## Grand Jury Called for Monday To Investigate Murder Charge

A murder charge against Vernon Glenn of Bronte will be investigated by a Coke County grand jury when it is called into session Monday at 10 a.m.

Glenn, 27 years old, is free under a \$5,000 bond for the fatal shooting of Hollis Stevens, 31, of Bronte last Wednesday morning.

When the jury commission met two weeks ago there were no criminal matters in sight and District Judge Joe L. Mays did not order a grand jury for the new court term which opens Aug. 6.

However, after the Bronte affair Judge Mays summoned grand jurors to appear at 10 a.m. Monday.

The jury list includes E. L. Caperton, E. F. Glenn, J. M. Parker, Robert I. Brown, Charles Sims, Bob Edwards, Leonard Fletcher, Bill Allen.

The shooting took place at 9:30 a.m. behind the Bronte post-office. Stevens was shot through the forehead with a .25 revolver and died at 7 that evening without regaining consciousness.

Glenn had been a clerk in the post office where Mrs. Stevens is acting postmaster. It is understood that the shooting grew out of friction over the postmaster's job.

Mrs. Stevens was out of the office a day or two prior to the shooting, and was treated for a nervous breakdown. She was back in the office Tuesday and was being assisted by John Coalson, a substitute rural mail carrier.

Mrs. Clark Glenn, who has been serving as substitute clerk, took care of the post office from last Wednesday until Tuesday when Mrs. Stevens returned.

## Some Interest Shown In Dams on Kickapoo

Some talk has been heard around Bronte the past several days concerning construction of the proposed series of dams on the Kickapoo Creek watershed north of town. In view of the continued drouth, those who have favored the proposition from the first, say its need has become more apparent than ever.

The matter has been more or less dormant for several months, after interest in the project died down. When the project was first brought up last summer several

meetings were held to discuss it, including one at which representatives from the state conservation service were present.

Residents of this area were told at that time that they would probably have to form a water district and vote bonds to pay for the local part of the project. Estimates as to how much would have to be paid from local funds have varied from half of the cost down to practically nothing. Estimated cost of the project when it was briefly studied last year was \$320,000.

## Turnout Light in Bronte Balloting

Only 265 votes were cast in the Bronte box at Saturday's first Democratic primary election. This figure was only 71 per cent of the voters in this box who paid poll taxes, not counting exemptions.

W. Lee (Pappy) O'Daniel was the star of the show so far as the Bronte box was concerned. He received more votes than all of his opponents, 133 to 128.

O'Daniel also led Coke County by a nice margin, but did not receive a majority over all comers, as he did at Bronte.

Vote was 143 for and 28 against on the second proposal concerning intermarriage between whites and negroes. The third proposal, concerning use of interposition to maintain states rights, was voted for by 125, while 30 were against

## Bronte Men Win Softball Tourney

Bronte men's softball team rode high in the saddle last weekend and came out champs of the tournament held here. In the final game, which ended at 1:30 Sunday morning, Bronte edged out Salvato Drug team 8-7, in nine innings.

Both teams qualify for the state tournament Aug. 2 at Brownwood. Both manager I. C. Oden of Bronte and G. P. Lowery of Salvato have indicated that they hope to have teams in the Brownwood tournament.

Earlier in the meet, Bronte downed Smith's Drive-In. Texas Grill was the other team entered in the meet.

Bronte jumped on Salvato starting pitcher Jim Allard for two runs in the first inning. J. W. Caudle was hit by a pitched ball. James Tidwell rapped a single, Marlon McCutchen sent Caudle across the plate with another single and scored the second run on a passed ball.

Bronte added two more runs in the fifth when Tidwell singled, Edward Poehls walked and both raced home on a series of wild pitches and passed balls.

After Lyndon Waldrop had singled Avery Johnson home with the Druggists third run in the sixth, the San Angeloans tied the score in the last of the seventh with three more tallies. The three runs came on a hit batsman, an error and singled by Johnson, Alfred Cates and Waldrop.

Salvato took the lead in the ninth with one run on successive singles by Lambert, Johnson and Cates.

Bronte scored the tying and winning runs without the aid of a hit. In fact, Salvato relief pitcher Waldrop did not allow a hit in five innings.

