

Three More Inches of Rain Fall Here During Past Week

3.4 inches of rain since last Friday. Latest moisture fell Thursday morning when exceedingly dark clouds engulfed this area and dumped .7 inch of rain in a short time.

Bulk of the rain fell last Friday when .3 inch fell during the day. A gully-washing 2.4 inches fell Friday night, bringing creeks up and doing some damage to fields in this vicinity.

Unofficials figures say that the Bronte area has received nearly 15 inches of rain this year.

Bronte has received a total of Oak Creek Lake **Goes Over Spillway**

For the first time in the history of Oak Creek Lake, which was completed in August of 1953, water poured over the 100-yard spillway Saturday almost 11/2 feet deep.

At 9 o'clock Saturday morning the gauge at the Sweetwater pump station showed the water level to be 2001.47 feet elevation which is 1.47 feet above the spillway level, which is 2000 feet elevation.

The heavy rains Friday night, ranging from 1.5 inches to almost 3 inches resulted in the overflowing of all creeks running into the lake.

Both Kaiser and Oak creeks were still pouring into the lake Saturday At that time, however, it was not expected that the lake would spillway is large enough to take care of a lot of water.

Lake keeper Walter Stapp and Ancil Nunn were trapped in the middle of the spillway Friday night about 11 o'clock. Stapp, driving a pickup truck, was attempting to guide Nunn across the spillway when five-foot waves caused from strong winds, drowned out Stapp's truck and Nunn's car. A wrecker was summoned and pulled both vehicles to land and safety.

At Blackwell about 1.5 inches of rain fell. However, a pump station northwest toward the divide guaged 2.55 inches.

At the concession stand east of highway 70 water from the lake had risen to within a few feet of the back door. A trailer was standing in water between the concession stand and the highway.

Several ravines around the lake were washed out cutting off entrances to many cabins, according to Stapp, who made a survey of the situation early Saturday.


Our personal bequests are as follows:


