte last night (Thursday) to members of the Coke County Farm Bureau. The organization was scheduled to meet at Bronte School.

JUNIOR CLASS PLAY

The Junior Class of the Bronte High School presented the play "Here Comes Charlie" last Tuesday night in the new school auditorium. Oscar Dorsey coached the play and said that he wanted to compliment the cast for their good performance. Proceeds were \$120, and will be used for their senior trip next year.

Voters of Coke County will decide next Saturday, April 7, if residents of the county are to have parks and swimming pools at Bronte and Robert Lee. The \$130,000 bond vote comes up on that day.

Plans call for \$65,000 to be spent at each of the Coke County towns. Approximately \$28,000 would be spent on the swimming pools and the remainder would be used for park beautification, picnic facilities and other improvements which residents of the two communities desire.

If the bond issue carries, it will be retired with money from the permanent improvement fund, commonly known as the courthouse and jail fund. State law permits commissioners courts to set aside five cents out of this fund to be used for park and recreation. Coke County has never had such a fund.

Robert Lee backers of the bond plan to build their improvements on land now occupied by the livestock show barn. Bronte's park is to be located east of town below the site of the old city lake.

An advertisement in this issue of The Enterprise sets forth some of the features of the program. More information of this project will be carried in next week's paper.

The boxes were auctioned off in Chinese style by George Newby of Ballinger Newby not only was auctioneer but put the crowd on a good show by his humorous acting. After all the boxes were sold, the food was placed on a table pot luck style and everyone enjoyed a family style meal.

Mr. Springer along with county fund chairman, Claude Word wishes to extend their thanks to everyone who took part in making this supper a success.

If you don't have something new to wear, that should not keep you from church this Sunday or any other Sunday. We all seem to have taken the real meaning out of Easter. It is all good to have something new to wear but the thing that we must always remember was that 2,000 years ago we did have something new given to us and that was life eternal. So let's all stay in keeping with this wonderful day. Give all the little children an Easter egg hunt and go to church on Sunday and be thankful for this day.

I know that you all expected me to say something about the daughter and her little boys leaving us this week. It has been awfully quiet and I might say "lonesome" too. It is hard to put your family on a plane knowing that you will not see them for 3 long years. I do realize that it is a real opportunity and I wanted them to have this wonderful experience in Germany.

I have been real busy this week with all the finger prints to be washed from the chairs and the woodwork. There was a tinge of yellow from eggs and a sticky feeling from candy and what have you and it has not been easy to get it all off. They sometimes upset you by their noise making, but who doesn't get upset once in a while these days. It was a happy two months for us.

I am going to give you a different recipe this week than I have ever run. With the cupboards being bare the past few years of preserves due to the freezes that we have had every spring, I am going to give you this apricot preserve recipe that is made with dried apricots and pineapple. This is very simple and makes 2 quarts of preserves.

Apricot Preserves

1 pkg. of dried apricots (cooked until very tender)
When well done mash and add 5 cups of sugar
1 No. 2 can of crushed pineapple
Cook this mixture slowly for 20 minutes. Pour into well sterilized jars.
Serve with plenty of hot biscuits and butter, as I know that your family will like this.

\$500 TO \$10000 GROUP GROWING

The number of families making \$5,000 to \$10,000 increased 80% in the past five years, according to the Kiplinger Washington Letter. In 1950, there were 8.7 million such families, just 19% of all families. In 1955, there were 15.7 million families in this income group, and they represent 32% of all families. Correspondingly, the number of low-income families is shrinking. Families with incomes of less than five thousand dollars have decreased by 5.2 million, a drop of 15 per cent. There is still poverty, but it is diminishing progressively.

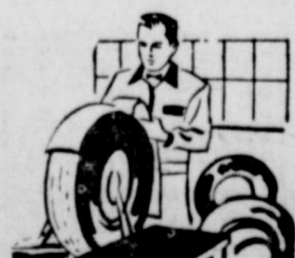

COUNTY QUOTA SET AT \$500 TO FIGHT CANCER

Geared to the slogan, "Fight Cancer with a Checkup and a Check," the American Cancer Society's 1956 Crusade will open in Coke County Monday, April 2.

The Crusade has a dual objective of saving many more lives through education and service and of helping carry on the unceasing fight to conquer cancer through medical research.

