DaNell Dixon Coke County 4-H Gold Star Girl

Sewing, food preparation, gardening and home improvement have been the highlights in the 4-H club work of DaNell Dixon of Bronte. DaNell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Dixon, was chosen Gold Star Award winner for Coke County for 1957.

DaNell has been a club member for six years. She enrolled at the age of 9 and began her good work by making a skirt for the Dress Revue and winning a blue ribbon her first year. Since that time she has made 44 garments and 25 articles such as textile painted kitchen curtains and cup towels. DaNell won the junior Dress Revue in 1954 and modeled in the District Revue in Abilene. She was third place winner in the County Revue this year.

Foods demonstrations have been

an important phase of DaNell's club work. She and a teammate won district in 1955 and entered state in vegetable preparation. She won county in dairy foods in 1956 and won 3rd in district. She has prepared 434 dishes, and canned the surplus vegetables from her garden. She has given demonstrations to both 4-H and Home Demonstration groups.

Home improvement has occupied a big part of DaNell's time the past three years. She turned a basement storage room into an attractive bedroom. She painted the walls, made drapes, built a holly-wood headboard for her bed, bookcases from apple boxes, a dresser stool from a nail keg and two night tables from a discarded vanity dresser. 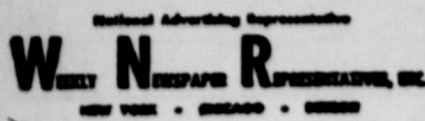
He had lived for many years on the Jaggars ranch holdings in Nolan County around Blackwell and Decker.

