

Bronte Takes on Class A Wylie In Non-Conference Game

A very regrettable incident occurred here last Thursday (Halloween) night. A man was seriously injured because of the thoughtlessness of some boys who thought they were having a good time. Halloween pranks are lots of fun and have a long standing tradition behind them, and we feel sure the boys involved in this incident had no intention of doing the damage which they did. However, the fact remains that the damage is done and Bronte's reputation with the men of the highway is much worse off.

The personal damage to the man and to his employer's property is the worse part of the whole thing, but the damage to the good name of our town is no small matter.

We'd be the last one to tell boys not to have fun—but a good question for them to ask themselves before they pull something is whether or not somebody is likely to get hurt. Dangerous fun can turn into disaster—both for the persons having it and for the disinterested passerby.

The rains have been the best thing that has happened to this country during the nearly ten years we have been in Bronte. In all probability the ground is wetter than it has been in ten years. The rains this week have been just what the doctor ordered for the bald pasture land in this area. Anything other than the slow drizzle would have caused some runoff, but the moisture this week has fallen so slowly that it had to soak in. Ranchmen are all smiles in anticipation of a winter with low feed bills.

On the other side of the picture, the rains will cause some trouble and expense, particularly here in town. We've been trying to promote a sewer system for Bronte for some years now, but the need for it has not been nearly so apparent during the years of drouth as it will be now. Drain lines and septic tanks are soaked up from the rains, leaving little room for the absorption of waste water.

Bronte's city council had another meeting with engineers from Fort Worth Tuesday night. These gentlemen recommended that, if the people here want a sewer system, as much of the expense of it as possible should be financed with revenue bonds, which would be paid off by the people according to their use of the facilities.

Wylie, always a tough competitor, has proven to be one of the better Class A teams of this area this year by rolling up six victories against only two defeats. The Class A Bulldogs do not have an exceptionally large ball club, but they carry quite a bit of speed and are one of the leading scorers in this area.

In previous meetings of these two teams, the Bulldogs hold an edge over the Longhorns. In 1951, the year of the first outing between the Longhorns and the Bulldogs, the Wylie boys soundly licked the locals 33-6. Again in 1956, in a game played at Bronte, the Bulldogs proved to be superior as they romped past Bronte 19-0. With Wylie being a tough Class A team and having the home field advantage, they will be a one or two touchdown favorite over the Longhorns.

For the third consecutive week, the Longhorns have been plagued with injuries, flu and bad weather. As was true last week, workouts for the local gridiron team have been cut short because of rainy weather. Only a few of the players show signs of having flu, but injuries have taken a heavy toll in the Longhorn's starting lineup. Tommy Latham is a doubtful starter this week due to the recurrence of a knee injury suffered in the Trent game. In last week's game, he was removed from the lineup late in the contest because of the injury. Dean Black, the Longhorns' first team fullback, will be lost to the Bronte team for the remainder of the season due to a concussion suffered several weeks ago. Tommy Bell, who missed last week's game, again will be out of the lineup. Bell is still nursing a dislocated collar bone.

Rainy weather sent the Longhorns indoors Monday as they were forced to hold their session in the gymnasium. Despite the fact that the Longhorns have been unable to get in a full workout, a good game is still in store for the fans who wish to travel to Wylie and support the Longhorns.

Bob Ragsdale Has Eye Injury

The condition of Bob Ragsdale, who was injured Wednesday in an oil field accident, was described Thursday morning as "fair," by his mother, Mrs. Charles Ragsdale, of Blackwell.

Ragsdale, who is an Humble employee in the Fort Chadbourne Field, was working with oil field equipment when salt water pressure blew out a gasket and the full force of the water struck him in the face. Most severe injuries were to his mouth, left cheek and left eye. He was brought to the Bronte Hospital where he received emergency treatment and was taken on to an eye specialist in San Angelo. He was admitted to St. John's hospital where his mother said he "rested fairly well" Wednesday night.

She said doctors still couldn't tell Thursday morning whether or not they would be able to save the sight in his left eye, but were hopeful that they could. She said he sustained no broken bones in the accident.

Mr. Bagwell died at his home during the night Sunday, Nov. 3, of a heart ailment. He was discovered dead in bed early Sunday morning. He had been in ill health for about three months.

He was born July 23, 1908, at Bridgeport, the son of Myrtle Prigmore Bagwell, and the late James W. Bagwell. In recent years he had been employed in oil field work.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Myrtle Bagwell of Big Lake; one daughter, Mrs. Rayma Rogers, Portales, N. M.; three sons, Dwain of Bronte, J. O. of Hobbs, N. M., and Don of Lackland AFB, San Antonio; and two grandchildren, Patsy and Mike Rogers, of Portales.

