## Rites Held for Mrs. McCutchen, Bronte Pioneer

Mrs. J. B. McCutchen, Bronte pioneer, died Monday at 2:10 p. m. in the Bronte Hospital. She had been ill and in the hospital for about nine months.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 3:30 p. m. at the First Baptist Church, with the Rev. Douglas Brown, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. M. R. Rogers of Miles, former pastor here.

Burial was in the Fairview cemetery with Cliff Funeral Home in charge. Pallbearers were W. D. (Pete) McDonald, J. B. Mackey, T. F. Sims, Jr., E. F. Glenn, O. H. Willoughby, L. T. Youngblood, R. E. Cumbie and Leonard Fletcher.

Georgia Ann Gentry was born in Athens, Henderson County, Jan. 5, 1868. She moved to Coleman County with her family while a young girl. She was married to J. B. McCutchen at Santa Anna Aug. 8, 1884. The ceremony was performed in a log cabin. Mr. and Mrs. McCutchen lived in Coleman County until 1889, when they moved to Coke County. Only a few families lived here when they moved here. They lived here the remainder of their lives. Mr. McCutchen died Jan. 8, 1941.

Mrs. McCutchen had been a resident of Bronte for 67 years and a member of the First Baptist Church for the past 64 years. She was active in Sunday School and women's work in the church. She had also been active in Eastern Star work.

Mr. and Mrs. McCutchen were the parents of four children, Mrs. Lula Hines of San Angelo and Mrs. Annie Wilkins of Bronte, both of whom survive, and Mrs. Minnie Mitchell and Joe McCutchen, both of whom are deceased. Other survivors include four grandchildren; 11 great-grandchildren; one great-great-grandchild; one brother, James Gentry of Junction; one sister, Mrs. Fred Heine of Roswell, N. M.; and numerous nieces and nephews. One grandson, Lum Hines, was killed in Germany during World War II.

## Boy Scout Drive Starts Oct. 9th All Over Texas

The Kickoff Breakfast for the annual Boy Scout fund raising campaign will be Tuesday morning, Oct. 9, at 7 o'clock at the First Baptist Church, according to Claude Word, who is in charge of arranging the meeting.

After a breakfast of bacon or sausage, eggs, toast and coffee, District Attorney E. C. Grindstaff of Ballinger will address those present. Plans will be made and assignments given for the 1956 drive. The drive will begin after the meeting is concluded.

The Boy Scout program in the Concho Valley Council requires a 1957 budget of \$90,976.44 to continue current operations and provide for the increasing number of boys wanting in the program, H. A. Springer, who is in charge of the campaign, said.

"Too much stress cannot be placed on the importance and the need for meeting our local fund program," said Mr. Springer. "We are only asking for the money to continue training the youth of our community to be better prepared in body, skills, and in spirit as they grow into young men and finally into the leaders of tomorrow."

Each year, he added, the demand for enlarged Scouting facilities and more Scouting groups continues as more and more boys reach Scouting age.

## Longhorns Win 7 Straight by Downing Bangs

Scoring three touchdowns in the third period, the Bronte Longhorns managed to chalk up their fourth victory of the season by trouncing Bangs 20-0. The Longhorns now have racked up seven consecutive wins over a period of the last two years.

The Longhorns of the first half looked like a bunch of grade school boys playing touch and pass as there was no scoring during the initial part of the game. After receiving the opening kickoff, Bangs looked hapless, as a rigid Longhorn defense pushed them back to the one yard line. After taking a Dragon kick on their own 44, Bronte started to move but bogged down and never got started again until the third quarter.

Midway in the second stanza, Bangs threatened, but a stout defense thrown up by the Longhorns halted the drive. A beautiful run by quarter back Denhart of the Dragons carried for 49 yards down inside the Bronte 10. When the Longhorns took possession again,

the ball was on the 17.

Fumbles plagued both teams during the first half as the Longhorns dropped the ball five times and Bangs three times. Late in the second period, Bronte started to move only to be stopped by a fumble on the Dragon 30. The first half ended in a 0-0 deadlock.

The third quarter opened with the Longhorns receiving the kickoff. Jimmy Lee returned it to Bangs' 45. The first play from scrimmage saw Gene Walker romping 45 yards for the score. Lee ran the extra point to put the Longhorns out front 7-0.

Midway in the third period, Robert Moore broke through and recovered a Dragon fumble on the Bangs 10 to open the doors for the next Bronte score. Again Walker was the man carrying and again he crossed the double stripe. Lee converted to make the score 14-0.

The final Longhorn tally came in the waning moments of the third quarter. Wrinkle completed a 68 yard drive by going over from the nine. The try for extra point was missed. Final score, Bronte 20,

Bangs 0.

The most spectacular run of the evening was called back midway in the final period. Jimmy Lee went 91 yards for a touchdown, but the play was nullified by a clipping penalty.

