Bronte Residents Using Over 300,000 Gallons Water Daily Before Rainy Spell This Week

Bronte resident had been using lots of water up until the recent rains, Water Superintendent B. D. Mackey said this week. He reported that he had been pumping in excess of 300,000 gallons per day up until this week when the amount fell to 84,000 gallons one day.

Mackey said pumps were running day and night before the rains. He said that having the new water tower up and in operation had helped tremendously during the past few weeks to keep plenty of water in the mains here.

Four more water samples were sent off recently and reports received from the State Health Department said they were all okay. Samples were taken at Best Service Station, Bronte Pharmacy, Home Motor Co. and Central Drug Store. Each sample was said to contain no harmful organisms.

Practically no complaints have been received by city officials the past two or three weeks concerning the peculiar taste and smell of Bronte water. Mackey said that the odor and taste are caused by decay of material in the lake which is at an all time high level. He said the condition should let up in a few weeks.

A daughter of a pioneer ranching family, she was born in San Antonio and came to West Texas with her parents, the late Col. and Mrs. G. G. Odom. She was married to John F. Currie in 1896 in Ballinger.

She is survived by her sister, Mrs. C. H. Wylie, who lives on the family ranch north of Bronte; one niece, Mrs. Arel Richards of Florida; two grand-nephews, Conda Richards of Bronte and Edmund Richards, also of Florida.

Mrs. Corley died at 3:25 a. m. Friday, July 19, in the Bronte Hospital after a long illness.

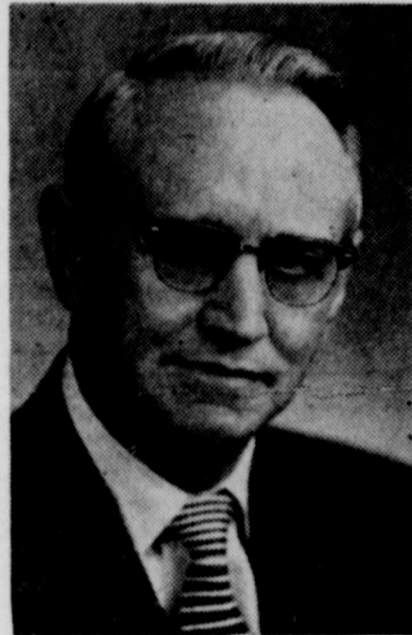

what's what by whatley

I can't decide whether a vacation is worth it or not. You work yourself to a nub before leaving to get ready for the good time that you are to have. Then when you get back, here you go again. Work has piled up a mile high while you were gone. You drag the water hose around and around the house to try to get all the parched grass back to glowing green; and all the clothes that could be worn while away are staring you in the face to be washed, ironed and maybe some mending to be done on them.

But this is still not the worst part of it; you visit with all your good friends and they feed you so good that when you come home and top the bathroom scales, only to find that several extra pounds have been added. You have been thinking all along that your clothes were going through a drawing up process. So — instead of going and buying a complete new wardrobe, you go on a dieting spree.

There is one nice consolation while all the hard work is going on; you can look back and think "those were two wonderful weeks well spent, and it makes you have a different outlook on life and appreciate your home more."

Before I give the recipe this week I want to make a correction in a recipe that I ran quite a few weeks ago. I did not notice the error until I visited by daughter recently and she had used it and I could see there was something wrong. When I checked over the recipe, I saw that the error was in the amount of flour given. It was the West Haven Chocolate Cake. I don't know who was in the wrong on this but I love to blame it on the printers. For I know that I could never have done it. Anyway there was a big mistake — so go to your files and change it, on your copy. Where it says 1/3 cup flour, then change it to 1 3/4 cups flour. If you don't you will have a pudding instead of a cake. I heard while I was in Bronte that a lady had made it and found out that there was something wrong.

For this week I am going to bring you a revised version of an old time pound cake. It is the moist and tastiest cake that you could ever make and it is ideal for these hot days as there is no icing. It is made with powdered sugar. The batter looks good enough to eat even before baking.

Powdered Sugar Loaf Cake

1 box powdered (confectioners) sugar.
1 lb. oleo (you may substitute 1/2 Crisco)
6 eggs
1/4 teas. cream tartar
1/4 teas. salt
2 teas. vanilla
When you remove the sugar

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from the box, then fill it with sifted flour.

Method: Cream butter and sugar and add one egg at a time, beating vigorously after each addition. Then add box of sifted flour which has had the dry ingredients added. When all the flour has been added, put in the vanilla and continue beating for several minutes. Place in a well greased tube pan and cook 1 hour 10 minutes at 325 degrees. Let stand in pan 5 minutes before taking up.