Also surviving are three brothers, Edgar of Sterling City, Aubrey of Big Lake, and Leon Bagwell of Gatesville; and three sisters, Mrs. E. H. Wood of Houston, Mrs. E. R. Hice of Dallas, and Mrs. W. E. Beaver of Big Lake.

One daughter, Patsy, died here in September, 1946.

F-M Road East of Tennyson Okayed

The Texas Highway Commission has taken the first step to inaugurate a new two-year Farm-to-Market Road Program for Texas, Marshall Formby, Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission stated recently. Money for this program is derived from the fund established by Senate Bill 287, Fifty-first Legislature.

J. A. Snell, District Engineer of the Texas Highway department at San Angelo, Texas, has stated that the following-farm-to-market road in Coke County is scheduled for work under this program:

From US highway 277, at Tennyson, east to Runnels County line, a distance of approximately 3.3 miles.

Mr. Snell stated that this year the Commission has authorized the development of some area roads which will serve the dual purpose of service to the adjacent land as well as aiding in the development of the entire area of the State.

It was announced that work will begin on this project just as soon as final planning is completed and right of way secured. Resident Engineer A. J. Jennings of San Angelo, Texas, will be in charge of the work in this county.

He was taken back to Robert Lee in the Clift ambulance where he was met by his employer from Colorado City and taken there. No further report on his condition has been available here.

Coke Voters Approve 3 Amendments

Only 252 Coke County voters turned out Tuesday for the special election, but they gave heavy endorsement of the three constitutional amendments which were submitted.

The county vote was:

1. State Employees Retirement Fund—For 142, Against 102.

2. Increase Old Age Pensions—For 212, Against 38.

3. State Bond Issue for Water Conservation—For 199, Against 46.

Bronte's voting box led with 66 ballots being cast. Robert Lee had 53 and Silver 27. There was only one absentee ballot, according to County Clerk J. L. (Chilly) Tinkler.

All three amendments were approved in the state-wide voting.

Longhorns Squeeze Out 14-13 Win Over Class A Santa Anna

The timely running of the extra points spelled victory for the Bronte Longhorns as they edged by the Santa Anna Mountaineers last Friday night by the slim margin of 14-13. The victory, a non-conference win, was the sixth, while they have dropped two contests.

The Longhorns, after trying all season to find a workable passing duo, finally succeeded in finding the combination that led to the Bronte victory. The combination of Tommy Latham and Benny Corley produced one touchdown while the same pattern set up considerable yardage against the Mountaineers. For the first time in many games, the Longhorns were not plagued by fumbles, as the Bronte boys played errorless ball while showing a strong running attack. From the other side of the line, the Mountaineers looked good on the ground as they managed to outgain the Longhorns, but their goal line stand was weak in stopping the Longhorns from scoring.

The Mountaineers opened the game like a house on fire as they returned the opening kickoff 53 yards to the Bronte 47. Bill Jennings started the drive with two carries that netted 15 down to the 32. Two more ground tries produced six yards and an aerial set the Mountaineers in scoring position on the Bronte 15. An off-side penalty set them back to the 17, but on the next play Donald Ray carried for eight to the nine. Eugene White then skirted end for nine yards and the score. Ray kicked the extra point to give Santa Anna a 7-0 lead at the end of the first period.

On the final play of the initial quarter, Robert Moore fell on a Mountaineer fumble on the Longhorn six yard line to bring a Mountaineer drive to an end and give the Longhorns possession of the ball. A running play was stopped for no gain as the Longhorns tried to move out into operating room. Latham then connected with Corley on a pass that covered 30 yards and a first down. Latham carried for 15 to

the Santa Anna 49 and Grace added three more yards to the 46. Latham gained 11 and Denman was stopped for a yard gain. Albert Grace then skirted end for 16 yards and another first down on the Santa Anna 23. Grace put two more carries together for 13 yards down to the 10. Latham swept left end for the final ten yards and the Bronte touchdown. Latham ran the EP to knot the game at 7-7 at half time.

Taking the second half kickoff, the Longhorns started a march that carried for 61 yards and another score. Grace hit the line for three and Latham passed to Corley for six on the 48. Latham then gained four yards through the center for the first down on the Mountaineer 48. Grace and Denman put two tries together for eight yards to the 40. Corley then went 20 yards on the reverse play, giving the Longhorns a first down on the Santa Anna 20. Latham and Corley carried for 11 to the 9. Corley then made a sensational catch of a Latham pass on the goal line as he fought off two defenders to make the catch and the score. Albert Grace ran the important conversion to put the Longhorns outfront 14-7 as the third period came to an end.

After halting a Longhorn drive on the 24, the Mountaineers drove deep into the Bronte end of the field. Moving all the way on the ground, the Mountaineers went to the Longhorn 21 before being halted.

