The convention convened May 30 and will last until June 2. Dr. Billy Graham, well known evangelist was scheduled to speak Wednesday night on "America for Christ;" and Dr. T. F. Adams, president of the Baptist World Alliance, will be another outstanding speaker of the convention.

Rev. Brown will speak in the First Baptist Church of Meade, Kans., Sunday, June 3.

Al Brown, minister of the Bronte Church of Christ, resigned last week, after deciding to attend Abilene Christian College in Abilene. Mr. Brown will fill the pulpit for the last time Sunday.

Owen Cosgrove has been named to fill the vacancy. He and Mrs. Cosgrove will come here from Stratford, where he has been the Church of Christ minister for the past several months. They will not move to Bronte until the latter part of June, as he will be busy in a meeting until that time. Mrs. Cosgrove is the former Martha Richardson of Robert Lee.

Mr. and Mrs. Brown came from San Angelo to Bronte last July, when he accepted the minister's position here, following the resignation of Bill Pugh. Mr. Brown said he regretted leaving Bronte but the opportunity for furthering his education could not be turned down.

## Rev. W. C. Craig Returned Here As Methodist Pastor

Rev. W. C. Craig was returned to Bronte as pastor of the Methodist Church when appointments were read last Sunday at annual conference in San Antonio.

This will be Rev. Craig's third year here. He and Mrs. Craig moved here in 1954 from San Juan, in the Rio Grande Valley.

Other appointments of interest in this area include the district superintendent, Rev. L. Eugene Harris, who was returned to San Angelo; Rev. Alvin R. Mauldin, former pastor here, was returned to Mertzon; Rev. D. W. Gossett was returned to Blackwell; and Rev. Travis McNair will serve another year as pastor at Robert Lee.

Rev. J. E. Fuller was returned to Stockdale. He was pastor here before Rev. Craig.

Managers of the three firms asked the cooperation of their customers in observing the new closing hour. It will go into effect tomorrow, June 2.

Linda Lasswell was high girl in the senior class with an average of 95.6 and Leslie Dean Caperton was high senior boy with an average of 91. Both of these students received scholarships at graduation exercises last week.

Because of her high average Miss Hageman will receive special recognition by having her name engraved on a plaque furnished by the Bronte Lions Club. The plaque will be placed in the trophy case at school. Names of other high students will be engraved on the plaque in future years.

## Local Boy Scouts Go to Camp June 17 to 24

Scout master Oscar Dorsey announced this week that Boy Scouts from Bronte will attend summer camp at Camp Fawcett this year from June 17 through 24.

Troop 52 of Bronte will leave here from the school building Sunday, June 17, at 9:15 a. m. by school bus. Luther McCutchen will accompany the boys.

In addition to Mr. McCutchen the following Bronte men will attend camp on dates indicated: J. W. Teague, June 17; H. A. Spring-

Mix together:

 2 tsps. salt  
 2 cups hot water  
 Cool to luke warm and add:  
 2 yeast cakes dissolved in 1/4 cup lukewarm water  
 Add 7 or 8 cups flour  
 Make into rolls. Let rise 1 1/2 or 2 hours. Bake. This dough may be stored in refrigerator if you do not wish to cook all at once.

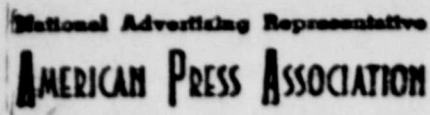

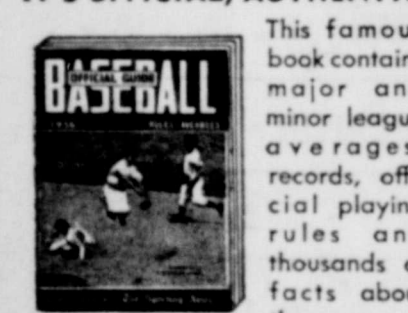
