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2ND PRIMARY TO BE HELD AUGUST 25

A week from tomorrow voters of Texas will elect a governor and attorney general. Voters of this county will also vote on their state representative at this second Democratic primary, which will be Saturday, Aug. 25.

Interest in the primary has been lost to a great extent this week because of the Democratic National Convention which is being held in Chicago. Undoubtedly, the same situation will exist next week when the Republican Convention is held in San Francisco.

Candidates for the three offices which involve Coke countians have been on the road the past week, and are trying to arouse local interest in the coming primary.

Contesting for the highest office of the state are Price Daniel of Liberty and Ralph Yarborough of Austin. Daniel led the ticket in the first primary gubernatorial race but failed to secure a majority. Yarborough has carried on an extensive campaign in an effort to overtake Daniel in the second primary.

In the attorney general's race Will Wilson of Dallas County is battling it out with Tom Moore of McLennan County. Wilson was high man of the race in the first primary.

Another runoff of state-wide scope was cancelled when A. M. Aiken, Jr., withdrew from the lieutenant governor's race. Incumbent Ben Ramsey led the ticket, but failed to get a majority. Aiken withdrew on account of his health.

Closer to home incumbent A. J. Bishop is going to bat against E. J. (Ebb) Grindstaff for representative of the 77th district. Both men are from Runnels County, Bishop living at Winters and Grindstaff at Ballinger. Grindstaff was high man in the first primary; however, Bishop carried Coke County. The district is composed of Coke, Runnels, Concho and Coleman counties.

VOTERS URGED TO INVESTIGATE ISSUES IN SCHOOL TAX ELECTION

Those who have made thorough studies of the school tax situation this week are urging voters of the Bronte Independent School District to investigate and consider seriously the proposition which is to be voted on Sept. 1. The proposal is to raise taxes in this school district from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per \$100 valuation.

The election was called after the school board was presented with a petition signed by 75 qualified voters of the school district, asking that the election be held again. It was voted down, 77 to 59, in an election July 10.

Since the election July 10, it has been brought to the attention of an equalization board and the school board that Bronte School

J. T. Henry Given Award for 20 Years Service As Teacher

J. T. Henry received his 20-year service pin in the teaching profession this week when he and Supt. Garland Black, attended the state convention of vocational agriculture teachers in San Antonio.

Vocational ag. teachers from all over the state were present at the meeting. It is at these conventions that they set up their plan of work for the ensuing year.

Henry has spent his entire career as a teacher in Bronte, coming here in 1937. He spent from 1941 to 1943 in service but returned here when he was discharged to take up his work where he left off.

He graduated from Sterling City High School and received his B.A. degree from Texas Tech and his masters degree from Sul Ross State College at Alpine.

Henry resides with his wife and daughter, Linda, at their home east of town. He has been busy on a summer project west of his house where he has erected a gray tile work shop. The building will house his tools and make it convenient for him to carry on the work which he enjoys doing.

During his 20 years teaching in Bronte Schools, Henry has turned out some outstanding judging teams as well as winners in FFA chapter conducting and other contests. He has had a large per cent of all boys graduating from Bronte High School in his classes during the last 20 years.

Mrs. Henry also teaches in the Bronte school system and in September will start her 16th year. She teaches commercial subjects.

Swim Pool Bid Let To Midland Firm

Construction contracts totaling \$105,774 for Robert Lee and Bronte swimming pools and facilities have been approved after bids were opened Monday by the Commissioners Court. Velvin Construction Co. of Midland was awarded the contract for construction of the concrete swimming pools in both towns with the low bid of \$60,800 and Don Williams, Snyder contractor, got the contract for construction of buildings with a low bid of \$44,974.

Bids for constructing swimming pools and other features of the

County Park projects at Robert Lee and Bronte were rejected by the Commissioners Court at an earlier meeting in July. The bids at that time were too high and ran considerably in excess of the \$130,000 bond issue. Velvin Construction Co. also submitted the low bid of \$137,791 for the entire project at that time.

In addition to the swimming pools, Robert Lee will get a bath equipment house and a community building while Bronte will be provided with a bath equipment house and a caretakers house.

Others bidders for the swimming pools were James Goss of Kerrville, \$63,620, and Paddock of Texas, Dallas, \$63,609. Firms bidding on buildings were T. E. Shelburne & Son, Inc., of Snyder, \$49,932, and Elkins Construction Co. of Sweetwater, \$50,433.71.

Velvin Construction plans to begin work on the new pools within a week and complete the project within 120 days. Buildings construction will begin in the near future. They are scheduled to be completed within 150 days.

COURT HOUSE PAVING

C & C Asphalt & Paving Co. of Colorado City was awarded an \$8,918.40 contract for paving the court house block and constructing curbs and parking areas at the courthouse in Robert Lee. They were the only bidders for the job.