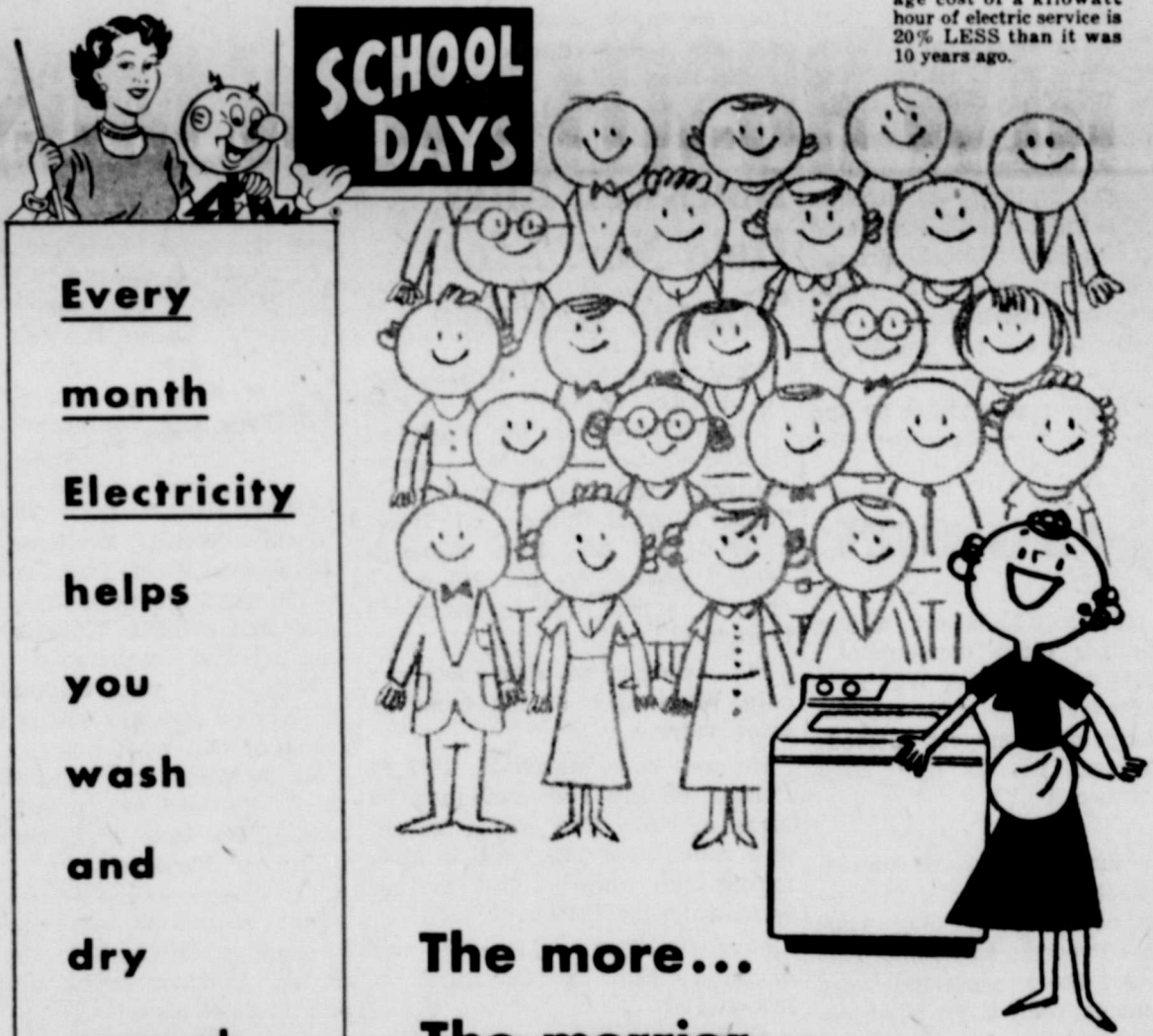

Press Box Chatter

The great football spectacle between Bronte and Robert Lee dates back many years before this generation's time. Ever since the beginning of this grudge battle, a heated rivalry between these two clubs has existed with some of the games being what would not be considered good clean football, and others of them have been good, clean, hard hitting games of football.

The grudge between these two schools does not stop with just the teams and the schools, but the townspeople had the same high spirit as the players on the field. Records at The Enterprise fail to date back to the beginning of the battle, since some of the files were

destroyed, but old timers of the town say that they can remember the scraps and tussles as far back as the early 1930's. In the rough and rugged days of the matches, the games were the final touch to a Thanksgiving holiday, but with the new ruling set up by the Interscholastic League, all regular season games must be completed by November 22. The last Turkey Day game took place in 1950 when the Longhorns traveled to Robert Lee for the contest. Since that time, all of the games have been played under the lights.

Until 1954, two games were scheduled between the Longhorns and the Steers with the first game of the season being a non-conference tilt for the two clubs. After the first game that took place in 1954 at Bronte, a bit of trouble started between the players on each team, and the state boys at Austin voted to do away with the first game and only allow the two schools to compete in one contest a year. All

down through the years, both teams have been placed on probation occasionally for uncalled for action on the part of both clubs.

Without the assist of the record books, the winningest ball club in these matches is not known, but it is considered that both teams are about even in wins and losses. Records dating back to 1946 show that the Longhorns and the Steers are all notted up with six victories apiece in the annual classic at the end of the season. Should the Steers come out victorious, the Steers would gain the bi-district playoffs due to the win from Hermleigh. Other than the Bronte-Robert Lee tilt, there are no other games on tab in this district as the remaining teams have finished their regular season play.

In games last week Robert Lee downed Loraine to give them a tie with Bronte for second place at

the present time. Hermleigh defeated Trent 19-7 while Bronte lost to Wylie in a non-conference game 6-0.

