Sims Succeeds Modgling As Magnolia Agent

Robert Hugh Sims announced
this week that he has accepted the
appointment as Magnolia whole-
sale dealer in Bronte. He succeeds

ter 35 years as the local dealer.
The change becomes effective Jan.
2.

Sims said he will operate the
petroleum products agency along
with his butane and appliance
business. The wholesale offices
will be moved from the Bronte
Service Station to the building
which houses Butane Service Co.

tinue to operate the Bronte Ser-
vice Station, located on the main
street of Bronte. His trucks and

I went to a Sunday School social the other night and for the recipe this week, I am going to bring you this wonderful sandwich loaf that we had. This would be ideal for any party or club meeting and since so many of you entertain a lot I know you will want to try this. I wish that I could draw you a picture to let you know just how beautiful it really was. It was not only pretty but very good. This is to be served from the table on a tray. Try to make it a day or so ahead of time so that it will slice nicely.

Party Sandwich Loaf

First get a loaf of unsliced bread. Slice it long-ways in order to have three long slices.

Next make three types of filling, one of ground ham, another of pimento cheese and the third a vegetable filling or any type that you like. Spread these fillings between the slices of bread and then take cream cheese and thin to a spreading consistency and ice the entire loaf.

Then you may decorate it on top as you like. This was decorated with pimentoes forming a poinsettia on top and served approximately 18 people.

Be sure that it is chilled thoroughly so that you may slice fairly thin slices. All that you need to go with this is a pickle or olive and a dessert and you have a very filling meal. Use a very sharp knife in slicing.

New Tax Exemptions

Coke County's 1956 Rainfall Totals Only Twelve Inches

NEWS RELEASE
Soil Conservation Service

The year 1956 has passed into history; and the lack of rainfall recorded some horrible stories upon the pages of time. The drouth was the most devastating the first 10½ months of the year when we received 5.7 inches of rainfall, according to unofficial records maintained by the Soil Conservation Service at Robert Lee. A total of 12.2 inches were recorded in 1956.

The rain received by months is recorded below:

Lack of any effective moisture during the growing season resulted in the shortest crops ever produced in the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

Landowners harvested only a few bales of cotton, did not combine any grain sorghum, or harvest any bundle feed. All the grain

sorghum died before maturing and most of it was grazed.

Not until October 15th was there a bright spot in the rainfall, when 4.9 inches were recorded during the next 15 days. The 4.9 fell in four rains with 1.9 being the largest rain. These rains fell in slow gentle showers that produced very little runoff. They have provided some good moisture where nearly all soaked into the ground.

Rainfall in 1956 added to the devastation of the drouth of the past decade. From unofficial records the rainfall received during the past eleven years is listed below with only 1949 receiving normal rains.

The landowner or operator does not have any power over providing rain, however, the condition their land is in when rain comes makes a big difference on the effectiveness of the rain; because it is the rain that we keep that counts.

During the rains in October, the moisture penetrated 40 inches, while on other soils with no cover or that had not been plowed the moisture soaked only 5 and 6 inches in the ground, according to A. V. Sheppard, Work Unit Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service.

March of Dimes Campaign Gets Underway in County

"Let's finish the job!"

This is the theme announced by March of Dimes headquarters here for the campaign that will be carried on through January.

The "job" is two-fold: To raise funds for repair of the damage that polio has done to thousands of Americans in the past and to prevent the disease from crippling more thousands in the future.

March of Dimes spokesmen explain that an estimated 80,000 per-

sons have been left handicapped by polio, throughout the length and breadth of the United States; and they point out that the job of conquering the disease cannot be considered finished until these patients have been helped to regain

normal and productive lives.

The second objective of the campaign is to promote the widest possible use of the Salk vaccine, which was developed under March of Dimes sponsorship, and which has been proven safe and effective many millions of times over.

Commenting on the 16,000 cases of polio reported in 1956, Basil O'Connor, president of the March of Dimes organization, said:

"We of the March of Dimes are determined that 1957 shall not see a repetition of the polio record of 1956. Even so, we know there will be attacks of the disease, and we must provide for the care of all who need it."

"We must also remember," Mr. O'Connor added, "those persons for whom the vaccine came too late. When we give to the March of Dimes, we are helping those who need help and protecting those who don't."

