11 WESTERN RAILROADS ANNOUNCE TRAIN-AUTO SERVICE OVER BIG AREA

An entirely new travel service, consolidating the high speed of the modern railroad train with the mobility of the private automobile, will be inaugurated May 1st by eleven leading Western railroads.

Complete arrangements for this train-auto service, which will place 2000 current model 5-passenger sedans at the disposal of railroad passengers in more than 150 key cities throughout the West, have been made between Railway Extension, Inc., and the following rail lines:

Burlington Lines, Chicago and Eastern Illinois, Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific, Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha, Great Northern, Illinois Central, Northern Pacific, Rock Island Lines, Santa Fe System Lines and Union Pacific Railroad.

Announcement of the new 'train-auto' service was made by Hugh W. Siddall, Chairman, of the Trans Continental-Western Passenger Association, on behalf of the participating railroads. He said the service was the railroads' answer to the prayer of the traveler who likes the mobility of an automobile at certain points but dislikes driving the long intermediate distances.

The magnitude of the project is emphasized by the fact that the railroads participating represent a total of more than 100,000 miles. Railway Extension, Inc., is headed by Edw. M. O'Shea and R. H. Rogers of Lincoln, Neb., pioneer automobile distributors in that state and experienced operators. Main headquarters of Railway Extension, Inc., will be in Chicago, with branch offices in many Western cities. It is understood that several popular makes of automobiles will be used in the equipment set-up and that current models will be supplied each year.

Under the train-auto plan, Mr. Siddall explained, a traveler may arrange for an automobile before leaving his home town, or after reaching the key city where he wishes to engage it. Advance reservations will, of course, assure the car being available when wanted. Railway Extension representatives will meet the passenger upon arrival of his train, where final arrangements are made. The basis of rates for the auto-

mobiles, which includes gasoline oil and maintenance as well as insurance protection, will be as follows:

- Eight cents, subject to following minimum mileages:
Per hour—10 miles (80c)
Per 12-hour day—75 miles (\$6)
Per 24-hour day—135 miles (\$10.80)
Per week—350 miles (\$28.00)
Per 24-hour day after 1st week—

50 miles (\$4.00)
6 1-2 cents a mile subject to minimum of 1000 miles per week (\$65.00)
The rental will be the same whether one or five persons occupy the automobile. Where passengers do not have an identification card, a cash deposit will be required.

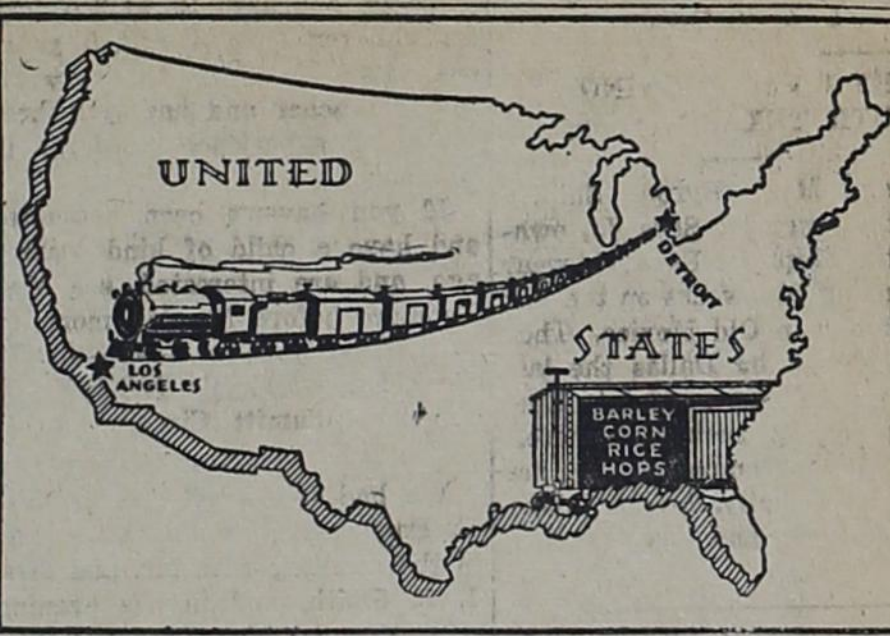

A News Want Ad Buys, Sells or Rents

Grains for Brewing Would Fill Train Spanning Three-fourths of Continent



AMERICAN farm products purchased by the brewing industry since beer's legalization in 1933 have reached a total of 25 billion pounds, enough to fill a freight train extending from Los Angeles to Detroit.

More than three million acres of farm land must be cultivated each year to raise the billions of pounds of barley, corn, rice and hops for which brewers pay approximately \$100,000,000 annually.

In 1933 alone nearly four billion pounds of these products were used to make the 55,191,103 barrels of beer, which the United States Bureau of Internal Revenue reports were produced last year.

These are among the developments recorded by the United Brewers Industrial Foundation in its annual survey of the brewing industry.

The past year also witnessed rapid expansion of the industry's program of active cooperation with local law enforcement officials to

eliminate anti-social conditions wherever they may surround the sale of beer. The number of states in which industry committees dedicated to this purpose are in operation increased from one to nine. Similar programs are to be installed in additional states during the coming year.

Direct taxes collected on the 1939 sale of beer totaled \$411,596,780 and averaged \$7.80 per barrel on the 52,768,818 barrels withdrawn for sale. This revenue is earmarked for old age pensions, educational institutions, public health, aids to agriculture and other special purposes in many states and municipalities. The remainder, including the Federal Government's share of \$267,642,983, is allocated to general expense funds.

The 1939 payments bring the total tax revenue collected by Federal, State and local agencies since beer's legalization to approximately two and a quarter billion dollars.
