## City Politics Picks Up As 3 More Council Candidates File

The city political situation perked up considerably this week when three more candidates announced they would run for places on the city council. Their announcements bring the total number of candidates for the three vacancies to five. Two of the incumbents had

### AD-LIB-BEN

This year of more than usual political activity, even at this early date, brings to mind something we've been harping on for the past ten years we've been in Bronte. We believe that you, as the electors of our county, precinct, city and school officers, should sound-out candidates for all offices as to how they feel on spending your and my tax money at home. We believe that you should consider how they feel about this matter when you cast your ballot at the various elections scheduled in 1958.

We believe it is even more important that public officials channel as much tax money as possible into local business firms than it is for individuals. We think everyone who is interested in the growth and welfare of this county and area should spend his money here; but when you get right down to it, every individual has the right to spend where he wishes, for he is spending his own money. On the other hand, public officials are not spending their money; they are spending your money.

We had a situation in Coke County rather sharply brought to our attention last weekend when we set the type for the county audit which appears in this week's paper.

Being particularly interested in our own business, we noted that in 1957 Coke County spent \$5,581.82 for office supplies, which we understand includes printed matter used, such as forms, letterheads, envelopes, etc. Of this amount, \$168.32 was spent with The Enterprise. Since we are the only firm in the county which undertakes to handle office supplies, and there is only one other printer, The Robert Lee Observer, in the county, we figure that approximately \$350 of the better than 5½ thousand dollars was spent in Coke County. This is based on the assumption that The Observer got as much business as we did.

Actually the whole sum of \$168.32 didn't come from offices of the county. Local Justice of the Peace C. E. Bruton bought \$32.98 worth of that amount, and the county paid for it.

Another \$357.20 was spent with The Enterprise for legal notices (\$27.20); the annual audit (\$200.00); two quarterly statements \$60.00; (The Enterprise and Observer alternate running the four statements); a page ad during Oil Progress Week (\$50.00); and an ad setting forth the rules governing the two county parks, here and at Robert Lee (\$20.00). However, this money is not included in the \$5,581.82 office supply bill. Another entry in audit under the heading of advertising totaled \$753.56, and this amount should account for our advertising and a similar amount in The Robert Lee Observer.

We made a few calculations on this matter and hope that some Coke County firms did better than

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already announced they would seek re-election.

H. A. Springer, Joe George Wilkins and C. E. Bruton filed their names with Mrs. Helen Kirkland as candidates for councilman. Bill Thomas and Ben Oglesby, who are on the council now, filed for re-election during January.

Two candidates have announced for mayor. They are Dr. John R. Harris and J. A. Stephenson. Both of them filed their names with the city secretary several weeks ago.

Deadline for candidates to file is Saturday, March 1. Anyone who wants his name to appear on the printed ballot must file at the city hall by that date. Any qualified voter who is a bona fide resident of the city is eligible to run.

The election, in which a mayor and three councilmen will be elected, has been set for Tuesday, April 1. The election will be held in the city hall, with D. K. Glenn serving as election judge.

The other councilman now serving, Charlie Boecking, did not seek re-election. Neither did Mayor Ernest Ivey. Both are candidates for county offices.

Only two candidates have filed for trustee on the Bronte School board. Hurlin Lee, secretary of the board, said Thursday morning that the petitions requesting the names of Jacob B. Morrow and Allen Sherrod be placed on the ballot are the only ones that have been turned in to him. Both of them are presently serving on the board.

Deadline for filing for trustee is Thursday, March 6. Any qualified voter residing in the school district is eligible to run for one of the offices. A candidate may place his name on the ballot by filing with the board secretary, or his name may be filed by petition signed by five qualified voters. Candidates' names may also be filed with the county judge.

## School Officials Attend Area Meet

Administrators from the local school attended the area administration meeting in San Angelo Wednesday, Feb. 19. The group met in the Board meeting room.

Dr. Barry, Texas University instructor and Texas Education Agency Accreditation inspector, was the main speaker. Main point expressed by Mr. Barry was that he felt too much emphasis is now being placed on the improvement of science and math courses offered in local schools.

"We must not overlook the whole program of education," he said. He went on to say, "An expert on education is one that knows all the answers, but did not quite understand the question. In regard to the Russian educational program, they educate 10% of their population while we try to educate all of our children."

