Bronte Given 50,000 Gallon Water Tank by Santa Fe

Negotiations and work which started several months ago are nearing an end this week and the result will be that Bronte will have more than twice the water storage it now has.

Santa Fe Railway Co. has given Bronte a 50,000 gallon water tank, located at Mertzon and workmen are busy this week cutting it down to meet specifications of the highway department in order to move it here. The tank will be trucked to Bronte by M. C. Rhodes Trucking Co. and set up by the old

standpipe. The tank presently in use holds 35,000 gallons.

Need for additional water storage has been felt acutely this summer, particularly late in the afternoons when many local residents are watering their yards and gardens. Pumping facilities from Oak Creek reservoir have been taxed to the limit to keep water in Bronte's mains. With this new storage tank, it will be possible to fill it during slack periods of the day for use later when use of water is heavy.

Members of Bronte's city council thought they would be able to move the tank without cutting it, but the highway department refused to issue a permit because of its height. It is 36 feet high and 20 feet in diameter.

Santa Fe also offered Bronte another tank identical to this one. It is located in San Angelo. Members of the council are doubtful if they will be able to accept the second tank, because of cost of moving. It is estimated that cost of moving and erecting one tank will be \$3,500. This price is only a fraction of what a new tank of similar size would cost.

Santa Fe has the tanks available because of their changeover from steam to diesel power. The railway company, in correspondence with city officials, stated they would give the tank to Bronte if they could be guaranteed that it would be used for benefit of the public for at least five years.

AD-LIB-BEN

Our visit to Amarillo and the Texas Press Association convention last weekend was a lot of fun. We saw lots of friends and heard some enjoyable talks. One part on the program was particularly impressive—that was our visit to Boys Ranch.

Site of this experiment in human engineering is about 50 miles northwest of Amarillo at Old Tascosa—where many a cowboy died with his boots on and is buried in the nearby boothill cemetery.

Shortly after we crossed the Canadian River north of Vega, we came to an enormous growth of big cottonwood trees. Boys Ranch headquarters is located in the midst of them. It's a beautiful place, particularly for the Panhandle area.

We were greeted at the gate by the superintendent. He took us around the grounds, showed us their dormitories, warehouses, barns, swimming hole, etc. These inanimate properties were most impressive when you consider that all these improvements were financed by contributions from people who want to help boys who need help.

The really fine part came, however, when each couple was assigned one of the boys to show us around through the chapel, the old courthouse and dining hall. When we came to this last building "our" boy ate supper with us. Then we were escorted through the new \$212,000 school, also built with contributions.

Never have we seen such well mannered little boys as were those who ate with us that evening. We were talking about how nice those kids are and Libby said, "It beats me how 27 staffers here can teach 200 boys more than both of us can teach our two."

We noticed the place has an abundant dog population. We asked the superintendent about this and he said, "It takes a lot of dogs for 200 boys." Seems that any boy who wishes may have a dog, or other pet. We saw one little boy playing with a kitten.

Practically every boy on the ranch has been in trouble with the law or has no home. Cal Farley, founder of the ranch, saw the need for such a place when he was a merchant in Amarillo. He got the place started and is still the guiding hand behind it. He has retired from his business and spends full time working for boys. His theory is that any boy, when given good food, a wholesome atmosphere and a little affection, will turn out all right. "Of course,"

Last Rites Held Here Monday for Frank Keeney, 79

Funeral services for Frank Keeney, one of Bronte's oldest merchants and respected citizens, were held Monday at 4 p.m. at the First Baptist Church. The Rev. Douglas Brown, pastor, conducted the services.

Mr. Keeney died Sunday at 11:55 a.m. at his home here. He had been ill for several months. Up until a few months ago he was active in operation of his business, Keeney Variety Store. It is being carried on by his brother, Charlie.

Mr. Keeney was born June 22, 1877, on a farm which is now located in the city limits of Temple. He moved with his parents to Bronte in 1903. With his brother, Charlie, they bought out the store of Ed Schaeue in 1906.

Mr. Keeney told the story that Mr. Schaeue was in the general merchandise and undertaking business and they were interested in acquiring everything but the stock of coffins. However, Mr. Schaeue refused to sell unless they took them, also. Consequently, they went into the undertaking business and stayed with it until 1946 when they sold out to Bruce Clift.

Keeney Variety Store is now located in a building built by Mr. Keeney's father, Tom Keeney, in 1908.