I have definitely decided this week that July was not the month for me to be gone from my work, with all the subscriptions coming in, along with making out bills, besides putting out the weekly pa-

per. If I meet some of you on the street and fail to speak, think nothing of it as I am practically cross eyed from working on the mailing list. Please don't worry if the date is not changed on your paper, maybe for several weeks. We have it all down but as yet we don't know when we will get around to all that.

The only change that comes over a person after they have had a vacation is you are several degrees darker in color and maybe the old purse has been emptied slightly. I don't know how anyone could drive up and down these hot highways without getting a little bit tan.

One afternoon I was sitting on the boat dock at Possum Kingdom—all neatly wrapped in smock and bonnet, when a real big puff of wind came along and tilted the bonnet string to one side and off came my ear screw—fell into about 14 feet of water. The little son was so disturbed, as it was one of a pair he had selected and given to me as a surprise on Christmas. But he said the way the water was going down, maybe we could go back in about 30 days and find it.

It seems from all the readers that they are still enjoying the things my daughter writes back from Germany. I received a letter while I was gone and she said: I so enjoyed your column, mother, and it thrills me to think people are so interested in my letters. I hope to have more news before long.

I wanted to tell you something sorta interesting concerning building houses in Germany. Whenever the frame for the roof is completed, they consider they are almost through, and they put a stick on top and attach some tree limbs and different colored ribbons to it, and they have a celebration which the owner must pay for. They have ribshin and sauerkraut and beer. The house I looked at today will have the celebration Saturday, and it will be for 21 people.

We took a little trip last Tuesday. We went back to the town that makes so much furniture and looked around a little. Actually, I don't think their furniture compares to ours, most of it is so massive, but occasionally I see something I really like, but it is quite expensive. We saw lovely chairs for about \$100. Then we left that place and drove a long time just looking at things. The country side is so very beautiful with everything so green, and the streams and mountains, and so very clean. Finally we stopped at a hotel near the Rhine River and had dinner. That was quite an event with the boys sloshing everything about among all the wealthy, old, stodgy people. However, they all seemed to enjoy having them there. When we left, we met two men and a woman in the lobby from Scotland, and they were so glad to see the boys, and said it had been so dull there. They even followed us to the car and talked to us. I think they were so happy to see people to speak English with. Outside of the hotel they had a pen full of deer, and they had a little machine of corn to put money in and then feed the deer. The people from Scotland told us that the night before 40 students from the University of

Texas had been there, and they were on their way to Munich.

I was guest at a bridge party one afternoon while I was gone and for the recipe this week I am going to tell you about the lovely cake that she served with peach sherbert. This is very easy but maybe you never thought of doing this, and it was not only very attractive but appetizing.

