Kickapoo Watershed Property Owners Invited to Meeting

All the landowners on the Kickapoo watershed have been invited to attend a luncheon meeting of the Bronte Lions Club today (Friday) at noon at the First Methodist Church.

Purpose of the meeting is to discuss the building of dams on the Kickapoo Creeks to lessen loss of soil and water and to prevent flooding of the area, including the City of Bronte.

The Lions Club has been pushing the project for several months,

particularly since the second devastating flood in four years engulfed the area Oct. 13.

Much interest has been expressed in the project which would be built under the supervision of the Soil Conservation Service.

Coke County Commissioners Court has agreed to set aside \$20,000 to make preliminary surveys if sufficient interest is shown. The money would come from ad valorem tax funds which may be used for such projects as flood control.

The dams and other necessary structures could be financed with a grant from the federal government, with the only expense to landowners being their contribution of land for the sites where the dams and lakes would be located.

Everyone who owns or operates land on the Kickapoo watershed is invited to be a guest of the Lions Club at the noon meeting today.

Coke Accidents Drop Greatly In November

Billy R. McElroy of San Angelo, district safety officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety, said Thursday that Coke County's accident record improved tremendously during the month of November as compared with October. Citing figures which his office has compiled, McElroy said there was no comparison between the two

months so far as being safe on Coke County highways.

"People are driving slower through Coke County," he said. The Texas Highway Patrol has had a man on duty here most of the month of November and finds, practically all for speeding, have totaled more than \$900.

McElroy said much of the credit for slowing down drivers on U. S. 277 was due to the work of local justice of the peace C. E. Bruton. He brought out that Bruton has been available at all hours of the day and night to deal with offenders.

"It's a big job for a man to get out of bed at 2 or 3 o'clock in the morning to fine somebody for speeding but Judge Bruton has been ready when we needed him," McElroy said.

"Highway patrolmen and other officers can arrest people for speeding all night," McElroy added, "and if they don't have a cooperative judge who is not afraid to fine them, it does no good. We are grateful for the fine work that Judge Bruton is doing."

McElroy gave the following figures concerning traffic accidents for the month of October in this county:

Fatal accident — 3.

Deaths — 7.

Injuries — 8.

Damage — \$7,325.

For the month of November the figures were as follows:

Fatal accidents — 0

Injuries — 0

Property Damage — \$445.

Only three minor accidents occurred in the county during November.