A. J. Kirkpatrick, county campaign chairman, announced today that Coke County's Crusade quota is \$500, that being the local share of the \$26 million national goal.

The money will be used throughout the nation for a greatly expanded research program to find new cures for and discover the causes of cancer; intensified public education to double the number of those cured through early detection and prompt treatment; and to provide additional service for cancer patients.

Mr. Kirkpatrick said that 40 cents of every dollar raised here will help support the ACS national program. Sixty cents of every dollar goes to local and state-wide programs of education and service.

A highly important feature of the program is to provide educational materials to teach the public to watch for Cancer's Seven Danger Signals and stress the value of periodic physical checkups in saving lives from it.

"More funds are vitally needed to broaden the scope of the research attack on cancer," Mr. Kirkpatrick pointed out. "This is true because of the continued rise of the all-over cancer death rate in this country. About 236,900 Americans died of that disease in 1954 and about 245,000 in 1955.

"Yet there are encouraging developments in the national fight against cancer. Approximately 80,000 patients were saved from it last year because they had treatment early enough, and some 400,000 persons are alive today in the United States because they have been cured of cancer. Some 10,000 women are being saved each year who would have died if so afflicted 10 years ago."

PETITION

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF COKE, ss
TO THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF COKE COUNTY, TEXAS:

We, the undersigned, legally qualified, resident, property tax-paying voters of Coke County, Texas, respectfully pray your Honorable Body to order an election in said County for the purpose of submitting the following proposition to the resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

PARK and POOL BOND VOTE

Various rumors and misunderstandings have been circulating concerning the park bond election. In an effort to get the record straight, some of these matters are discussed briefly below:

It has been said that the park and swimming pool will revert to the cities of Bronte and Robert Lee after they are built and that the towns will be responsible for their upkeep. Such is not the case. Neither Bronte, nor Robert Lee, can afford to spend much on a recreation program, as the two towns have no income from oil taxes. The plan calls for Coke County, which has a taxing valuation of \$30 million (half as much as Tom Green County), to provide funds for the upkeep and operation of the projects. Of course, money derived from the operation of the swimming pools and concession stands, will probably pay most of the expense, but the county is to pay the balance. State law provides that a county can set aside

five cents out of its tax dollar to provide for recreational facilities of its citizens. Bond authorities say it will take 3½ cents to retire the \$130,000 bond, leaving another 1½ cents for use in upkeep, and further building.

Another bone of contention with some voters in the county is that the parks would go to rack and ruin if not properly supervised. Plans already drawn up call for the construction of a caretakers house on the premises. The home would be occupied 12 months out of the year, assuring that good care would be taken of the equipment and other facilities. His salary would be provided by the concession stand or from county money.

Some folks have said that \$65,000 is too much money to spend for a swimming pool. That is absolutely correct, but it is not planned to spend \$65,000 for a swimming pool. The swimming pool, bath houses, concession stand, ce-

ment walks, cyclone fence around the pool, and all the equipment necessary for the operation of the pool, are estimated to cost approximately \$28,000. The remainder of the money is to be spent for other recreational facilities. The Robert Lee folks are planning to move their softball field with part of their money. Bronte planners hope to spend about \$10,000 on beautifying the park, constructing picnic tables, water fountains, tennis courts and other facilities that non-swimmers can use. Even after this amount is spent, it would leave about \$27,000 which could be used for construction of a community center, ball field, or anything else the people want. Backers of the project by no means plan to spend \$65,000 for a swimming pool. That would build a mighty fancy place to swim.

It was heard Wednesday morning in Bronte that someone asked, "If Coke County has so much

money, why can't it help out the Bronte and Robert Lee schools?" Supt. Garland Black was contacted on this matter and he said that so far as he knew, it would be strictly illegal for Coke County to give money to either of the independent school districts, both of which are independent taxing agencies.

Coke County is in a position now to provide these facilities for its young people and other citizens. The money to finance them is on hand or assured in the future. Persons who doubt Coke County can afford these facilities are invited to contact County Judge Jeff Dean or County Auditor Weldon Fikes, both of whom are familiar with the financial condition of the county. As explained below, Mr. Fikes will be in Bronte next Tuesday at an open meeting. Go to it and ask him about it. We can have these things, or if we prefer, we can give the oil companies a tax cut. After all, they pay 90 percent of the taxes in Coke County.