The Longhorns will have an open date this Friday. However, they will be busy in preparation for next week's game with the ever-tough Hermleigh.

### ROT KOHL

(Which means Red Cabbage.)

Fry 3 pieces chopped bacon and 1/2 chopped large onion, then add finely chopped head of red cabbage and stir till shiny.

Cover with water and add 2 small bay leaves, 2 tbsp. vinegar, 3 small cloves, 2 tsp. sugar, and 1 chopped apple and the rest of the onion and salt and pepper. Cover and cook slowly till done—about 2 hours.

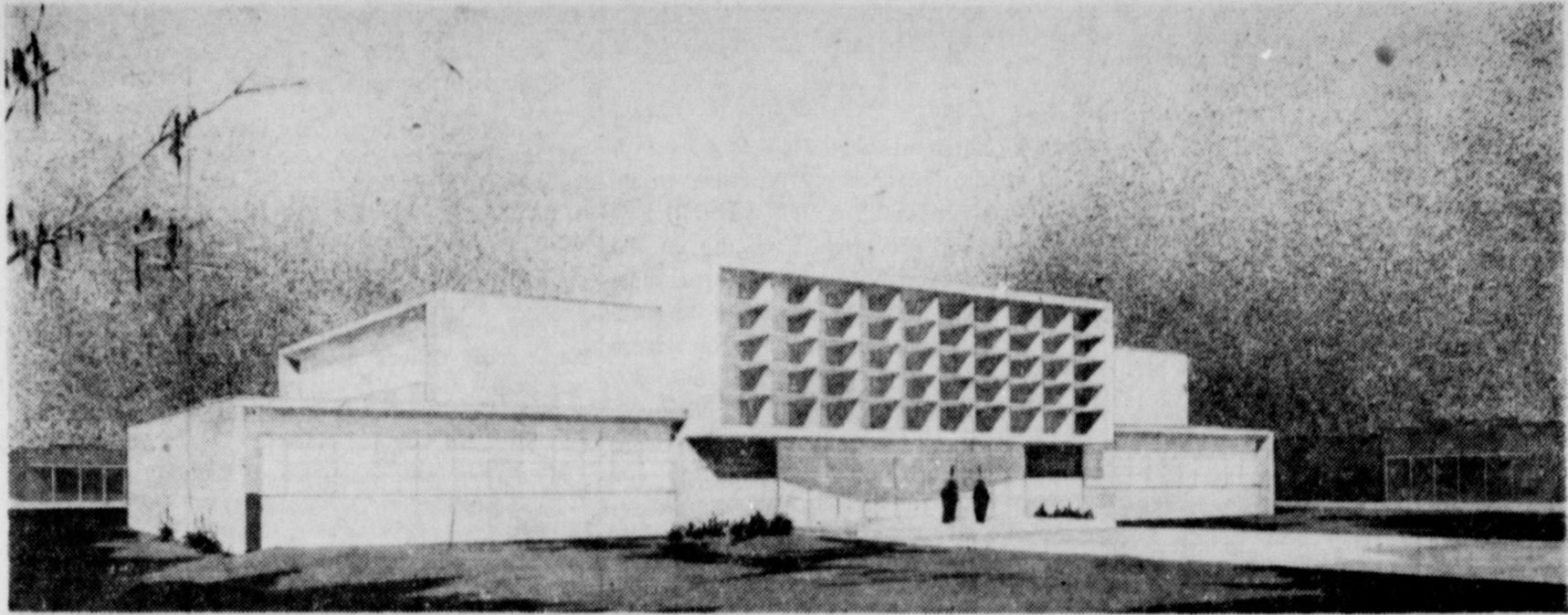

### Lions Committee To Study Dams On Kickapoo

Bronte Lions Club President J. A. Stephenson said Tuesday he appointed a Lions Club committee to study the proposed dams on the Kickapoo watershed. Mr. Stephenson pointed out that the committee's function will be to determine whether people in this area are still interested in the project.

Named on the committee were Taylor Emerson, Cecil Kemp, Joe Carter and C. E. Bruton.

Mr. Stephenson said that it is essential that citizens of this area make some kind of decision on the project right away, since it has been placed on a high priority list by the state conservation office. "If we are not going through with the project," he said, "we need to let them (the state office) know, so we won't stand in the way of some other project."

A bill passed by the last session of Congress provides for the federal government to pay all the cost of such projects, except for right-of-way and maintenance.

A great deal of interest was shown in the project several months ago, but it more or less died when it was determined that several thousand dollars in local funds would have to be raised. Mr. Stephenson said he was of the opinion that the new law might change the attitude of local residents on the matter.

It will be necessary to form a water district if sufficient interest is aroused to start dealing with federal agencies for the project.