In 1908 Mr. Keeney was married to Miss Eva Flood, who was teaching school here at the time.

In addition to his work as a merchant in Bronte, Mr. Keeney had farming interests in this community and was a director of the First National Bank. He served several terms on the city council.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church, the Masonic Lodge, Knights of Pythias and Odd Fellow Lodge.

Survivors include his wife; four brothers, Charlie, John, and J. L. Keeney, all of Bronte, and G. C. Keeney of Waco; and three sisters, Mrs. W. W. Hoch of San Marcos, Mrs. Joe Hoherd of Temple and Mrs. Dollie McQueen of Fort Worth.

Pallbearers were L. T. Youngblood, W. W. Ivey, J. B. Mackey, T. F. Sims, Jr., D. K. Glenn and H. A. Springer, all of Bronte. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Robert Massie Funeral Home.

Members of the Bronte Masonic Lodge attended the services in a group and conducted graveside rites.

School Tax Vote Set for July 10

An election to vote on raising school taxes in Bronte Independent School District has been set for Tuesday, July 10. The election was called by Bronte School trustees Tuesday night after a petition calling for the election was

presented to them. The petition had 28 signers.

The proposal is to raise school taxes from \$1.00 to \$1.25 on the \$100 valuation. The petition also specified that the increased revenue shall be used to retire bonds on the recently completed grade school.

At the present tax rate of \$1.00, board members say the bonds can be retired in 15 years. However, they believe that with the increase it will be possible to retire them in 10 years. Getting the bonds paid off as soon as possible is the aim of those who presented the petition to the board.

At the present time, the school has a bonded indebtedness of \$234,500 on the new building and \$9,000 on the old building. With tax valuations high because of oil production in the district, proponents of the issue believe this money should be paid off while funds are available from taxes on the oil industry. Oil companies pay an estimated 86.7 per cent of the taxes in the district. Oil company representatives have indicated a willingness to go along with the proposed increase.

Supt. Gariand Black said this week that quite a number of local taxpayers have been interested in increasing taxes for more than a year, but no petition had been presented to the board before Monday night. One reason, he said, that the petition has not been presented before, was the delay in completing the new building. Those in favor of the increase felt the school building should be finished before the proposal was made.

The election will be held at Bronte City Hall with D. K. Glenn serving as election judge.

SOIL BANK PROGRAM UNDER WAY

Soil Bank Acreage Reserve agreements are now available for signature in the county ASC office, Raymond Schooler, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announced today. Farmers may obtain full information there on how they may participate in the Acreage Reserve part of the Soil Bank this year.

"The Acreage Reserve is the first part of the program to get into operation for 1956," the Chairman explained. "While farmers may sign an agreement anytime before July 20, those who want to participate in the program should call at the office soon. July 31 is the last date for plowing or disking a cotton crop in order to reduce the acreage below the farm allotment."

Besides permitting farmers to incorporate into the soil, by plowing or disking an acreage of cotton within the allotment, the 1956 Acreage Reserve contains several other special provisions which enable farmers to take part in the program this year.

Thus, a farmer may earn a payment for underplanting cotton if he can certify that he underplanted in anticipation of complying with the program or because of adverse weather conditions and if he designates an equivalent acreage in the Acreage Reserve; or the farmer may comply with his farm allotment for cotton and earn a payment if he does not harvest an acreage of the crop because of destruction by natural causes. Land placed in the Acreage Reserve must not be cropped, cut for hay, or grazed during 1956. Noxious weeds must also be controlled.

Payments on cotton acreage designated for participation in the Acreage Reserve will be based on 15 cents per pound on either the normal or appraised yield — depending on how the land qualifies under the program, but not less than \$6 per acre for destruction due to natural causes or for plowing or cutting the cotton crop.

In order to participate in the Acreage Reserve of the Soil Bank, a farmer must generally comply with all allotments established for his farm.

