## Thanksgiving to Be Observed Here Next Thursday, Nov. 22

Word Thursday morning indicated that the condition of Mary Beth Ivey, 9-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. (Tootsie) Ivey, was much improved. She was admitted to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo Thursday of last week, suffering from poliomyelitis. Her condition over the weekend was considered serious.

Beth was admitted to Bronte Hospital Wednesday afternoon of last week and transferred to the polio ward the next day. She is a fourth grade student in the Bronte

schools. She had received all three shots of the Salk polio vaccine.

The disease affected her legs, which have been paralyzed. However a friend of the family said Thursday that she was able to turn over in bed and that the isolation of her room had been discontinued.

She will be transferred to the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation Hospital for further treatment and therapy in the near future.

This was the first case of polio here in several years. In fact, there have been very few cases in this entire area of West Texas this year, according to a report from the polio center at the Shannon Hospital.

Mrs. Modgling died at 2:45 a. m. Thursday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. L. W. Mills, in San Angelo. Mrs. Modgling had been berfast for several months, and had lived with Mrs. Mills for the past 14 years.

She was born Sept. 6, 1869, in Warren, Ark., and moved with her parents to Llano, Texas, in April, 1873. She was married to Tom Modgling Oct. 27, 1889, in Kingland, Llano County. The family moved to Bronte in 1900. Mr. Modgling died in 1929.

Two children, Bill Modgling of Quanah, and Ollie Modgling, preceded her in death.

Surviving are four sons, B. E. and Floyd Modgling of Bronte; Walter Modgling of Christoval, and Tom Modgling of San Angelo; four daughters, Mrs. Iber Cross and Mrs. L. W. Mills of San Angelo, Mrs. Lillie McCullough of Dallas and Mrs. John Bowers of Pampa.

Also surviving are a number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren; two brothers, R. E. Hickman of Bronte and Ed Hickman of Edith; and a sister, Mrs. Sally Long of Eunice, N. M.

## School Auditorium, Cafeteria To Have Air Conditioning

Air conditioning in the school auditorium and cafeteria will be a reality next summer. Bids for the air conditioning installation were read and a bid was accepted at the regular meeting of the board of trustees last Thursday night. Low bid of \$3,500 came from Acme Air Conditioning and Sheet Metal Company of Ballinger. Their bid stipulated that the work be done during the winter months in preparation for final spring installation.

Considering the \$2,200 left in the building fund after construction of the new elementary building, trustees decided to accept the low bid and use the building fund money, if necessary, toward payment.

Other business transacted by the school men included selling the 1946 Ford school bus to Moreland Welding Co. of Pecos for \$150, and a discussion and approval of the annual school audit of funds by

records are discarded and the winner will be determined when the final whistle sounds.

Neither Robert Lee nor Bronte is contending for the top berth in District 6-B, as both have lost at least one conference game. Hermleigh wrapped up the district title in a golden package last week by defeating Trent 34-6. The best that Robert Lee can do is take second place honors. If the Steers win, they will go ahead of Trent for the second best mark in district play, with Bronte winding up in fourth place. Should the Longhorns win, there will be a three way tie for the second spot between Bronte, Robert Lee and Trent.

In games last week, Hermleigh sewed up the district title by romping past Trent 34-6. Robert Lee sent Loraine down to another defeat by trouncing them 34-14. In a non-conference tilt, the Bronte Longhorns suffered a defeat at the hands of the Wylie Bulldogs by a score of 19-0.

Recently I received the nicest letter from a lady reader in Oklahoma City. She said so many nice things about my column, recipes and the daughter's letters that I run. She also sent me a very good recipe that I plan on running just as soon as I can get to it. I want her to know that I appreciate her letter and would be glad for anyone to write me and send their favorite recipes.

I hardly know what we are going to read in the papers or see on TV now since the election is over. I hope it all went according to the way they wanted it. According to the laws of nature, it seems that we cannot all be pleased when there has to be a decision made. So we all have to learn to be good losers. Maybe you wanted Ike and maybe you did not, but we have to go on just the same.

We were privileged to have the J. T. Henrys come by and eat with us last Friday night and we certainly enjoyed hearing about everyone in Bronte. I hope that some more of you West Texas people will be dropping by to see us.