### Filled Confetti Angel Cake

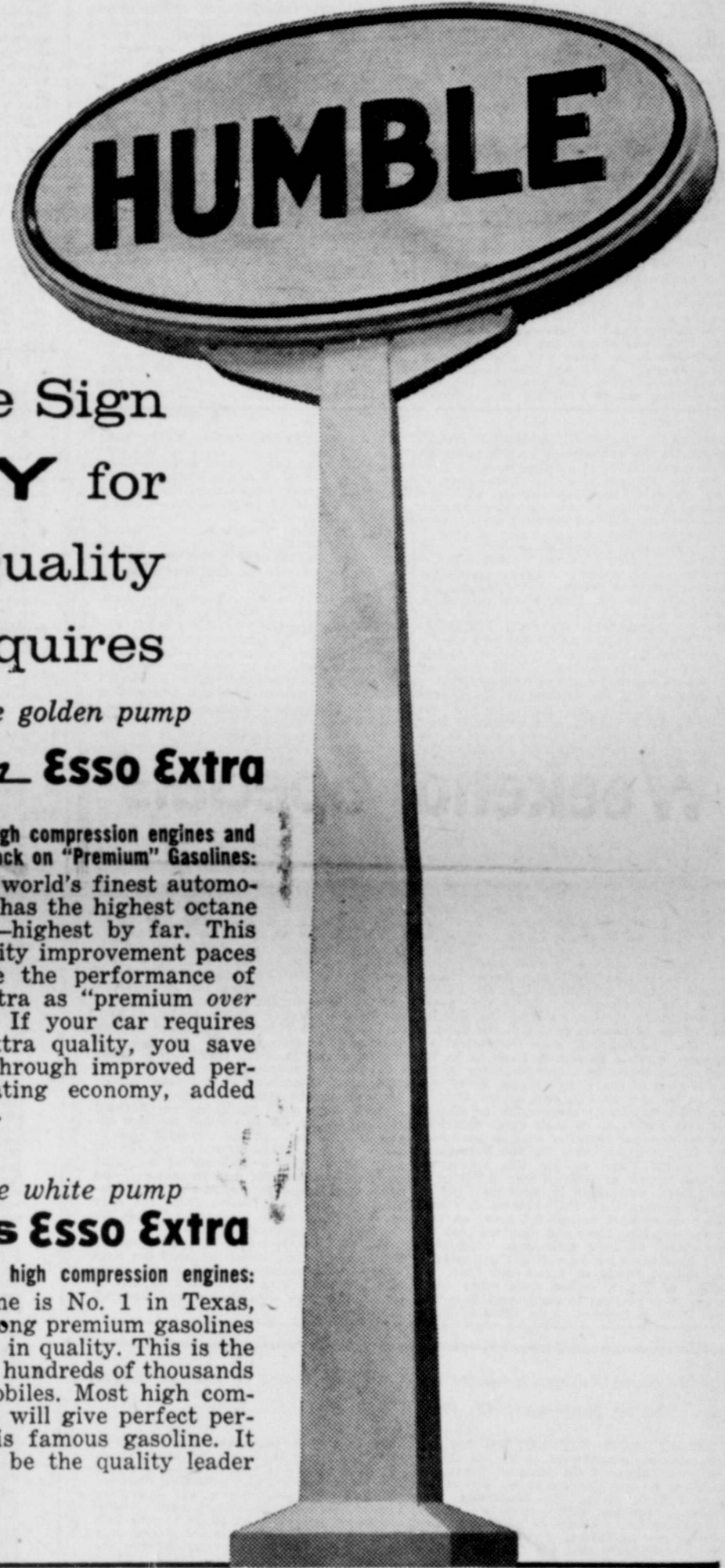

Proposed Constitutional Amendments to Be Voted on at an Election To Be Held on November 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 proposing an amendment to Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to provide that the Commissioners Court in each county may levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund purposes, permanent improvement fund purposes, road and bridge purposes and jury purposes so long as the total of these tax rates does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing further that the Commissioners Court shall not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations; providing for the necessary proclamation, publication and providing for the necessary proclamations and publications.

for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize needed changes in and revision of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas; providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

Proposed Constitutional Amendment to Be Voted on at an Election To Be Held on November 13, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-b, giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals who are citizens of the United States, who are more than eighteen (18) years of age, who are permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who are receiving aid from the State of Texas, who are receiving aid from the Government of the United States financial aid for the permanently and totally disabled individuals; providing that the amount paid to any individual may not exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds and may never exceed the amount paid to that individual from Federal funds; providing that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year; providing for the necessary proclamation, publication and election.

ately preceding the application and who have resided in the State for at least an additional five (5) years preceding the (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance; and providing further that no individual shall receive assistance under the provisions of this amendment and be permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is receiving permanently or completely State supported institution; and provided further that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year. "The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for individuals who are permanently and totally disabled as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein provided." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1956, at which election there shall be printed on the ballot the following clause: "FOR the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide for assistance not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds for each needy individual, eighteen (18) years of age or older, who is a resident of the State of Texas and who is permanently and totally disabled by reason of his mental or physical handicap."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. The Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another Section, to be designated as Section 51-c, which shall read as follows: "The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has heretofore paid a fine or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison under the laws of this State for an offense for which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations and limitations as the Legislature may deem expedient."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Sections 17 and 18, providing a method of payment for the principal and interest on bonds and other permanent improvements at State institutions of higher learning and repealing Chapter 330, Acts, Regular Session, Fifty-third Legislature, providing an amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the improvement of the University of Texas and the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas from a source other than tax revenue by providing for the broader investment of Permanent University Fund in corporate bonds and stocks under certain conditions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