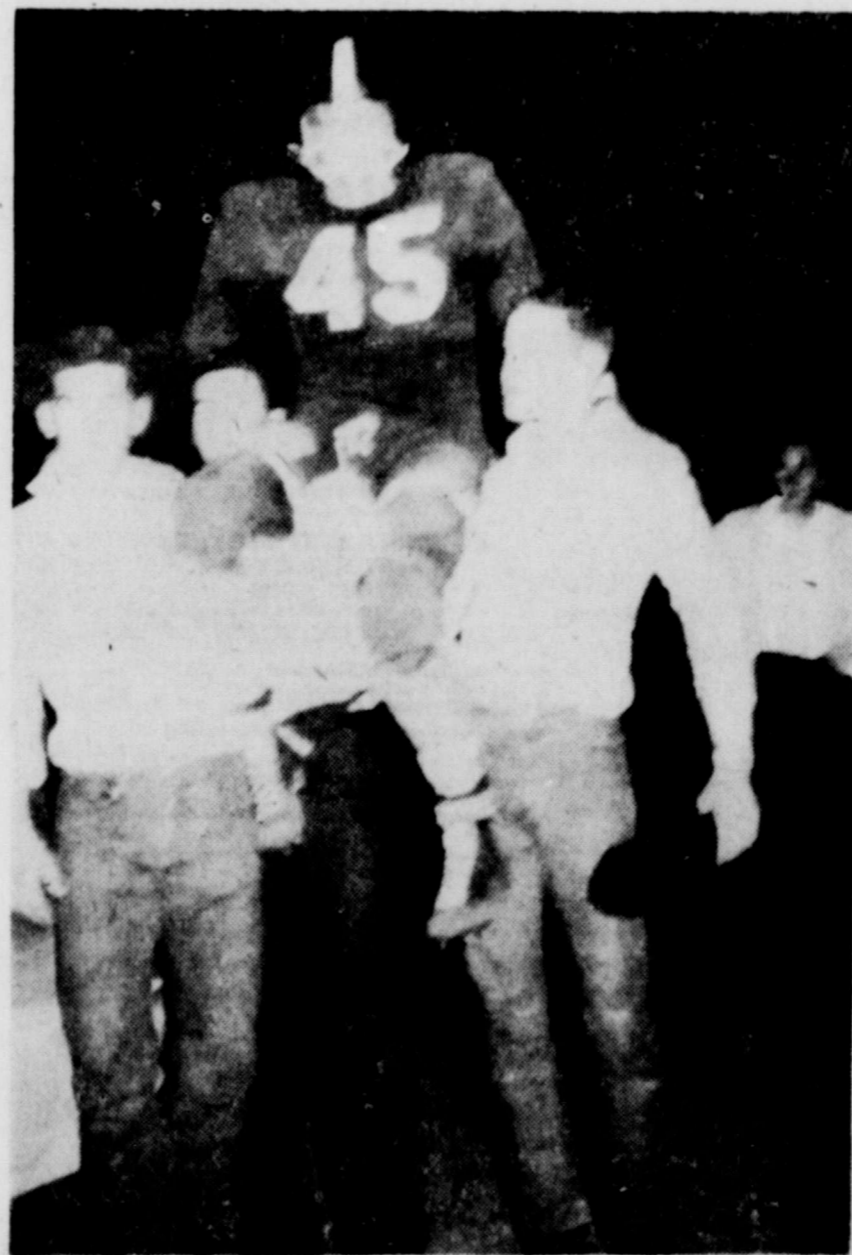

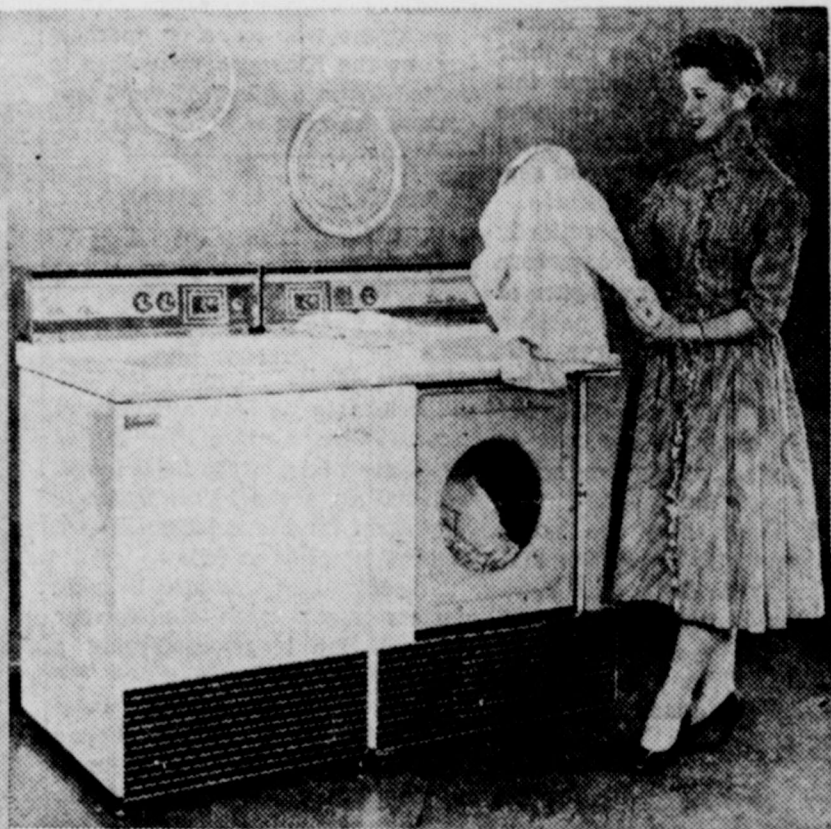

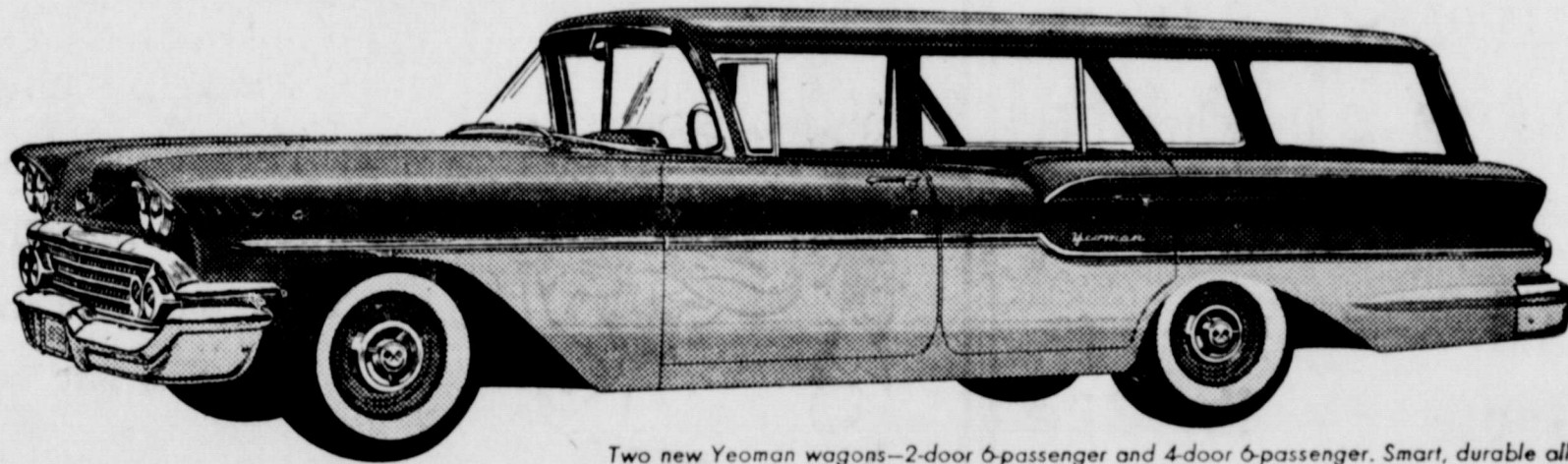

'Moonwatch' Station Now in Operation On Campus Of San Angelo College

(Editor's Note: The following article is reprinted by special permission from Flight Time, publication of Goodfellow Air Force Base. The article tells the story of the "Moonwatch" station set up on the campus of San Angelo College. Purpose of the station is to track satellites.)

Calibration of telescopes was completed just in time for teams to man the "Moonwatch" station Monday evening as Sputnik I tumbled across the sky in this area and to culminate almost nine months of thought-provoking planning to get the station into operation.

And for the first time, FLIGHT TIME can give its readers the "complete" story on the project including equipment, actual operation of the project, and the predicted information expected to be gained by the operation.

BEGINS WITH MEETING

It all began back on March 16, when Dr. Armand Spitz, National Coordinator of Visual Observers of Satellites, arrived at Goodfellow to present information concerning the International Geophysical Year at a meeting to organize "Moonwatch" stations in Air Training Command.

And Goodfellow's goal was reached Monday evening at 7:30 p. m., when the first actual satellite

was "tracked" by the station. Alpha II, code name for Sputnik 1, passed 30 miles northeast of San Angelo at an 82 degree angle and at an altitude of approximately 400 miles.

Between the symposium and the first actually-manned watch Monday, weather, late-arriving equipment, and confusion caused by sketchy information, plus technical knowledge which had to be solved, delayed the project considerably.

ON CAMPUS

The "Moonwatch" station is located on the San Angelo College campus some 100 yards west of Johnson Street and 250 yards south of the dining hall.

There are 36 M-17 telescopes mounted in rows of 18 each running in a line from north to south. They are atop steel poles 46 inches high and adjustable to scan the work area and a wind break, 55 feet long and 6 feet wide covers the entire horizon. A cement floor made of polyethylene plastic, encloses the entire area. A small building just west of the floor houses electronic equipment.

On the manpower ledger, two teams composed of 50 members each are on standby at all times to man the stations when a satellite is due. This includes a morning and evening team with watchers scheduled according to their best personal interest. In addition, an Air Force coordinator works with each team.

This, then, is the equipment, location, and manpower.

THE MISSION

The mission? Locate satellites, observe them, record their path and speed, then get the information to the Smithsonian Astrophysical Society in Cambridge, Mass., where the facts are compared with reports from some 100 other "Moonwatch" stations, compiled and logged for research.

And this is the procedure by which the mission is accomplished.

The wheels of action begin turning when Maj. A. I. Flynn, Project Officer, receives a message from Cambridge which may read, "ALPHA II VISIBLE SEVERAL EVENINGS SOON STOP FIRST PASS 25 NOVEMBER STOP SHORTLY BEFORE 2030 EST BUTTE MONT TO SAN ANTONIO TEX STOP."

Maj. Flynn then goes to a scale map, takes a ruler and draws a straight line from Butte to San Antonio. Next he takes a "Satellite Finder", a small transparent plastic shield calibrated with numerals to give the approximate angle above the horizon and the direction from the station the satellite will be visible, and determines the path of the "visitor."

NOTIFIES TEAM

When this is accomplished, he notifies one of his teams to report to the "Moonwatch" station at the appointed time. When the team arrives, it is given a comprehensive briefing and assigned to their telescopes.

The telescopes themselves are each pointed in a slightly different direction plotted to scan the entire predicted path of the approaching satellite. (Visualize a pin cushion cut in half from the top to the bottom with the pins sticking out of one of the halves all pointing in different directions and you will have a picture of the telescope arrangement.) By using this method, at least one of the watchers is almost certain to see the satellite and in many cases, as many as 3 members of the team will get to look at it for a brief instant.

Meanwhile, a short wave radio is tuned to WWV which puts out a

time signal every five minutes and this is connected to a tape recorder which records the time signals as they are broadcast.

On the steel mount of each telescope a bright red button is attached with wires connected to the tape recorder.

Now, all the watchers are absorbed in the task of peering through the telescope and the satellite is speeding closer and closer to the area covered by the scopes.

CONTACT MADE

Suddenly, a loud buzzer sounds and this is the signal that one of the watchers has sighted the satellite. The buzzer, which is connected to the tape recorder leaves its dramatic message on the tape along with the time signal.

When the playback is made here, a stop watch is set in motion on the time tone of WWV, then stopped at the first sound of the buzzer. By compiling the lapse of time between the two, the speed is determined. Then by reading the calibration on the telescope itself, it can be determined in what direction and at what altitude the satellite passed.

This information is immediately flashed to Cambridge where it is recorded and another bit of scientific information goes into the book for the United States.

Maj. Flynn announced that amateur astronomers, or any other interested persons, may obtain the Satellite Finder, the scale map of the United States, and a comprehensive book on using them for \$2 post paid. They may be ordered through the National Geographic Society, Washington, 6, D. C.

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They say ventilation is one of the main things to check. Poor ventilation can cause trouble in laying houses. Careful attention to weather reports will enable poultrymen to adjust poultry house ventilators before severe weather hits during sudden winter weather changes.

Draft-free circulation of fresh air is necessary to keep the litter and dry litter is necessary to keep down the number of dirty eggs. The cleaning of dirty eggs requires a lot of extra labor and may seriously damage the interior quality.

Provide at least two and one-half square feet of floor space per adult bird. Be sure each bird has at least four inches of feeder space and one inch of watering space. Each 100 birds will consume about six gallons of water per day.

A careful weekly check for lice or mites will enable the poultryman to apply control treatments before a heavy infestation of these parasites can reduce egg produc-

tion of the flock.

County Agents News Column

INCOME TAX GUIDE

Income tax is a bad subject to start on, but the time for filing your 1957 Federal Income Tax is just around the corner. We have received a supply of the 1958 Farmers Tax Guide. If you want a copy, drop by the office or write or call us and we will mail you a copy.

The 1958 version is written in easy to understand language with many income and social security tax items covered in detail. Also, a number of sample tax forms are shown for the guidance of operators seeking first hand information or "know how."

We have a limited supply of the guides. If you need one, give us a call.

NEW EGG LAW

We would like to again remind the poultry operators and retail stores of the egg law that is now in effect. No enforcing of the law has occurred as yet, but will in the near future. Store owners are required to have a retail license and also a dealers license if they sell

eggs to persons other than consumers.

Retailers are also required to meet certain other specifications within their store or stores.

Poultry owners need no license if they claim no grade. If they claim a grade they are considered to be a wholesaler and are required to have a wholesaler's license. In addition, his produce or eggs must meet U. S. D. A. standards for grade eggs, depending on what grade he claims. We have license application blanks if you need one on which to make application for a license.

WILL HOLD SCHOOL

I might add that we plan to conduct an egg grading school sometime after the first of the year. The State Department of Agriculture will help with the school. We as yet have not been able to schedule a date with them, but tentative plans are for the school to be held in late January. If you are a producer or retailer interested in egg grading, watch for a notice on the school. We will try to notify all of you when a definite date has been scheduled.

The poultry specialists have passed on a few pointers on management during the winter that should interest poultrymen.

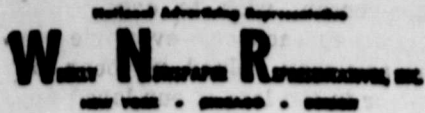

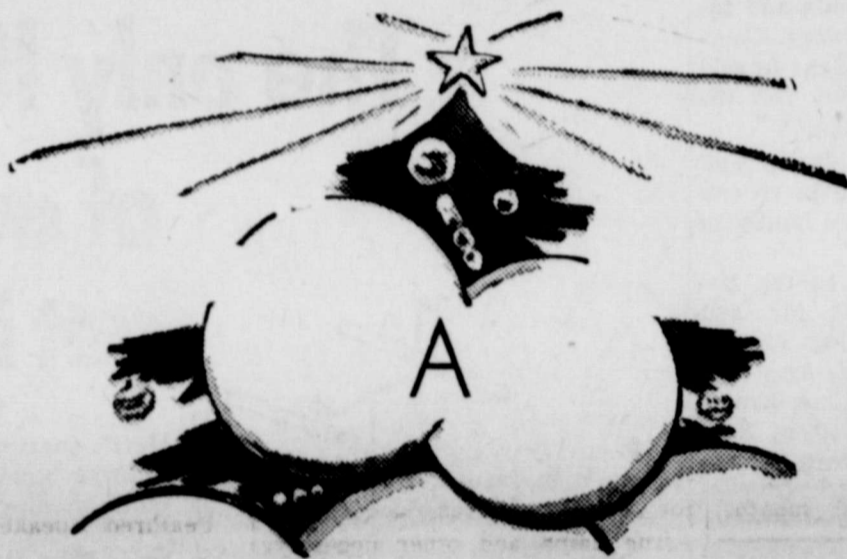

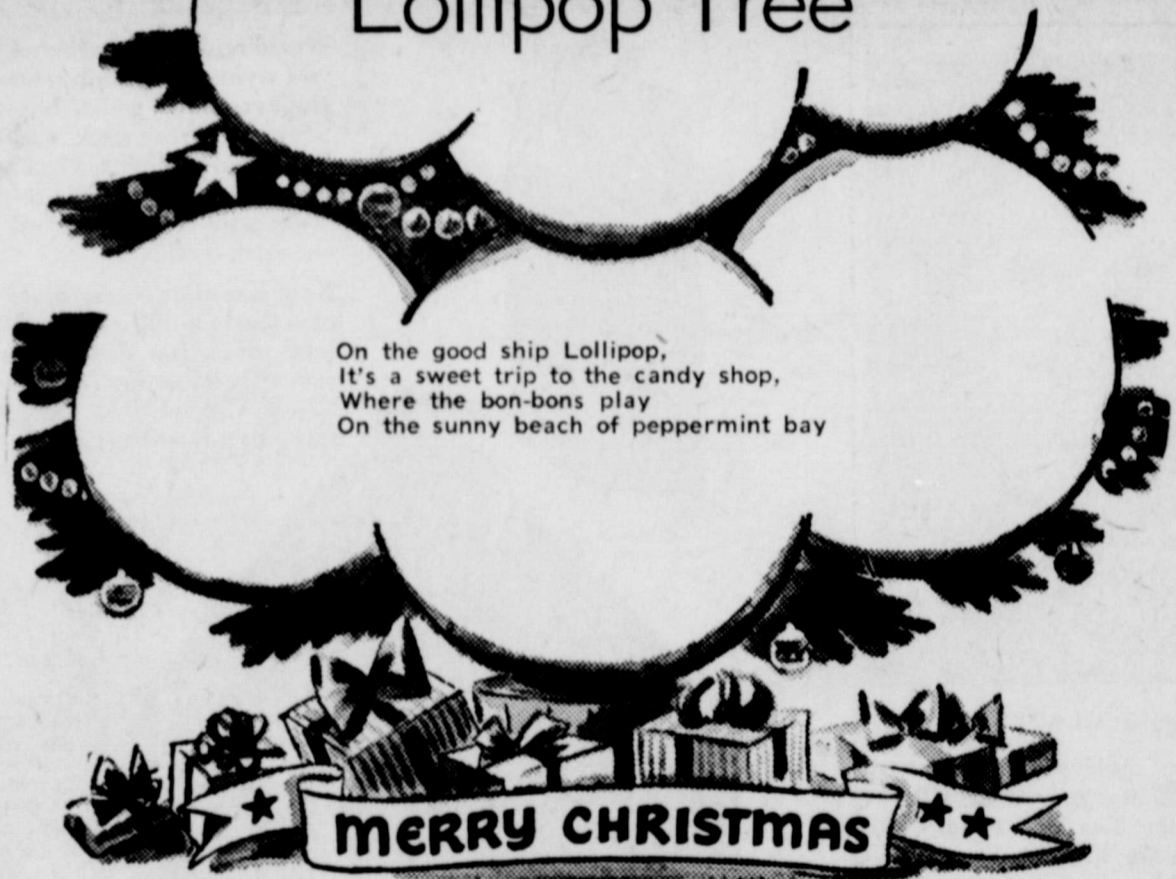
