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Elbert Stevenson Memorial Field looked like a race track last Friday night as the Longhorns stomped a hapless team from South Taylor, 40-6. The Longhorns put together two touchdowns in the first period, two in the second quarter and one each in the final two periods to run up the massive score.

The Longhorns scored the first time they got their hands on the ball and from then on, they did just about what they wanted to do. Walker, Wrinkle and Lee alternating on carrying the ball, the Longhorns moved from their 49 yard line to South Taylor's 11 in 7 plays. Lee chalked up the first score on an 11 yard scamper. The try for point was no good.

Minutes later, a partially blocked punt set the stage for the next Bronte score. Walker carried for 3 to the Tigers' 30 and then loped 30 yards to give the Longhorns a 12-0 lead at the end of the initial period.

Bronte Field to Be Unitized Monday

Monday morning at 7 o'clock a major change will take place in the Bronte Field west of town. The pioneer of oil development in the field, Hickok & Reynolds of Cisco, will step out, leaving their holdings to the larger Humble Oil & Refining Co., which will take over all the wells in the field for operational purposes.

Humble will produce the 20 wells currently owned by Hickok

& Reynolds, along with the 65 which they new have.

C. S. Yust, district superintendent for Humble of Winters, said Wednesday night that the company will operate the additional wells with no additional personnel.

Yust also said that Humble will build a compressor plant in the Bronte Field, in the near future. He could give no exact date for starting construction, but said the project would be started the latter part of this year. Humble has already taken a lease on a plot of land on the Lowery Estate where the plant will be located. It will be only a re-pressuring operation and no products will be produced.

Hickok & Reynolds moved into this area in the spring of 1948 when they staked location for their No. 1 E. C. Rawlings. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 5,802 feet, where granite was struck. It is located 1½ miles west of Bronte.

The operator plugged the well back to, and perforations were made at 4,370 to 4,390 feet in the Palo Pinto lime. A fair showing of oil was found in that stratum, and official test was run on the well in August. It produced 77.62 barrels of 44 gravity oil plus 1.7 barrels of water during the 24-hour potential test.

Completion of the well forced an offset on R. E. Hickman to the east and J. A. Percifull to the north. Humble had Hickman's lease, while American Republics was forced to drill on Percifull.

Humble completed the No. 1 Hickman first, and it flowed a large amount of oil on a drillstem test. The No. 1 Percifull was soon completed as a good well, also. The original well, drilled by Hickok & Reynolds, set off drilling which resulted in completion of nearly 100 wells in the field.

Yust said no noticeable difference in the operation of the field will occur when Humble takes over. He also stated that no arrangements have been made concerning the disposition of the two houses owned by Hickok & Reynolds.

Pre-Historic Bone Found Near Here

A large bone, some 30 feet long was uncovered last week on the J. A. Percifull farm west of Bronte. The bone was about ten feet under the ground. It was found by a crew working for McGuire Bros., who were digging a tank for Mr. Percifull.

Mr. Percifull said the place where the excavation was done is an old slough and that water has always stood there after rains. He speculated that perhaps this spot used to be a watering place for animals thousands of years ago and perhaps the animal died there when coming for a drink. Somehow the skeleton has been partially preserved through the ages.

Mr. Percifull said he was going to send a piece of the bone to Austin and see if it can be identified. Observers said they were sure of one thing, it was something big.

Sears gilt but was unable to compete in this show.

Competition for these youngsters is just beginning. All of them will have their gilts ready for the County Livestock Show early next year and the most important competition of all will be the heavy litter contest next spring. The Sears Foundation gave prize money for the county. Prize money was \$10, \$8, \$6, \$4 and \$2. Prize money for the Area Show was \$35, \$30 and \$25.

Sears also puts \$120 into the heavy litter contest in the spring. Each litter of pigs is weighed 56 days after they are farrowed and the nine heaviest litters receive prize money.

FERTILIZER FOR LAWNS

Mr. E. M. Trew, agronomist with the Texas Extension Service, suggests that a fall application of fertilizer will help the appearance of the lawn next spring. An application 30 days before the first expected frost will leave the grass in a vigorous condition this fall which will carry on through the winter months and give it a good start in the spring. A good healthy cover of grass will reduce the weed problem this fall and in the spring. Fertilizer should be followed with an application of water.

Another good tip is to cut your grass high this fall. This will protect it to a limited extent against severe winter weather. Cut it short early in the spring and it will green up early and with a lot of

vigor.

This is the last possible reminder of the tax refund on gasoline. Application must be made before October 1. Blanks are available at the Humble Station in Silver, Key Feed Store in Robert Lee and the Red Chain Feed Store in Bronte.

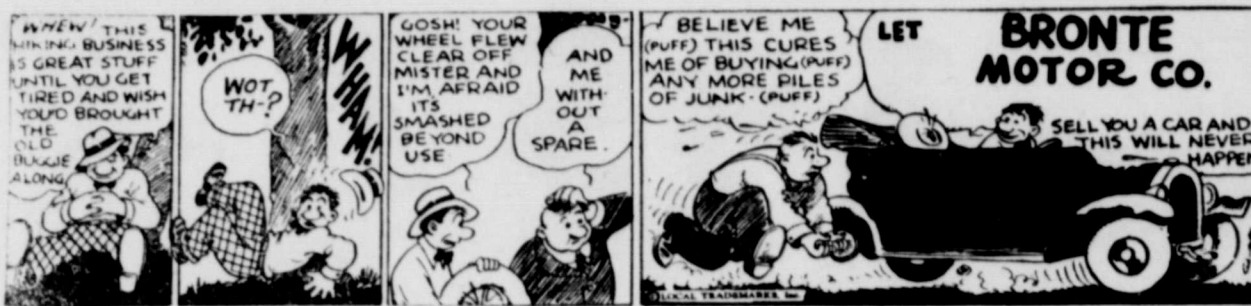
