Mr. Heidel was married to Miss Virgie Oates in 1914. She died in 1939.

Surviving are one son, Leonard Heidel of Santa Fe, N. M.; three daughters, Mrs. Will Thomason of Seminole, and Mrs. W. E. Nelson and Mrs. Frank J. Dixon, both of Waco; 12 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Edward Cumbie Named Field Man Of Farm Bureau

Edward M. Cumbie of Bronte accepted a position July 1 as Area 5 field man for the Farm Bureau of Texas. His area covers a territory from Menard and Concho counties on the east to El Paso on the west, and from the Rio Grande on the south to Dawson and Gaines counties on the north.

He returned to his home here July 4 after spending three days in Waco for briefing of his new duties. His main job is organization work for the Farm Bureau. At this time there are Farm Bureau organizations in 18 of the counties of his area. For the past several days he has been out in the field getting acquainted with his new work. He has been accompanied by Leon Lane, Farm Bureau state representative.

Edward, the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Cumbie, is a native of Bronte. He completed high school here and is a graduate of Texas A&M College. He was a pilot in the Air Force during World War II.

He lives with his wife, and three daughters on their ranch north of town. He and his father are partners in breeding registered Hereford cattle.

Mr. Cumbie's work will be on the road a great deal of the time. His area is one of the largest in Texas.

POSTAL RECEIPTS DOWN

Postal receipts at the Bronte post office were slightly down for the quarter ending June 30, compared with the same period of 1955.

Tax Increase Voted Down, 77 to 59

Voters of Bronte Independent School District turned thumbs down Tuesday on a proposal to raise school taxes from \$1.00 to \$1.25. Seventy-seven persons voted against the proposal, while 59 favored it.

The election was called by school trustees some two weeks after they were presented with a petition signed by 28 persons. Those who "worked up" the election said purpose of the increased tax rate was to enable school officials to pay off bonds on the new elementary school building in ten years. The present plan of paying calls for retiring the bonds in 15 years.

The election was held at Bronte city hall. Mrs. Chas. Keeney was election judge, with Mrs. Will Gideon and Mrs. Robert Forman assisting. One hundred and thirty-six ballots were cast.

Service Champ Softball Team To Play Here

Will Wilson Visits Here

Will Wilson, who is running for attorney general of Texas, was in Bronte Tuesday in behalf of his candidacy for the office. Mr. Wilson has served as associate justice of the Supreme Court of Texas since 1950, when he was elected to that office by an overwhelming majority. He has resigned his Supreme Court post to make the race for attorney general.

He graduated from SMU Law School in 1937 and since that time has practiced law in Dallas, served as assistant attorney general under Grover Sellers and Gerald Mann, and served four years as district attorney of Dallas County.

He was one of five district attorneys selected from the entire nation by the U. S. attorney general to advise the National Conference of Organized Crime in 1950.

Prior to his study of law, Mr. Wilson obtained a bachelors degree in geology and spent some time working as a roughneck in Texas and New Mexico oil fields.

Mr. Wilson said Tuesday that Texas is a big state but he is trying to cover it and talk with as many people as possible.

Brick Jello Salad

3 pkgs. Jello, lemon, lime and orange

3 tsps. lemon juice

1 small can pineapple

2 pkgs. cream cheese

1 medium cup mashed apricots

1st step—

Stir 1½ cups hot water with the lime Jello and when cool add the pineapple and lemon juice. Pour into deep pan to set.

2nd step—

Stir 2 cups hot water with the lemon Jello and when cool add the cream cheese and 1 tsp. lemon juice. Pour over the set Jello carefully.

3rd step—

Stir 1½ cups hot water with orange Jello and when cool add the mashed apricots and ½ cup of the juice. Add 1 tsp. lemon juice. Pour over the other mixture to set.

Dressing—

Butter the size of an egg.

Put in a pan at low heat to melt. Add 1 tbsp. flour, ¾ cup sugar and 2 well beaten eggs. Juice of 2 oranges and 1 lemon and cook until thick.

Slice your salad and add this on top. This makes a large quantity but keeps well.

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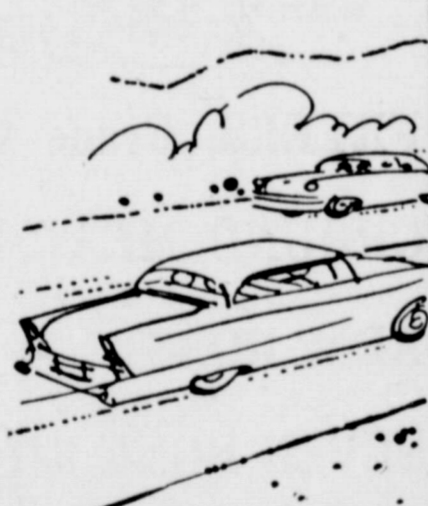
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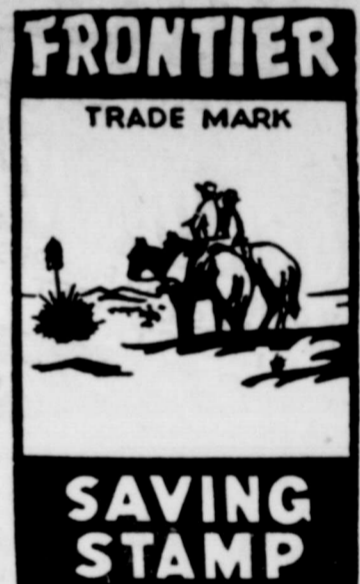