which said Five Cent (5c) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all warrants necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this amendment; and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This amendment shall be self-enacting; provided, however, it shall not become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede or repeal any former provisions of this Section, but shall become so operative and effective on January 1, 1958; provided, further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any State institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this amendment, but such notes or bonds shall nevertheless be paid from the fund as heretofore allocated to any such institution under this Section, nor shall the provisions of this amendment affect in any way the prior allocations to issue negotiable bonds or notes beginning January 1, 1948, as heretofore authorized by the provisions of Section 17 of Article VII of this Constitution as amended by Chapter 23, 1947, Chapter 330, Acts, Regular Session, Fifty-third Legislature, as amended, and the effective date of this Amendment; but the principal and interest due on any obligations incurred by the governing boards of Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont and of Texas Southern University at Houston under the provisions of said Chapter 330 of the Acts of the Legislature, as amended, shall be paid from the allocations to Lamar State College of Technology and Texas Southern University from the funds raised by the Five Cent (5c) ad valorem tax levied as provided in this Section, and the annual allocations to these institutions under this Section shall be first devoted to current requirements of meeting such obligations in accordance with their terms.

"Said Boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and of the University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the Forty-second Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of any bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes. "All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be self-enacting and shall become effective January 1, 1958; provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing any obligation heretofore created by the issuance of any outstanding notes or bonds under this section by the respective Boards of Regents of the University of Texas and any such outstanding notes or bonds shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms of such contracts." Sec. 2. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new Section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows: "Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in first lien real estate mortgage securities guaranteed in any manner in whole by the United States Government or any agency thereof and in such corporation bonds, preferred stock, and common stock of the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may be deemed to be proper investments for said fund; and the interest and dividends accruing from the securities listed in Section 11 and Section 11a, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution. In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the same prudent care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital; provided, however, that not more than ten per cent (10%) of said fund shall be invested in any given time in corporate stocks and bonds, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of corporations incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks as listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investment in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized hereunder." Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Sections 17 and 18 thereof, providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at State institutions of higher learning; and by adding a new section thereto to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the improved support of the University of Texas System and the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System by authorizing the investment of the Permanent University Fund in corporate bonds and stocks under certain conditions and limitations."

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11** proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows: "Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 1 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows: "Section 1. Members of the Legislature, and all other elected officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: "I, \_\_\_\_\_, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of \_\_\_\_\_ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

The Secretary of State, and all other appointed officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I, \_\_\_\_\_, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of \_\_\_\_\_ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward to secure my appointment or the confirmation thereof. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a subsection thereto to be known as Section 11a and to read as follows:

"Section 11a. Any person accused of a felony less than capital in this State, who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction being subsequent to the first, both in point of time of commission of the offense and conviction therefor may, after a hearing, and upon evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial, by any judge of a court of record or magistrate in this State; provided, however, that if the accused is not accorded a trial upon the accusation within sixty (60) days from the time of his incarceration upon such charge, the order denying bail shall be automatically set aside, unless a continuance is obtained upon the motion or request of the accused; provided, further, that the right of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals of this State is expressly accorded the accused for a review of any judgment or order made hereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2

proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be increased to Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and two citizens of the State who shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Governor shall biennially appoint one such member to serve for a term of four years, with the initial appointments to the Board under this section to be for terms of two years, respectively, and all subsequent appointments to be according to provisions of this section. One such appointive member shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and the other appointive member shall be well versed in finance. The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of the Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and provided for by law. The compensation for said appointive members shall be as fixed by the Legislature, and each shall make bond in such amount as may be prescribed by the Legislature. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now provided by law; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or cor-

poration. Provided, however, the portion of the Veterans' Land Fund not immediately committed for the purchase of lands, so as to be invested in short term United States bonds or obligations until such funds are needed for the purchase of lands. The interest accruing thereon shall become a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative Act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

"All monies received and which have been received under the Constitutional Amendment as amended by this Resolution of the Legislature at the election held on November 13, 1951, and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest thereon, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II, and to Texas veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative Act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such monies as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay the principal and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board, shall be set aside for the retirement of bonds heretofore issued and to pay interest thereon, and any of such monies not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be provided by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) has heretofore been issued; said bonds heretofore issued are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas.

"The additional bonds herein authorized may be sold in such installments as deemed necessary and advisable by the Veterans' Land Board. All monies received from the sale of land and/or interest on deferred payments or lands purchased with the proceeds of such additional bonds, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas veterans, as herein provided, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1965; provided, however, that so much of such monies as may be necessary to pay interest on the additional bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1965, all monies received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said additional bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such monies not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law.

"This amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1957."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; increasing the Veterans' Land Fund by \$100,000,000; said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945. Such funds shall be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature pass legislation with regard to this amendment prior to its adoption, it shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature.

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.