Taking over on the 21, the Longhorns were thrown back to the 20 on a play that was stopped short of the line of scrimmage. On the next play, Latham tossed a pass that was intended for Corley, but Ray beat Corley to the ball and the interception was good for 22

yards and the touchdown. Ray attempted to run the extra point and was stopped short on the play that meant victory for the Longhorns. Moments later, the final whistle sounded and the Longhorns were outfront 14-13.

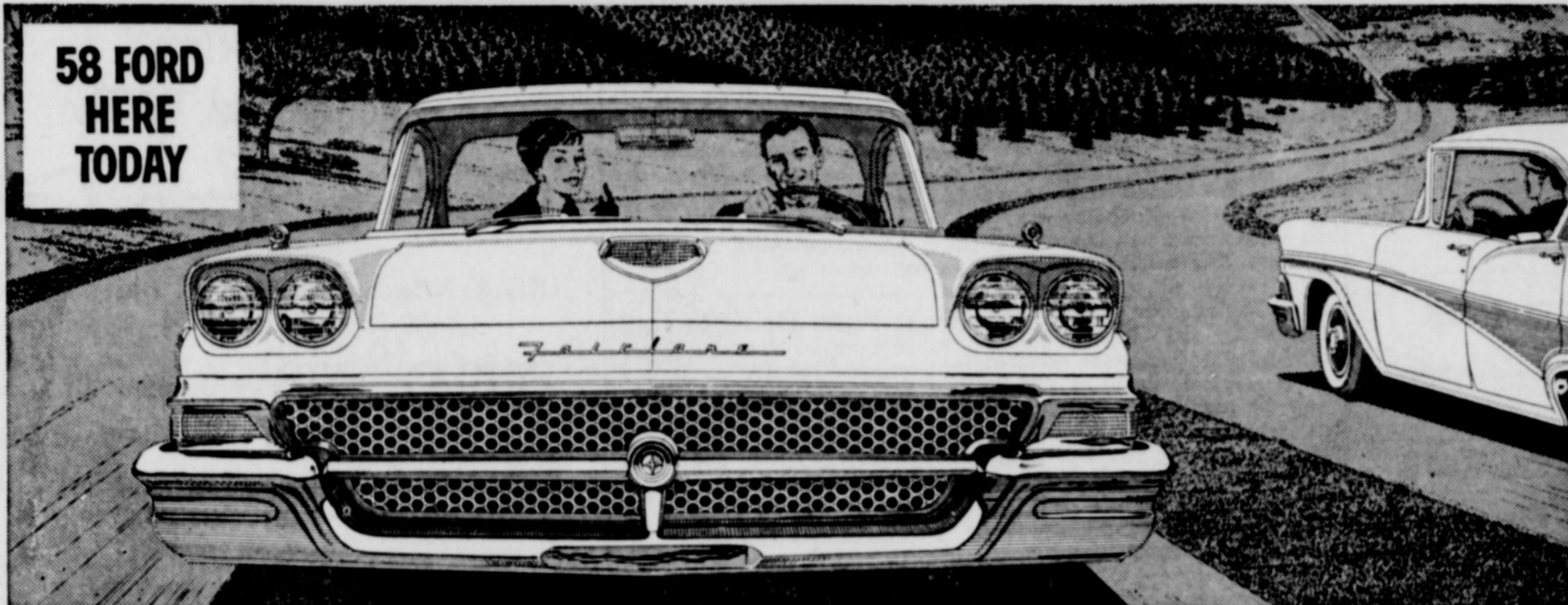
Luttrell Awarded Good Conduct Ribbon

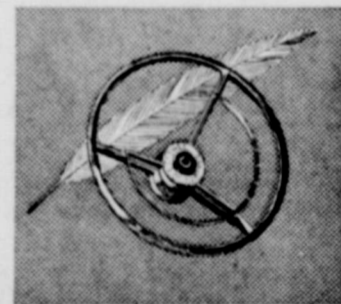

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Soils and Range Judging Contest Saturday, Nov. 9

(SCS News Release)

A "Soils and Range Judging Contest" will be conducted Saturday morning, November 9, 1957, on Earl Davidson's ranch on the divide. The contest is sponsored by the Board of Supervisors of the Coke County Soil Conservation District. The contest is open to Coke County 4-H Club boys and FFA students in Robert Lee, Blackwell, and Bronte High schools. The contest is designed to meet local conditions and to give the boys information on how to evaluate soils and ranges. The boys will classify two soils in the field as to depth, texture, slope, erosion and the rate the soils will take up water. They will also recommend needed conservation practices to keep the soils permanently productive.

The range part of the contest will include identifying 20 range plants and classifying them as to good, fair or poor vegetation. They will also make a range site determination and make recommendations for needed treatment to improve or maintain feed on the range.

As a last part of the contests, boys will place four plots of range vegetation as to condition and give reasons for their placings.

Although the contest is for boys, landowners and operators are invited to attend. C. N. Webb of Tenneyson said that it will be of interest to all ranchers.