He said that he believed that the 10% of exceptional people have been and are still in the masses of people and went on to say "that he was continually surprised, during his visitations, at what a good job most schools, particularly the ones with less than 20 teachers, were doing."

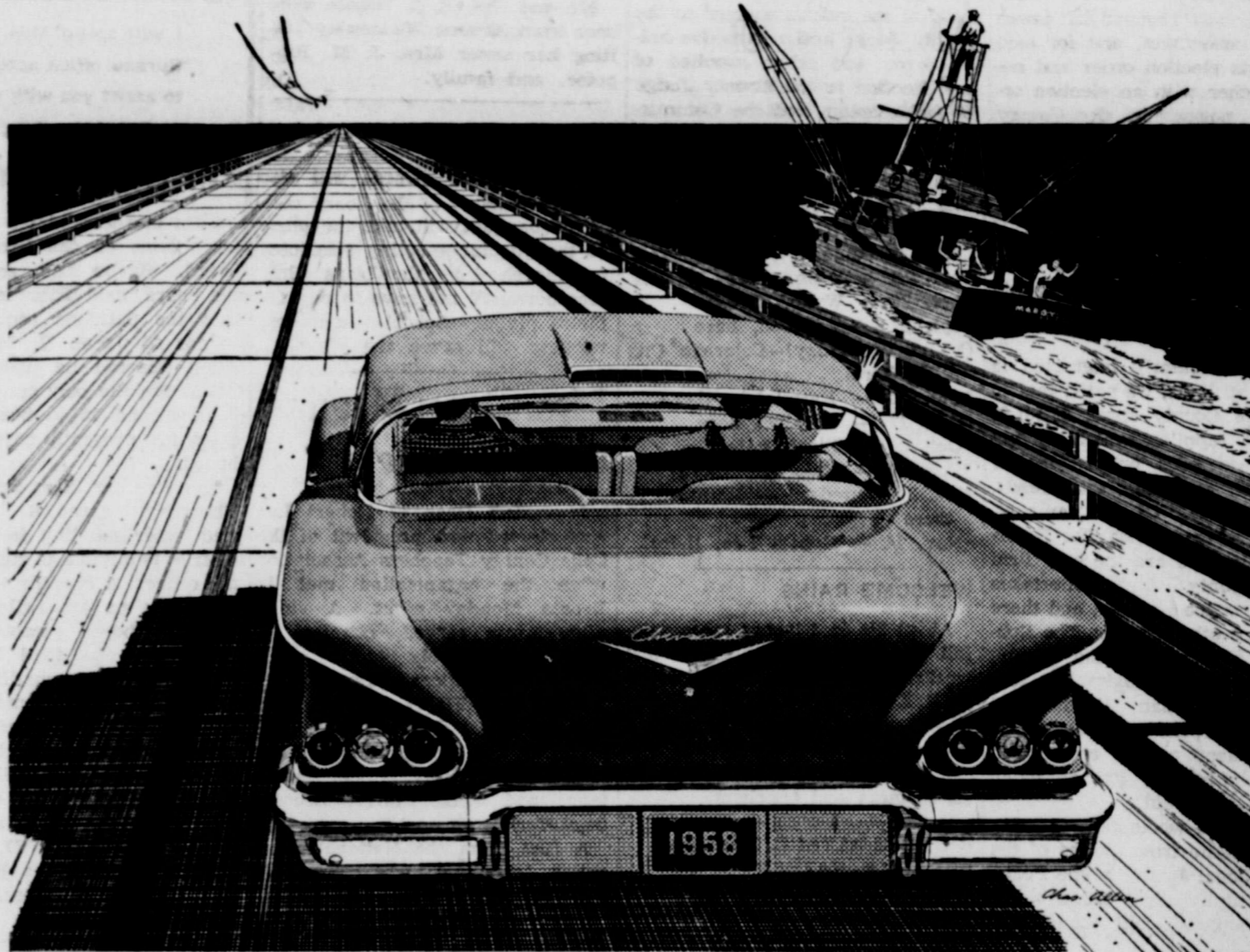

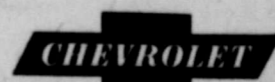

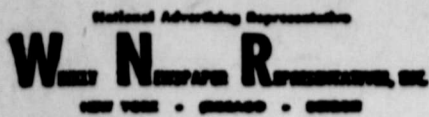

**NOTICE OF ELECTION**  
**THE STATE OF TEXAS**  
**COUNTY OF COKE**

On this the 13th day of February, 1958, the Board of Trustees of the Bronte Independent School District convened in regular session with the following members present, to-wit: Jacob B. Morrow, president, L. F. McCutchen, Joe Rawlings, Allen Sherrod, J. M. Rippetoe, Hurlin Lee constituting a quorum, and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