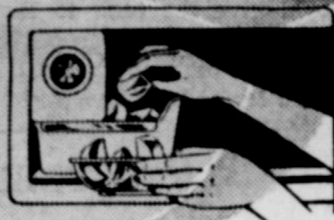

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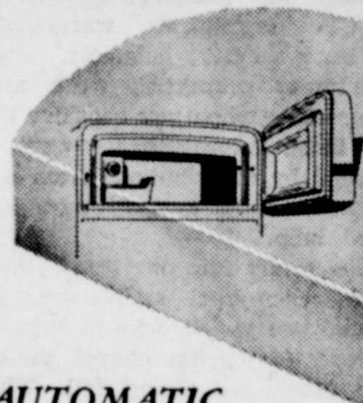

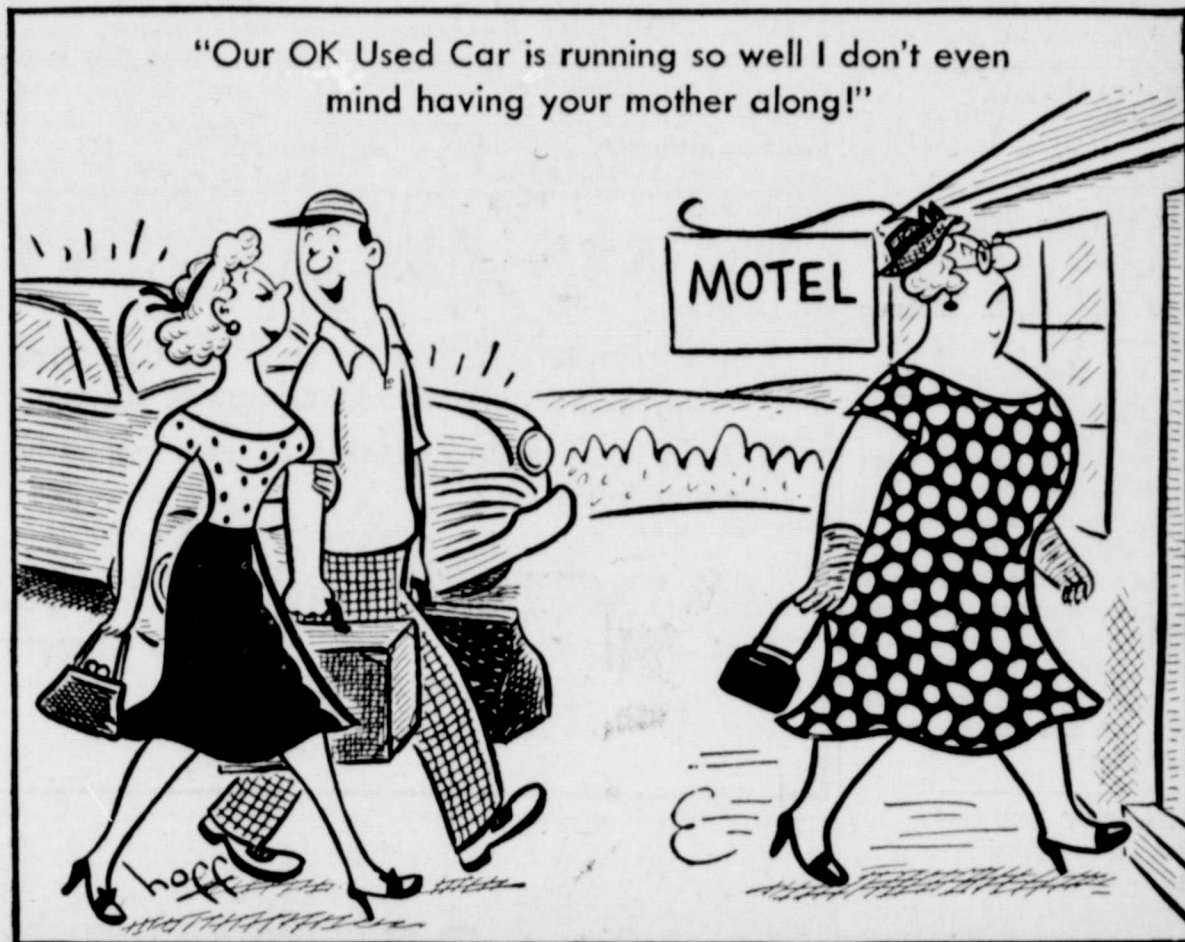

"We keep up with our boys when they leave here just as long as possible," Mr. Farley said.

The only contests for county offices are in two commissioner precincts. In Precinct 1 J. W. Service is opposed by Fern Havins, while Fred Ashworth is running against Commissioner Ed Hickman in Precinct 3.

The ballot will carry three special issues on which voters may express their opinions. They concern mixing white and Negro children in public schools, perfecting state laws against intermarriage of Whites and Negroes, and the use of interposition to halt federal encroachment.