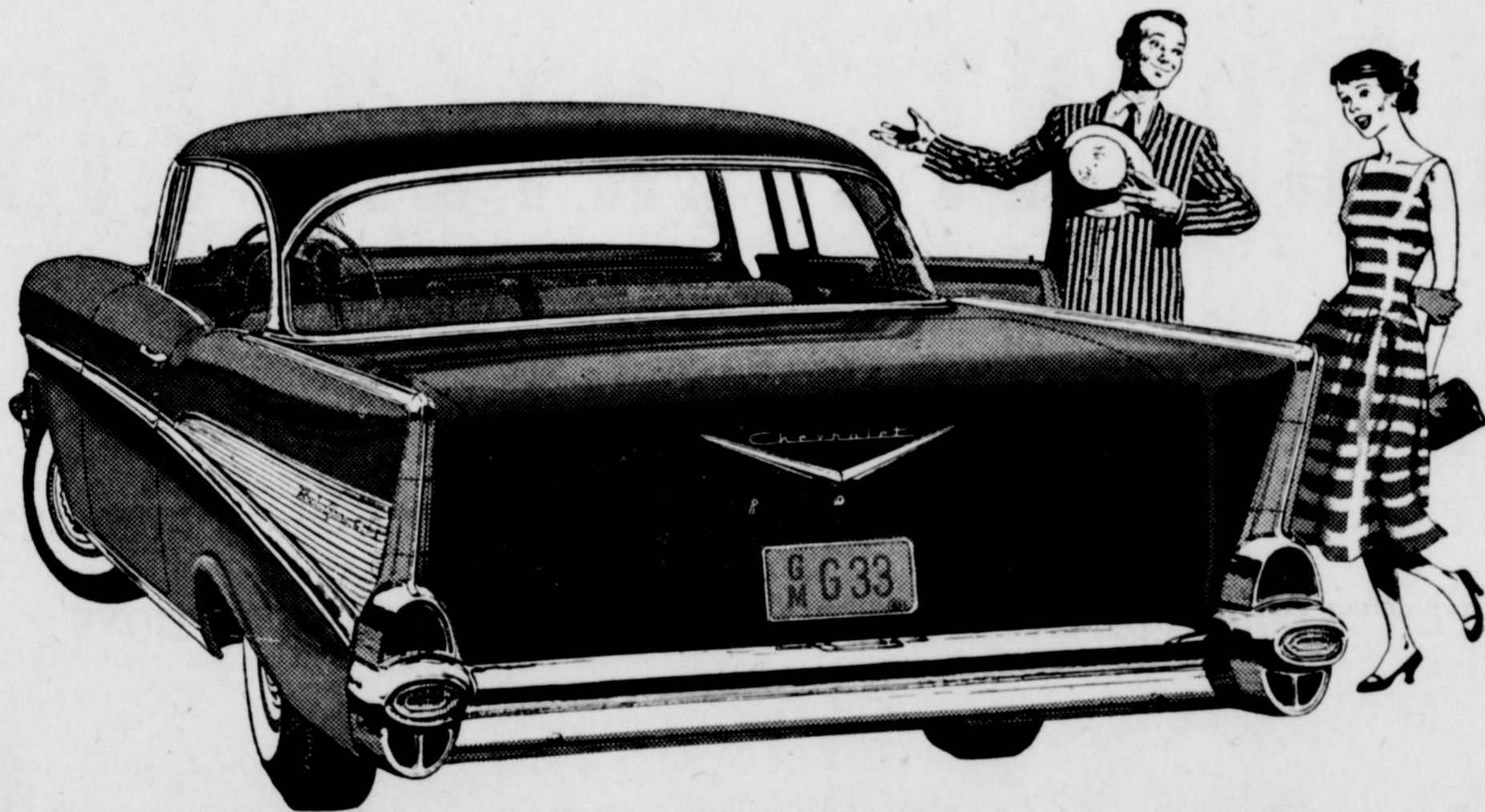

Now is the time for farmers to be sending in for a Federal excise tax refund on gasoline used for farming purposes. Internal Revenue form 2240 is used to obtain this refund of 3 cents a gallon, and it covers gasoline used during the 12 month period of July 1, 1956 through June 30, 1957.

This form should be completed and mailed to the District Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas,

1, Texas not later than September 30, 1957.

I have a supply of Form 2240 at the County Agents office and if anyone needs these forms or instructions on filling them out, please phone or come by the office and we'll be glad to help you.

Menard Cashier Spots Phony Bills at Menard

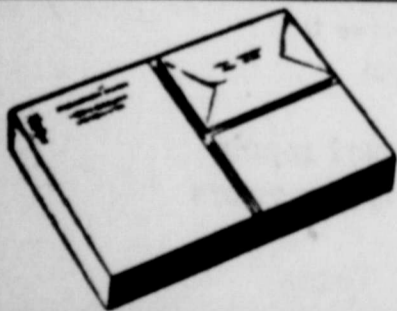

Farm Wages To Be Reported In January for '57

A field representative of the San Angelo social security office will make regular visits to Robert Lee during the next two months, according to a schedule just received from Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager.

The representative, Neil Tarvin will be in Commissioner's Court Room at 1:30 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 22 and Thursday, Sept. 19.

Farmers and ranchers and other employers of agricultural workers such as cotton gin operators, are reminded by Floyd Ellington, manager of the San Angelo office of the Social Security Administration of some changes in the method of reporting the wages of their employees.

In 1957, agricultural work is covered by social security if either: (1) Cash wages of \$150 or more are paid to a worker by his employer during the year; or (2) regardless of the amount of wages, if any employee works on 20 or more days during the year where the wages are figured on a time basis.

The total covered wages of farm workers are reported only once a year, in January for the preceding year to the Director of Internal Revenue. Ellington added that if employers keep an accurate record of the name, the social security number, and the amount of wages paid to each worker that will be all the information needed to complete the annual social security report.