WHEREAS this school district has fewer than 500 scholastics and is subject to the terms and provisions of Article 2746a; and

WHEREAS on the first Saturday in April, 1958, being April 5th, 1958, a trustee election will be held in said School District for the purpose of electing two (2) members to the Board of Trustees of said School District, and

WHEREAS the statutes of the State of Texas do not clearly provide the procedure to be followed in trustee elections of an Independent School District for fewer than 500 scholastics, and for said reason this election order and notice, together with an election order and notice by the County Judge of this county should be passed to eliminate any question concerning said election;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BRONTE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

That an election be held in said School District on April 5th, 1958, for the purpose of electing two (2) members to the Board of Trustees of said District.

That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon

the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and filed with the County Judge of the county and the Secretary of the local School Trustees at least thirty (30) days before the date of said election.

That said election shall be held at the following place and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election.

At City Hall building in Bronte and at Tom Green Store at Tennyson, Texas, in said School District with D. K. Glenn as Presiding Judge and Mrs. Tom Green, Tennyson and any other clerks as needed.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed as near as may be by the Election Code of this state, and the County Judge shall furnish, at the expense of this School District, all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

Immediately after said election has been held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the results thereof to the County Judge and return the ballot boxes and other supplies of said election to the County Judge for safekeeping, and the Commissioners' Court shall canvass the returns of said election and notify the candidates and this Board of Trustees of the results thereof.

A copy of this order, together with the order by the County Judge, shall serve as notice of said election, and be posted in three different places in said School District, which posting shall be done not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of said election.

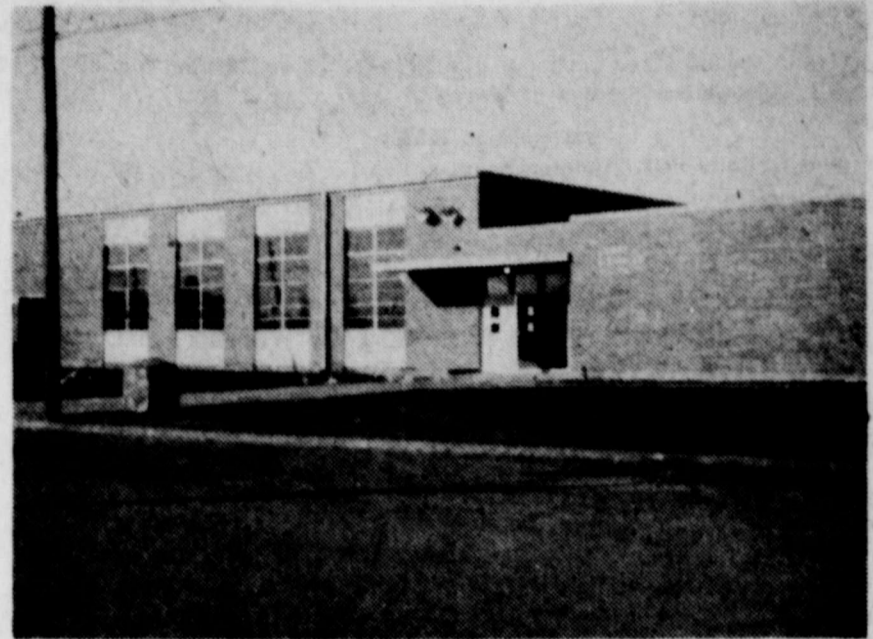

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

J. S. Walker, rancher near Silver, is presently constructing net wire diversions on his ranch northeast of Silver. The diversions are designed to spread concentrating runoff water over adjacent flat rangeland without destroying existing vegetation near the diversions.

Advantages of this type diversion over earthen structures are: the net wire diversions do not destroy existing vegetation while they are being established as do the earthen diversions.

Another advantage is that the wire structures can be relocated when the need arises and they require little maintenance.

Food for Thought in Range Conservation — When soil temperature is 70 degrees F., grasses use all available moisture for growth. When soil temperature is 100 degrees, grasses use 75 percent of the moisture for growth and 25 percent to keep cool.