The pavement surrounding the court house will be 85 feet wide. A parking area will be paved in front and another will stretch the width of the block behind the building. C & C Asphalt & Paving Co. paved the streets in Bronte a year ago last May. They plan to start work immediately.

Football Practice Starts Aug. 27th

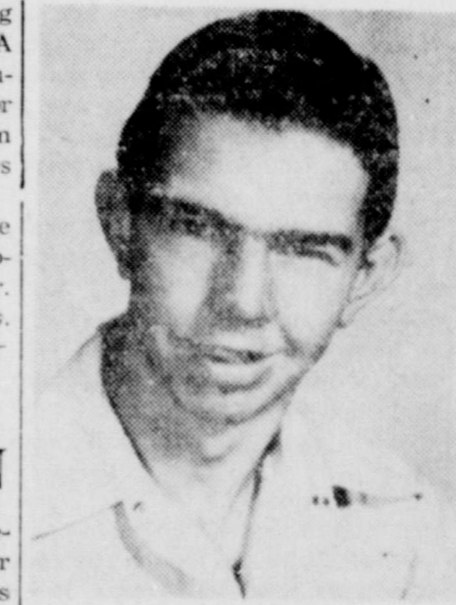

Proposed Constitutional Amendments to Be Voted on at an Election to Be Held November 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows: "Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be increased to Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto; and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and two citizens of the State who shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Governor shall biennially appoint one such member to serve for a term of four years, with the initial appointments to the Board under this section to be for terms of two and four years, respectively, and all subsequent appointments to be according to provisions of this section. The other appointive member shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and the other such appointive member shall be well versed in finances. The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of the Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as may be now or hereafter provided by law. The compensation for said appointive members shall be as fixed by the Legislature, and each shall make bond in such amount as may be prescribed by the Legislature. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now provided by law or as may hereafter be provided by law; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three percent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teachers Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation. Provided, however, the portion of the Veterans' Land Fund not immediately committed for the purchase of lands may be invested in short term United States bonds or obligations until such funds are needed for the purchase of lands; interest accruing thereon shall become a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the Oath of Office to include appointive officers of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 1 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. Members of the Legislature, and all other elected officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: "I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

The Secretary of State, and all other appointed officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward to secure my appointment or the confirmation thereof. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature pass legislation with regard to this amendment prior to its adoption, it shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature.

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9 proposing an Amendment to Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be designated as Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a subsection thereto to be known as Section 11a and to read as follows: "Section 11a. Any person accused of a felony less than capital in this State, who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction being subsequent to the first, both in point of time of commission of the offense and conviction thereof may, after a hearing, and upon evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial, by any judge of a court of record or magistrate in this State; provided, however, that if the accused is not accorded a trial upon the accusation within sixty (60) days from the time of his incarceration upon such charge, the order denying bail shall be automatically set aside unless continuance is obtained upon the motion or request of the accused; provided, further, that the right of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals of this State is expressly accorded the accused for a review of any judgment or order made hereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; increasing the Veterans' Land Fund by \$100,000,000; said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945. Such funds shall be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature pass legislation with regard to this amendment prior to its adoption, it shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature.

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

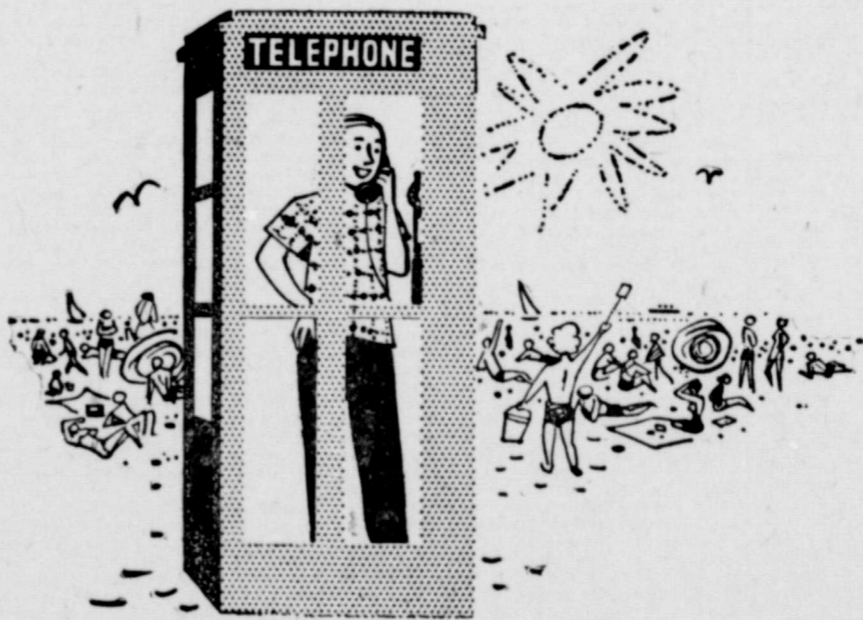
