Cancer Crusade Collects \$116.75

A. J. Kirkpatrick of Robert Lee, county fund chairman, said this week that collections for the entire county amount to better than \$300. The quota is \$600.

Looks as though the automobile manufacturers of this country have taken a sudden dislike to small newspapers. Up until a few months ago, dealers paid in so much to the manufacturer on each unit sold, to be used for advertising, and the dealer had most of the say-so as to where the advertising was placed. It's all changed now. Instead of an advertising assessment on cars sold, the dealer now simply pays more for his cars to take care of advertising, and evidently doesn't have any say as to where the advertising is placed. In lots of cases, the local dealer doesn't even get his name run under the ads appearing in his hometown paper.

At any rate, The Enterprise during the month of April has not had one single ad from an auto manufacturer, except Chevrolet, and their ad schedule for April this year is less than one half of what it was for April, 1956—143 inches for this month as compared with 351 for a year ago.

We checked back in our ledger and found that we have been severely cut down or omitted by manufacturers, who used to be among our best customers. Last year in April Ford ran 103 inches of ads with us, compared with 0 this April; Buick ran 50 inches, compared with 0 this month; and the figures for Chevrolet are given above.

You're probably not interested in all this, but we thought perhaps it should be mentioned that this change in policy will have a tremendous effect on small newspapers all over the country. It has a definite bearing on the size and content of the small community papers.

Anti-freeze from the Fuentes 1957 Chevrolet, which spilled onto the highway, caught on fire. Service station attendants from Home Motor Co. and Texaco Service Station put out the blaze with hand extinguishers.

Mr. Knierim was taken to the Bronte Hospital for observation and shock but his injuries were not thought serious. About \$600 damage was done to the Fuentes car. Mr. Knierim's car is a 1938 Chevrolet.

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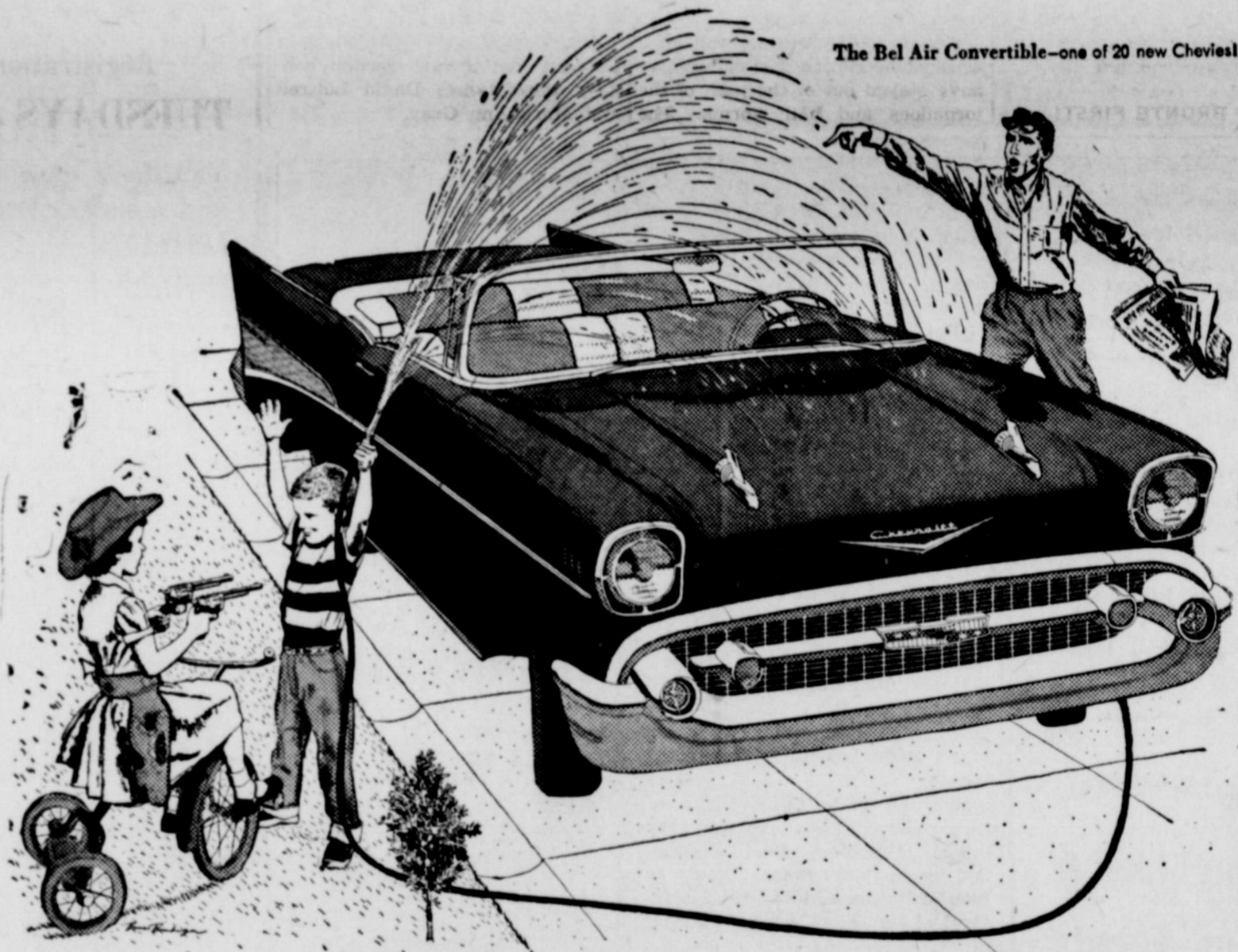
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Arrott Funeral Held in Colorado

This makes 12 to 15 big muffins or 24 tea muffins.