Oxygen carried into the soil by rainfall is almost as beneficial as the water itself. Seventy percent of root storage produces only 10 percent of the new top growth in the Spring.

It is estimated that 71 percent of the total annual precipitation is returned to the atmosphere through evaporation and transpiration.

we did. Of the amount spent for office supplies, The Enterprise was given 3.1 per cent of the business. Assuming that a similar amount was spent in Robert Lee, that makes 6.2 per cent spent locally.

If the other \$380,000.00 spent by the county in 1957 was handled by the same ratio, only about \$24,000 was spent in this county, leaving over \$350,000 being sent away from here. Of course, we feel sure that this was not the case; but after examining this audit and Coke County's sheet in our ledger, it makes us wonder if any effort is being made to spend tax money locally.

When you consider the entire workings of, and money handled by, tax supported institutions in this county (county and city governments and schools) you must realize that the problem we have posed for you in this column is a big one and a serious one. Local spending of tax money can have a tremendous effect on our economy in this county.

So, as we began, we feel that you should consider the candidate's attitude on this matter when you vote for your city, school, precinct and county officials during this election year.

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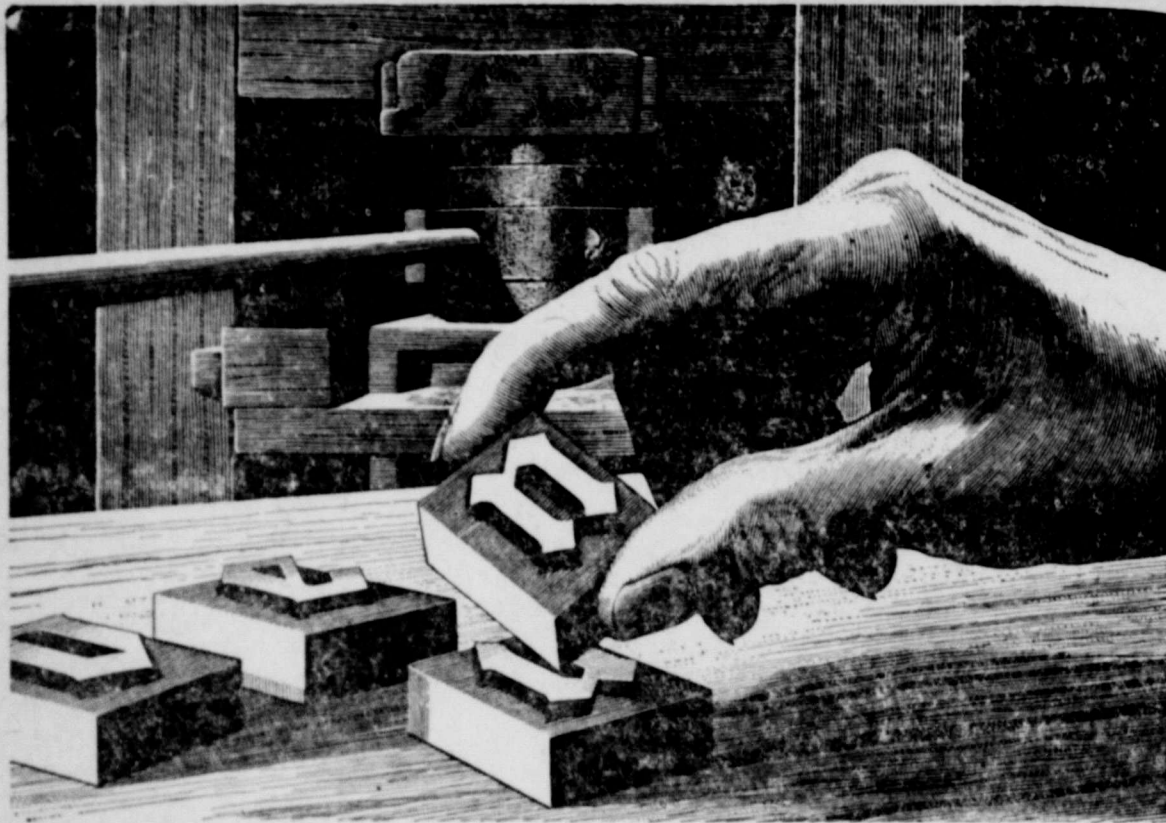