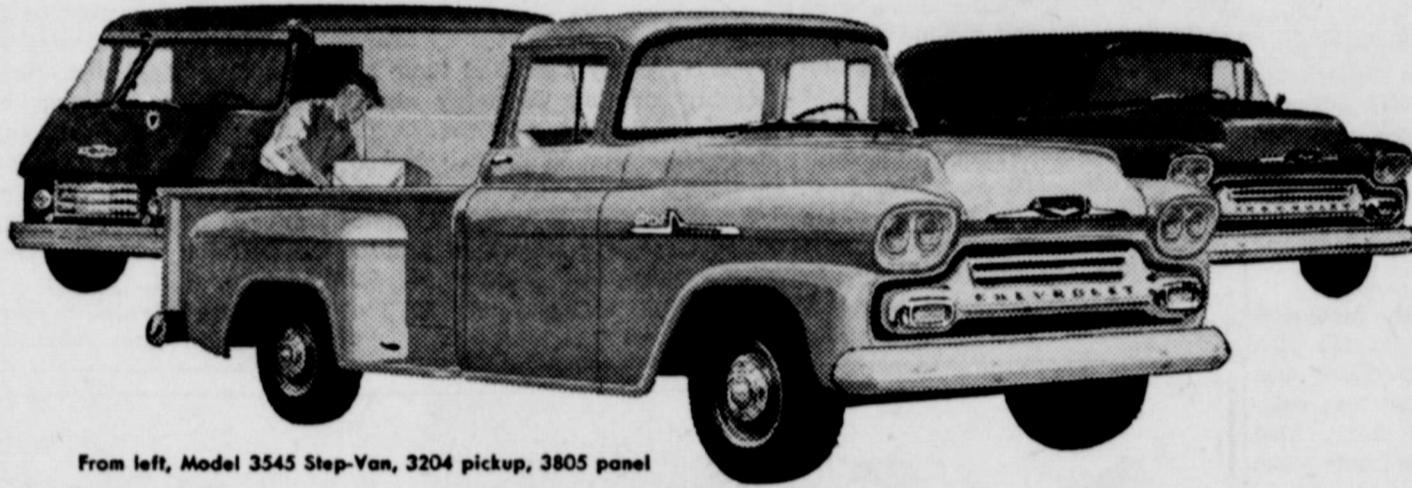

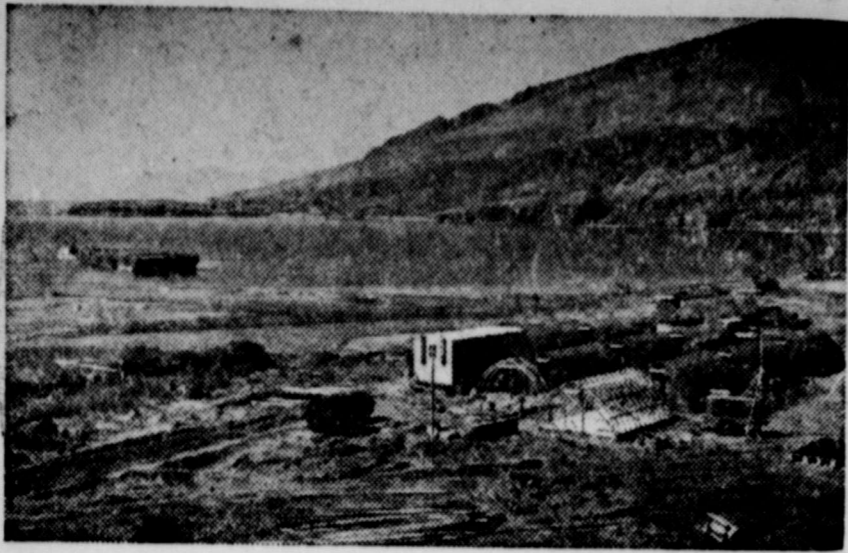

Longhorns Lose 6-0 Tilt To Rough Wylie Team

The battle of the defenses took place last Friday night as the Wylie Bulldogs downed the Bronte Longhorns in a contest that went to the team that made the best of the breaks handed them. The Bulldogs managed to roll to the 6-0 win on an intercepted pass late in the final period.

From start to finish, the defensive minded clubs held tight as both teams banged away at each other with fierce running attacks that produced small gains against the hard charging lines. Action was limited to mid-field play the large majority of the game as both clubs moved with good running power between the 20 yard lines, but when either team began to threaten, the defense tightened up and held with outstanding line play.

Receiving the opening kickoff, Joe Rex Shulle of Wylie scampered from his own 20 to the Bronte 40 before being hauled down from behind. Four tries produced only three yards and the Longhorns had possession on their own 37. Albert Grace put two carries together for 10 yards and a pass from Tommy Latham to BenyCorley netted 11 yards. Latham carried for 12 and the Longhorns were on the march on the Wylie 30. Four downs later, the Bulldogs took over on their own 35. The rest of the initial period saw two stout defenses throw the offensive team for minus yardage.

As the second period opened, the Longhorns held possession of the pigskin on their 22. Bronte managed to move out to the 37 yard line before being forced to punt. Taking the punt on their 26, the Bulldogs rode the flying heels of Shulle down to the Bronte 21 before being halted. The Longhorns gained two yards in three plays and then punted, giving Wylie possession on the Longhorn 46. Again using Shulle as their favorite carrier, the Bulldogs moved to the Bronte 15 before yielding to the stubborn Longhorns on defense. Four plays later the half ended with Bronte on their 23 yard line and the score tied at 0-0.