I received a letter from the daughter in Germany the other day and she tells us of a tour she had recently made to Weisbaden. I hope that you will enjoy it. She says:

Wiesbaden is one of the loveliest cities in Germany, and it is really a resort town and people come there from all of Europe for the baths; as it is very famous for its warm springs and has been for centuries. It has a population of 235,000 and has long been internationally renowned. It has always been a favorite spa with royalty and now that crowned heads are more rare than they used to be, Wiesbaden has had the experience of being selected by that new royalty, the United States Air Force, as its European headquarters.

Wiesbaden is built on the edge of the Taunus mountains with much of the residential section being on the slopes, so even if it had not been for the healing qualities of its hot saline springs, particularly efficacious against rheumatism, Wiesbaden was destined naturally to attract visitors because of its beauty.

It is in the Rheingau, one of the loveliest stretches in all Germany, and the place where the best wine grapes grow. We had the privilege of going through one of the best known champagne cellars in Germany, Henkell Trocken. Believe me, it looked like no factory I've ever seen in the States. It looked like a palace—the outside was lovely, and the inside even more so. The large reception room had beautiful period furniture and the most gorgeous immense crystal chandelier I've ever seen. We were taken into the cellars and saw the immense barrels that hold between 6,000 and 10,000 quarts. At the end of the first stairway were two large barrels with lovely wood-carving on the front, and one was a carving of the national symbol of Germany similar to our Statue of Liberty, and the other was our Statue of Liberty. The man explained the process of making the champagne and we saw more bottles than

you can imagine, and he told us there are always between 5 and 6 million full bottles there. It was very interesting to watch them open the bottles and let the yeast out and then recap them.

This factory is now in the hands of the 5th generation of the Henkell family. Everything was very clean and modern, and to give you an idea of their size; when we looked at their cafeteria, we were told 700 people eat there. The interesting thing about that, was that all the people eat the same food, but pay according to salary. One group pays 25 pfennig a day and another group pays 50 pfennig. (in American money that equals approximately 6c and 12c.) Naturally, at the end of that tour, everyone was given a free sample of their champagne.

From there we went to an outside cafe and had coffee and cake and then we drove around and looked at the lovely Opera House (we had been there before to see a ballet) and the famous Casino. We did not have time for Museums which I'm sure would have been interesting, as they have benefitted by loans of treasures from the bombed-out museums of Berlin, and in one of the museums is one of the most famous heads in the world—the original sculptured painted likeness of Queen Neferte of Egypt, dated at about 1360 B. C. One of the most beautiful sights was a Greek Chapel on one of the

## Class A Wylie Too Much for Longhorns

Meeting tough opposition in a Class A ball club from Wylie last Friday night, the Bronte Longhorns went down to their third straight defeat and their fourth of the season by a score of 19-0. Wylie, a much larger and faster team, put two scoring punches in the first period and one drive in the final quarter to wrap up the victory.

Early in the first stanza, the Bulldogs drove 63 yards to their first score. After forcing the Longhorns to punt, the Bulldogs went all the way in four plays. The final play came on a 59 yard end sweep by quarterback Joe

Schulle. The try for extra point was no good and Wylie led 6-0.

The Longhorns started a drive, but could not put enough yardage together to produce a tally. Starting from their own 29, the Longhorns moved the ball to the Bulldog 39 before being pushed back to the 49.

Taking over at this point, Wylie again put short punches together to increase their lead. Moving to the Longhorn 40, it took the Bulldogs only one more play to cross the double stripe. The chapel had 5 domes with the Greek double cross on top; and the middle and largest dome was most effective. It was painted blue as the sky and in this field was one eye looking down at you from the top which represented the eye of God.

One thing we did not see but were told about, is a Mosque there that was built by a Moslem for one of his favorite wives. He had it built and when the builder finished he blinded him so he could never build another so beautiful.

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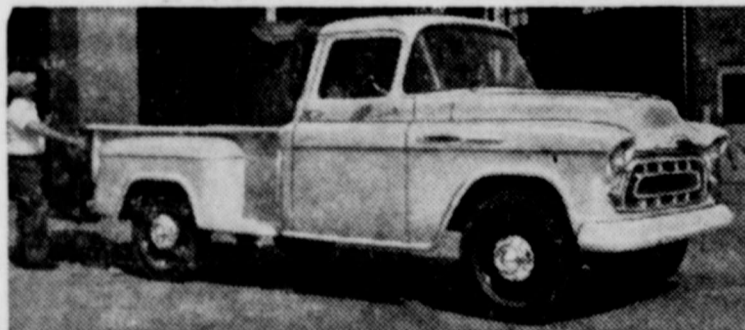
