Dust storms don't generally
make one think of gardening,
but planting time is just about
here. There are a few people who
make a nice profit from their gar-
dens. Aubrey Denman and Osear
Kresta are typical examples of
this type of gardening. Both have
a water supply that is strong
enough to justify their efforts. A
good many others practically feed
themselves throughout the year on
vegetables raised during the
spring and summer.
Bob White, who lives at Black-
well, and M. A. Cox of Robert Lee
are just two who raise very fine
gardens each year. Both families
freeze the surplus vegetables and
eat from their gardens 12 months
out of the year. I counted 17 dif-
ferent vegetables in the White gar-
den one day last year.
It was undeniable proof that gar-
dens could be raised even in a
drought. I doubt that there is a
more productive piece of land in
the county than the White garden.