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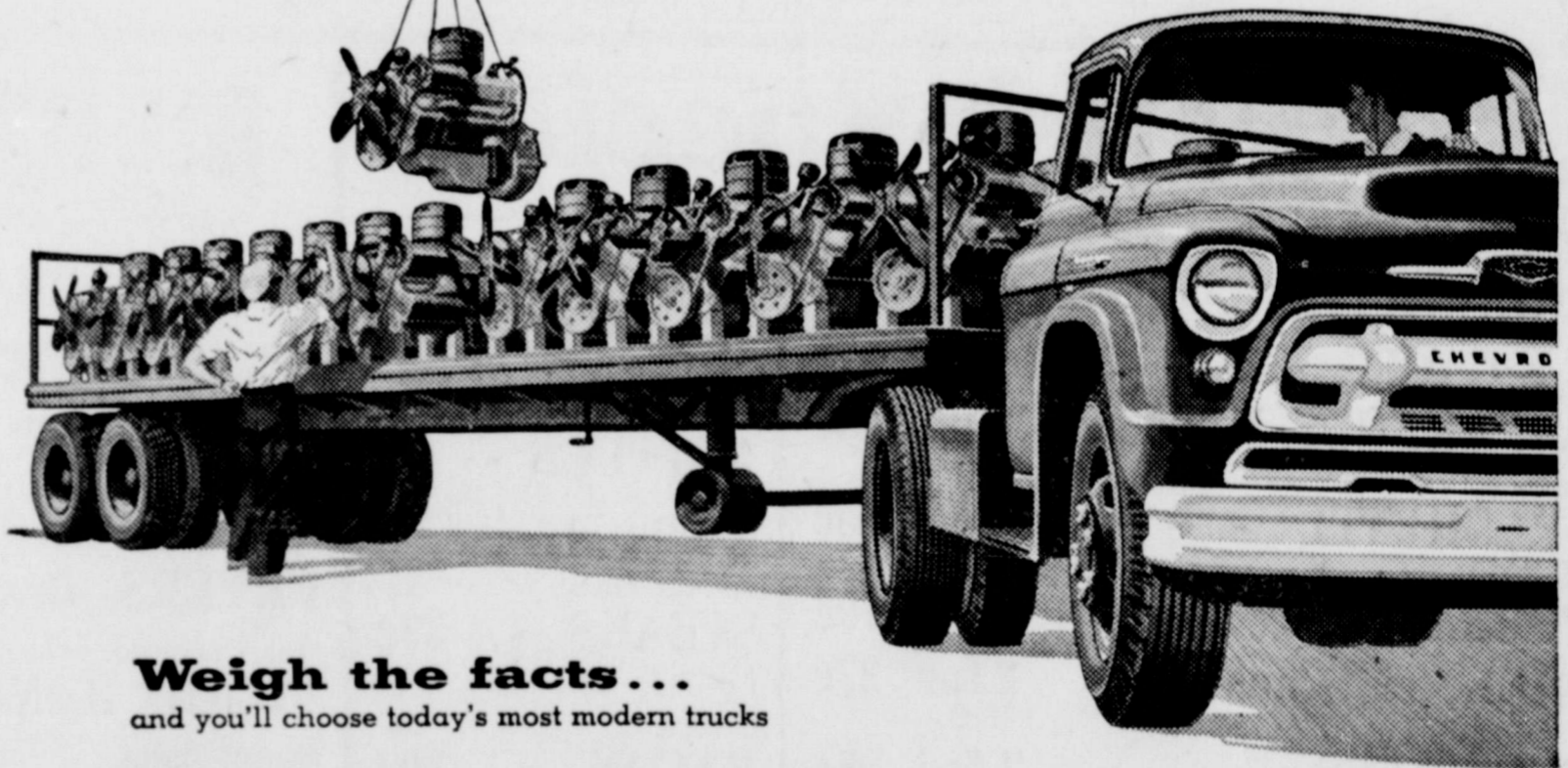

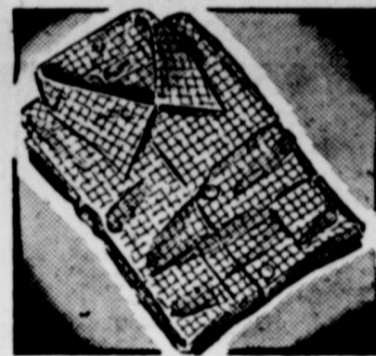
