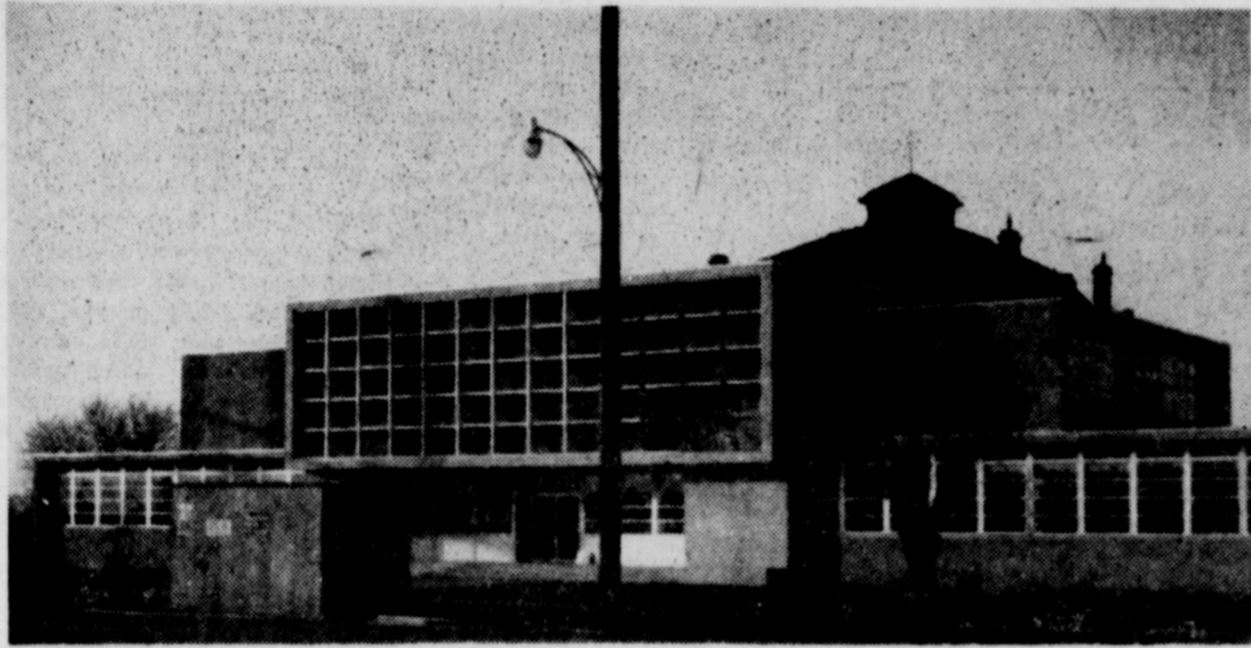

Trustee Run-off To Be Held May 5

A run-off election has been set for May 5 by the Bronte school board as a result of a tie for second place in the trustee election held Saturday. A. S. Whatley and Hurlen Lee both received 171 votes, leaving one of the places undecided. Edward Cumbie was

high man and will occupy one of the two vacant seats on the board. The other candidate, Foy L. Moore, received 83 votes.

A record turn out in the school election saw 266 votes cast in the Bronte box and 79 in the Tennyson box, making a total of 345 ballots cast.

D. K. Glenn has been named election judge for the coming run-off. He will select his assistants. As in the election last Saturday, voting boxes will be set up at Bronte and Tennyson. W. T. Green will be judge of the Tennyson box.

Cumbie has already taken the oath of office and is now serving on the board. Other board members are J. B. Mackey, Osmo Black, T. F. Sims, Jr., Marvin Corley and Jacob Bruce Morrow.

Family of Local Woman Killed In Car Wreck

Mrs. Paul Clark received word last Saturday of the death of her year-old twig sons, Jimmy Don and Billy Don Henshaw. The boys were killed in an auto accident which also took the lives of Mrs. Clark's foster parents, Mr. and Mrs. Don J. Henshaw, residents of 414 S. Walnut, Abilene.

The Henshaws were on vacation and had gone to Houston. They were enroute to the home of Mr. Henshaw's sister's home, 3½ miles from Houston. Their car apparently skidded on a gravel road, overturned and caught fire. The wreckage was not found for several days.

Funeral services for the four were held Saturday in Houston. Mrs. Clark was unable to attend as she was admitted to the local hospital suffering from shock, after receiving the news of the deaths. Burial was in Sam Houston cemetery.

Car Inspection Deadline April 15

Deadline for having new inspection stickers on cars and trucks is April 15. According to authorities, there are still lots of cars in Coke County not having the new stickers.

A survey made Wednesday afternoon of the cars parked on Main street in Bronte showed 29 cars with new stickers and nine without them. These figures show approximately 76 percent of the vehicles here have been inspected. Inspection stations in Bronte are Home Motor Co., Bronte Motor Co. and Caperton Chevrolet Co.

