
Bronte Residents Using Over 300,000 Gallons Water Daily **Before Rainy Spell This Week**

Bronte resident had been using lots of water up until the recent rains, Water Superintendent B. D. Mackey said this week. He reported that he had been pumping in excess of 300,000 gallons per day up until this week when the amount fell to 84,000 gallons one day.

Mackey said pumps were running day and night before the rains. He said that having the new water tower up and in operation had helped tremendously during the past few weeks to keep plenty of water in the mains here.

Four more water samples were sent off recently and reports received from the State Health Department said they were all okay. Samples were taken at Best Service Station, Bronte Pharmacy, Home Motor Co. and Central Drug Store. Each sample was said to contain no harmful organisms.

Practically no complaints have been received by city officials the past two or three weeks concerning the peculiar taste and smell of Bronte water. Mackey said that the odor and taste are caused by decay of material in the lake which is at an all time high level. 
Our friends in the news room Mrs. J. F. Currie **Dies at Ballinger**