I. C. Oden, County Campaign Chairman, along with County Chapter Chairman Robert Vaughan of Robert Lee, has nearly completed the organization of personnel who will conduct the drive in Coke County. A few jobs remain to be filled, Mr. Oden said.

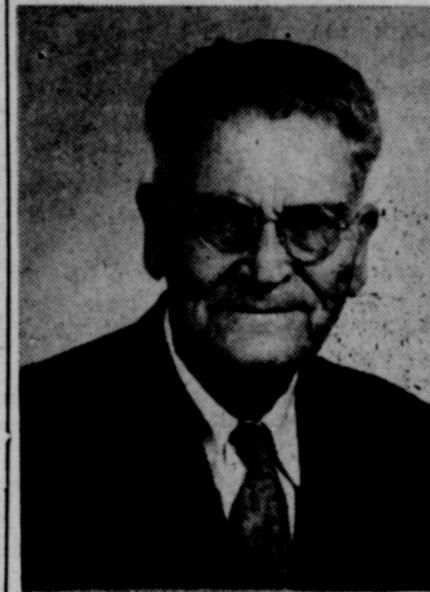

Phone Company Plans Big Year In Construction

A record 1957 construction budget of \$14,200,000 for General Telephone Company of the Southwest was announced today. The 1957 budget is a 20 per cent increase over the 1956 budget.

W. G. Wright, president of the company, said the largest expenditure will be for outside plant—poles, cable and wire—to extend the company's facilities in the 233 exchanges in which it operates. About \$5,500,000 is earmarked for this purpose.

Approximately \$4,300,000 is budgeted for central office equipment, \$2,800,000 for station equipment, \$1,100,000 for land and buildings, and \$490,000 for vehicles and furniture.

Wright pointed out that the company will convert 25 of its exchanges to dial operation during the year, will establish three new exchanges, and will replace equipment in eight other exchanges. At the end of 1957, 83 per cent of the company's telephones will be dial operated. Anticipated gain in telephones for 1957 is 15,500.

General Telephone Company of the Southwest operates 195,000 telephones in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana and is the largest independent (non-Bell) telephone company in the Southwest.

Considering construction budgets of the Texas Telephone Company and Oklahoma Telephone Company (other General System companies) the total construction budget for all three General Telephone System companies in the Southwest is \$18,400,000.

Returning and Exchanging Gifts

With every wedding, birthday, or holiday season, there comes the day-after-the-day-before—the returned gift headache. The season for returning Christmas gifts to the stores for exchange is now upon us.

Most business establishments are as cooperative as possible about this annual American pastime, but before getting into any arguments with a reluctant clerk or manager, better take a look at the legal situation involved. You may find that persuasion is more in order than demands for adjustment.

Department stores are under no legal obligation to take back a purchase and refund your money or deliver other goods in exchange just because you changed your mind. Most stores do make refunds or exchanges, but that is because it is their policy to do so—not because they are required to.

However, a promise to refund or exchange merchandise made by the store or salesman should be honored. Similarly, if a store

misrepresents the quality of certain goods or if the goods are defective, you are justified in expecting a satisfactory adjustment. But you have no more legal right to expect a store to refund or exchange because you change your mind about a purchase than the store has to ask you to give back the goods that were sold to you because it didn't want to sell them after all.

Suppose you buy a coat in one store and find that another company has it on sale for five dollars less. Must the store where you bought it take back the coat and give you a refund, or refund the difference in price? The seller is under no obligation to refund the difference, any more than he could make you pay the difference if he discovered that a competitor offered the same coat at a higher price than he had charged for it.

Much the same rules apply to the refund of deposits. Unless it is the policy of a store to refund deposits on articles, or at least apply the amount on the purchase of some other item, the buyer is obligated to go through with the terms of the contract, even though he has changed his mind about the purchase.

When one selects, orders, and deposits money on the purchase of an article, the store is under obligation to deliver the article in accordance with the terms of the sale. If the buyer refuses to accept the article or pay the remainder of the purchase price, the seller can take legal action against him, according to the terms of the contract.

The same principles apply to a trade-in allowance on used mer-

chandise towards the purchase of a new article. Such a trade-in allowance is considered the same as a deposit.