Park Bond Carries by 66 Votes

A majority of voters passed the park bond in Coke County at an election last Saturday. The count was 489 for the bond and 423 against it. Passage of the measure authorizes Coke County Commissioners' Court to issue \$130,000 worth of bonds for the purpose of constructing park facilities and a swimming pool at Bronte and Robert Lee. Each town is to receive \$65,000 of the money for their portion of the project.

No definite decision has been made as to how the money will be spent, except that swimming pools will be built in each of the two towns. Tentative plans have also been made to construct picnic

tables, barbecue pits, tennis courts and other recreational facilities. In addition to the construction, plans are to spend part of the money for grass, trees, etc., to make the parks attractive and pleasant for the users. Backers of the project at Bronte have been insistent on having a caretaker's house constructed with part of the funds.

No definite plans have been announced by the commissioners as to how the parks will be handled. There has been some discussion, however, about naming a park board from the various parts of the county, to work out details of construction and handle problems which may arise concerning operation of the projects.

Longhorns Take Easy Victory at District Meet

The Bronte Longhorns took an easy victory Saturday when they ran away with most of the honors at the District 126-B track meet held here. The Longhorns won first places in all but two of the 14 events.

The Longhorns, coached by Oscar Dorsey amassed 84½ points. Robert Lee was second with 29, followed by Christoval 13½, Wall 10, Norton 6, Miles 5, Water Valley 3, and Mertzon 3.

Wall took the junior high division with 39 5/6 points. Robert Lee was second with 18 1/3, Mertzon 13, and Bronte 4 5/6.

