Louis Bridges Sells Flock of Prize-Winning Rambouillets

Louis Bridges has disposed of his flock of registered Rambouillet sheep and plans to go back to Texas A&M this fall where he will finish requirements for his bachelor's degree.

Biggest part of the sheep were sold to Edwin S. Mayer, Jr. of Bluffdale. He bought 130 ewes, 77 lambs and 24 rams. Six remaining head were sold at the San Angelo Rambouillet Sale last Saturday.

The Bridges sheep have become well known and sought after in this area during the past several years. Louis Bridges and his father, the late B. F. Bridges, carried off many blue ribbons and

others prizes at shows all over this part of the country with their fine animals. Years of selective breeding developed their line of Rambouillets into the best in West Texas.

The Bridges ranch is located south of Bronte, and borders the south bank of the Colorado River. Louis plans to defer the ranch for awhile in hopes that it will grow some grass. No plans have been made to sell or lease out the place. When asked if he would re-stock it when he finishes up at A&M, he said he didn't think so for awhile, because he didn't believe the grass would be sufficiently recovered by that time.

Louis lacks only a small amount of work having his degree, but said he would go to school the entire nine months. He will receive a degree in agricultural education. He said he would probably go into vocational agriculture teaching or some kind of extension work.

Bridges said he was not selling out at this time because of the drought, even though it has been rough. He said his main reason for selling was that he found a buyer. "It's pretty hard to dispose of that many registered stock at one time," he said, "and when I got the offer, I took it."

The Bridges family will move to College Station about Sept. 1. Mr. and Mrs. Bridges have two children, Wayne, who will be in the sixth grade next year, and Barbara, who will be a second grader. Mrs. Bridges is the former Ruby Waggoner of Blackwell.

Two Local Firms Busy Making Improvements

Two Bronte firms have been busy the past couple of weeks making additions and remodeling their places of business. Estelle's Flower Shop and Texaco Station are the two places which are "dressing up."

The Texaco Station which is operated by Billy Joe and G. D. Luckett, is adding a new wash room onto the north side of their building. They said The Texas Company is doing the work. The additional space will enable them to separate their wash and greasing departments and make it possible to handle twice as many vehicles coming in for wash and grease jobs.

Estelle's Flowers has been completely re-decorated inside. Mr. and Mrs. Claude Word, who operate the firm, enlarged their store several months ago making more room for displaying their merchandise, as well as constructing a large work room in the rear of the building. The work the past couple of weeks has been on constructing a large display counter, putting up wall board on which small items can be shown, and re-painting.

Dam on Colorado Still a Possibility

L. T. Youngblood, chairman of the Upper Colorado River Authority, said this week that the group is "working diligently" toward getting a dam built on the Colorado River between Bronte and Robert Lee.

Mr. Youngblood said the biggest obstacle in getting the project over is finding customers to use water which would be impounded in the big reservoir. He quickly pointed out, however, that this is a major problem and one which may not be solved soon.

The dam on the river in Coke County has been under study for many years, and water experts agree that the local site is one of the best in this area.

With more and more people and industry moving to West Texas and the per capita consumption of

water increasing every year, local residents feel that sooner or later the big lake will become a reality. A number of West Texas cities have expressed an interest in being "cut in" on the Coke County water.

A presentation of data regarding the project was approved by the State Board of Water Engineers March 7, 1955. The approval granted at that time gave UCRA the right to 130,000 acre feet of annual runoff and the right to impound 500,000 acre feet of water.

In addition to the interest which has been voiced by domestic users, much demand has been indicated for surplus water for irrigation. Previous plans have indicated that possibly 25,000 to 30,000 acres of land in Coke and Runnels counties could be irrigated from the proposed lake.

Mr. Youngblood said he could not make any definite statement as to the possibility for actually constructing the dam in the near future, but that members of the river authority are doing their best to work out all the problems connected with it.

Pool Bids to Be Opened July 2

Bids will be received by Coke County Commissioners Court July 2 for construction of two swimming pools, one at Bronte and one at Robert Lee.

Commissioners are advertising for bids on the two projects and will open them at 2 p.m. In addition to the pools themselves, the construction job will include bath houses, complete filter plants, and all necessary plumbing and electrical work.

The bids will also include a community house at Robert Lee; and at Bronte will also include a caretaker's house, sidewalks, fences, four tennis courts, picnic tables and barbecue pits.

The Commissioners Court is calling for the bids after Coke countians voted a \$130,000 bond recently to finance construction of the project. The money is to be evenly divided between Robert Lee and Bronte.

Fire Chief Requests Water Cutoff When Fire Siren Sounds

Fire Chief Bill Thomas requested this week that residents of Bronte turn off all water at their homes and other places when they hear the fire siren blow.

He pointed out that with water consumption running high during hot weather, the supply in the water tower is often low. Consequently, in case of fire, the water which is coming directly into the mains from the pumps, could well be needed to fight a fire.

Chief Thomas said water pressure here should be sufficient to fight a fire if everybody will cooperate in this matter.

City Pavement Being Repaired

Quite a bit of repair work has been done on Bronte's paved streets the past two weeks. Repair to pavement has not been necessary, but corners which were not curbed have been worn out, making some work necessary.

They pointed out that a certain amount of maintenance work is expected. By repairing corners and other spots early, they hope to prevent any large amount of damage to the pavement itself.

Local softballers won district last year and represented this area at the state meet, so all the other teams taking part in the district meet are hoping to knock off the champion.

Bronte has received lots of recognition the past year because of the outstanding team fielded last season. I. C. Oden, manager of the local team, said this week, "We are now working on getting one of the most colorful teams in Texas to play here the night of June 30." An announcement will be carried in next week's paper concerning this game. Mr. Oden also announced that he has received a letter of intent from the

world-wide softball champions to stop in Bronte for a game some time in July. It will be their only stop in this area for a game, he added.

Cocoanut Kisses

2 stiffly beaten egg whites
1 cup sugar
½ cup pecans
1 cup moist cocoanut
2 cups corn flakes
½ teaspoon vanilla

Beat egg whites very stiff and gradually add the sugar. Fold in corn flakes, nuts and cocoanut carefully, last the vanilla. Drop on well greased cookie sheet and bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes. Remove immediately with a spatula. It is said that if you place the cookie sheet on a damp cloth after removing from the oven, they will come out better.
