Halloween pranks are lots of fun and have a long standing tradition behind them, and we feel sure the boys involved in this incident had no intention of doing the damage which they did. However, the fact remains that the damage is worse off.

The personal damage to the man and to his employer's property is the worse part of the whole thing, but the damage to the good name of our town is no small matter.

We'd be the last one to tell boys not to have fun-but a good question for them to ask themselves before they pull something is whether or not somebody is likely to yet hurt. Dangerous fun can turn into disaster- both for the persons having it and for the disinterested passerby.

Coke Voters Approve 3 **Amendments**

Only 252 Coke County voters turned out Tuesday for the special election, but they gave heavy endorsement of the three constitutional amendments which were submitted.

The county vote was:

- 1. State Employees Retirement Fund-For 142, Against 102.
- 2. Increase Old Age Pensions For 212, Against 38.
- 3. State Bond Issue for Water Conservation-For 199, Against 46. Bronte's voting box led with 66 ballots being cast. Robert Lee had 53 and Silver 27. There was only one absentee ballot, according to County Clerk J. L. (Chilly)

All three amendments were approved in the state-wide voting.



Soils and Range **Judging Contest** Saturday, Nov. 9

(SCS News Release)

"Soils and Range Judging Contest" will be conducted Saturday morning, November 9, 1957. on Earl Davidson's ranch on the divide. The contest is sponsored by the Board of Supervisors of the Coke County Soil Conservation District. The contest is open to Coke County 4-H Club boys and FFA students in Robert Lee, Blackwell, and Bronte High schools. The contest is designed to meet local conditions and to give the boys information on how to evaluate soils and ranges. The boys will classify two soils in the field as to depth, texture, slope, erosion and the rate the soils will take up water. They will also reccommend needed conservation practices to keep the soils permanently productive.