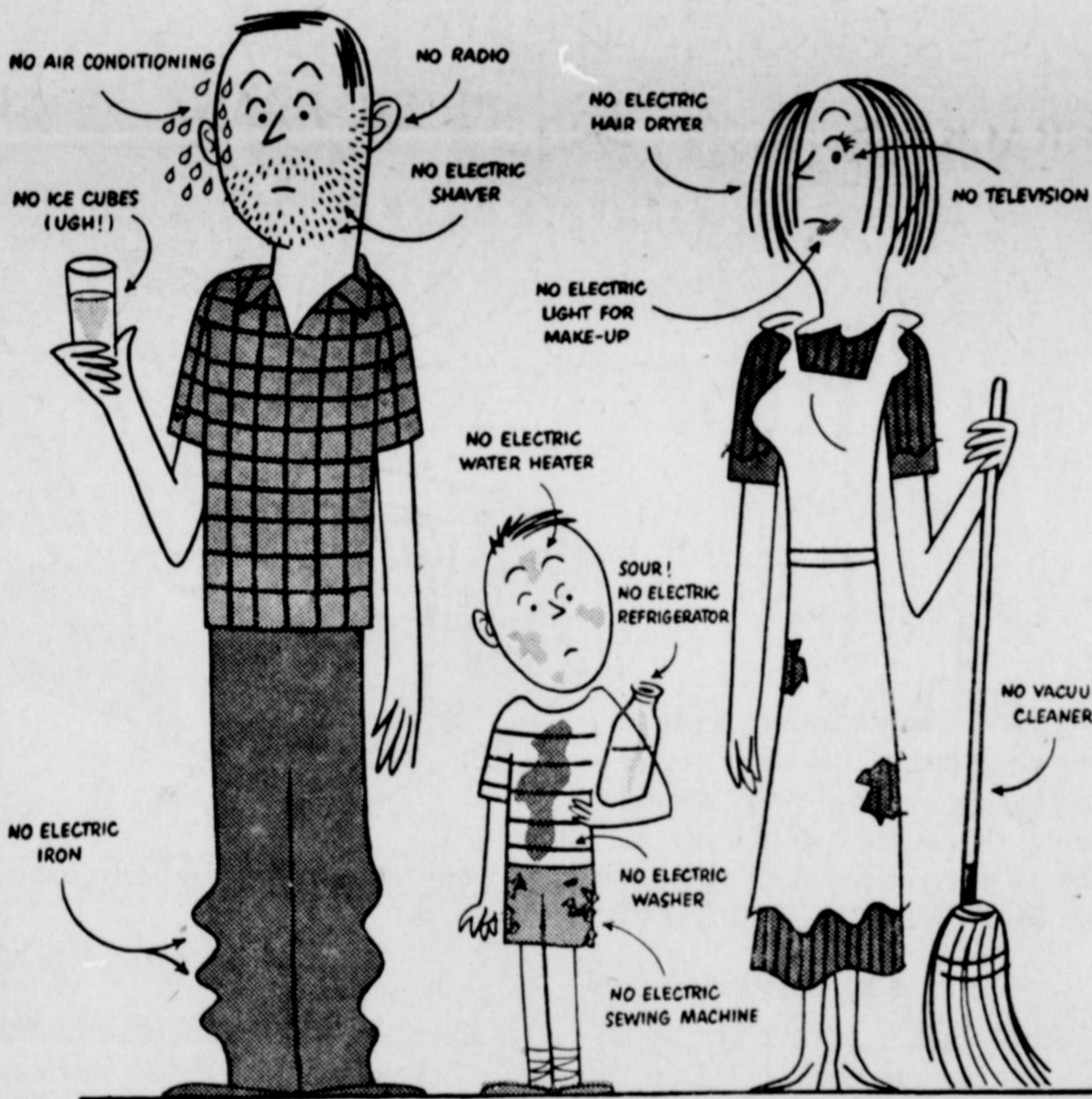

Commissioners Discuss Many County Projects

Coke County Commissioners Court was in session Monday when votes were canvassed on the \$130,000 bond issue for new county-owned parks. Officials result was a majority of 66 votes in favor of the bonds.

Commissioners will study the matter further before making definite decisions on how the parks will be handled. It is likely they will set up boards to assist them in constructing and operating the park and swimming pool projects at Bronte and Robert Lee.

Bids will be taken until April 23 for tearing down the old court house, and commissioners have called a special meeting for that date.

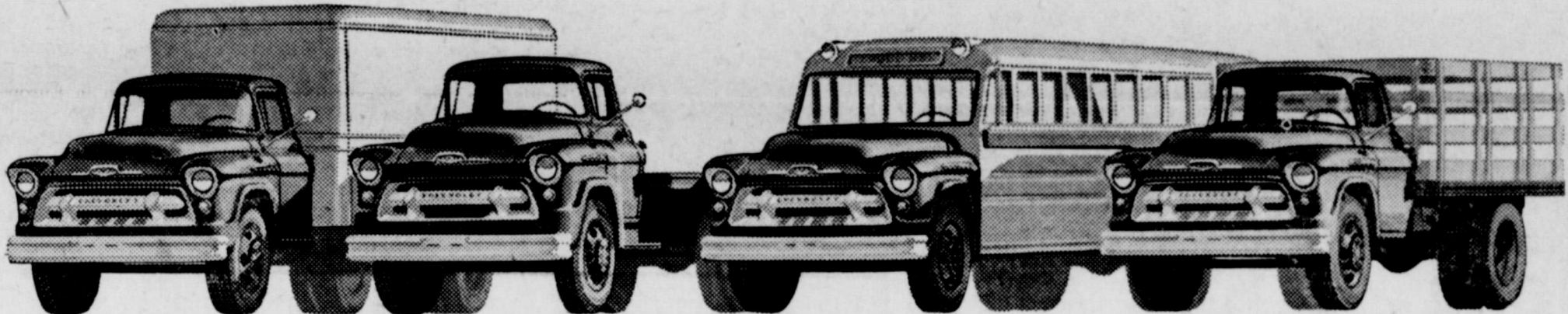

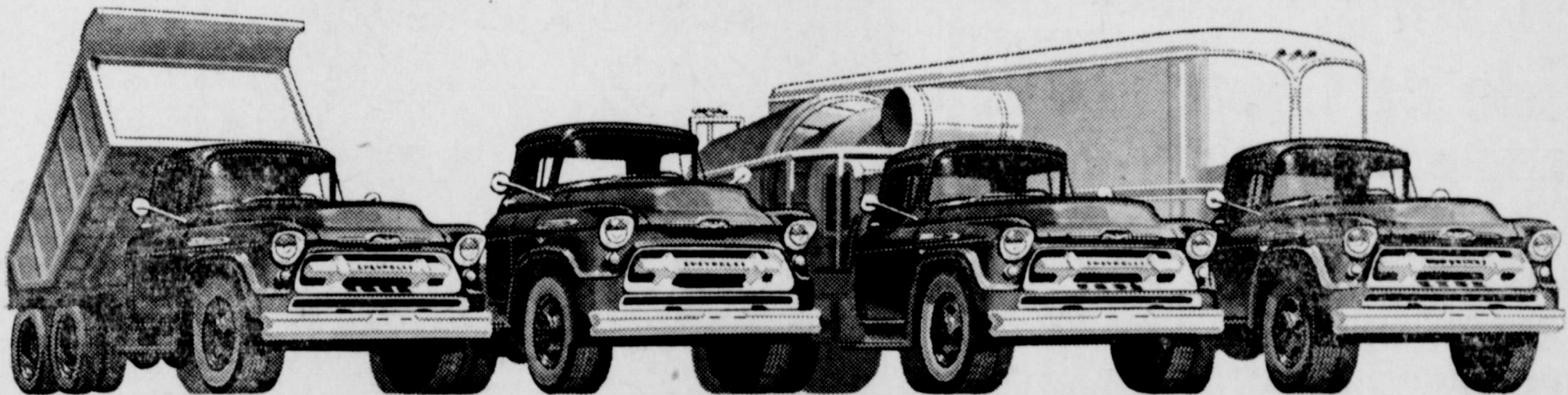