The second half kickoff was received by Bronte, but a fumble entitled the Bulldogs to the ball on the Bronte 48. Four plays and three yards later, Bronte was on the go from their 45. Denman carried for 11 and Latham added 14 to put the Longhorns on the Wylie 30. Grace managed to gain only a yard while Denman was thrown for a yard loss back to the 30. Latham managed to carry for nine

yards to the 21 where the Longhorns were forced to give in to the Bulldog defense. Operating from there, the Bulldogs moved across the 50 yard line to the Bronte 47 only to be held on downs and relinquish to the Longhorns at that point. Latham was good for 10 yards and Grace managed two as the third period came to an end. Grace carried for six more and Latham moved for 16 to the Bulldog 25. Grace went for three more yards, putting the Longhorns on the 22. A pass from Latham intended for Corley was picked off by Shulle, who headed for the side

line, and behind beautiful blocking, raced 92 yards to score the lone touchdown of the game. The try for extra point was missed and the Bulldogs led 6-0.

Late in the final period, the Longhorns managed to push down to the Wylie 14, but they would never put enough punch in their drive to cross into pay dirt. With the Bulldogs taking over at that stage, time ran out and the Longhorns were on the short end of a hard fought contest 6-0.

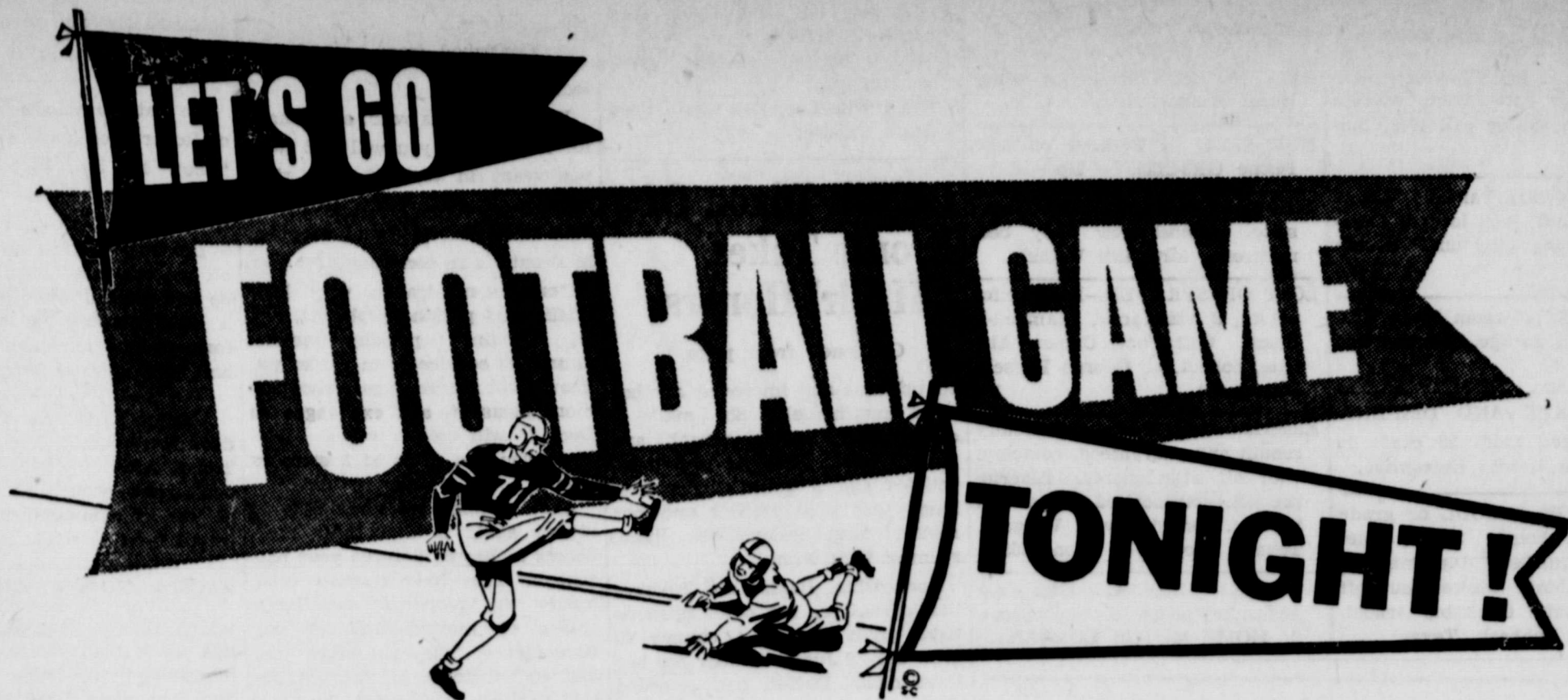
