A drillstem test in the Ellenburger developed flowing oil in Plymouth Oil Co. No. 1 Tidwell, Coke County wildcat five miles southeast of Robert Lee.

Operator tested the section at 6,124-6,170 feet, with tool open 45 minutes. It surfaced oil in 27 minutes, with no gauge or estimate made on rate of flow.

No water was made on the test. A full string of clean oil was reversed out of drillpipe. Flowing pressure ranged from 1,835 to 2,-365 pounds, and shut-in pressure in 90 minutes was 2,930.
