Improvements Being Made at Oak Creek Lake

As the spring and summer season approaches, many persons who own cabins at Oak Creek Lake are making improvements in their holdings at the lake ten miles north of Bronte.

Improvements are also planned in the roadways around the lake and in recreational facilities.

Officials of the City of Sweetwater say that with the lake at its capacity level, they expect a great deal of activity in fishing, boating, picnicking and water sports this spring and summer.

Concession rights at the lake have been sold to Ancil Nunn of Amarillo to E. L. Karr of Kansas

City and he plans extensive improvements to the property and equipment.

Activity is also expected to get underway this year toward meeting the 1962 target date for completing the first segment of West Texas Utilities Co.'s multi-million dollar power plant at Oak Creek Lake.

Among the future plans is the proposal to raise the spillway level of the lake four feet when the need arises. This would increase the lake's capacity to 50,000 acre feet.

Water from Oak Creek Lake is used to supply municipal water for Bronte, Sweetwater, Blackwell, Roby and Trent. The Coke County lake also furnishes water for the Lone Star Producing Co. plant and will supply water for cooling the turbines of West Texas Utilities Co. generating plant.

March 31 Last Day To Buy Car License

Coke County residents had purchased 640 new licenses for passenger cars up to Wednesday at mid-morning, according to records in the office of Paul Good, sheriff and tax assessor-collector.

That is just about one-half the number that are expected to be registered before the April 1 deadline.

New 1958 tags for Coke County farm trucks reached 149, while 123 licenses for commercial trucks had been issued.

Auto licenses are 10% higher this year, the increase having been voted by the last legislature.

Sheriff Good advises motorists to also see about getting their cars inspected for this year. Deadline for having the 1958 stickers is April 15.

Easter Egg Hunt Will Be Held at Bronte Co. Park

Aubrey Denman, caretaker of the county park here in Bronte, announced this week that there will be an Easter egg hunt at the park on Easter Sunday for all the children in the community. The hunt will start at 3 p. m.

Actually there will be three egg hunts, one for pre-school age children, one for children from six to nine years old, and one for children over nine years old.

Denman said there will be a number of prize eggs mixed in with those which are hidden. Local merchants are being lined up to furnish prizes for the event, he added.

Denman invited every child in this area to make plans to attend the big hunt.

Absentee Ballots Ready for Use

Ballots for the forthcoming school trustee and city officials elections have been printed and anyone who will not be able to come to the polls on election days may now vote absentee.

Those who wish to vote absentee in the school election should write the county judge's office in Robert Lee and request a ballot, while those wishing to vote in the city election should write to the city secretary. Persons who are going to be out of town on the election days may also go by the two offices and vote absentee.

Rather small interest has been shown so far in the school trustee election, with only two candidates out for the two vacancies.

The city election, on the other hand, is stirring up quite a bit of interest, with two candidates running for mayor and five for the three vacancies on the city council.

He has been raising hogs for more than 20 years and the best he ever made was \$400 until this year, when he got \$1,000 for not raising hogs. If I can get \$1,000 for not raising 50 hogs then I will get \$2,000 for not raising 100 hogs.

Rev. Curtis Carroll of Dallas, editor of the Baptist Progress, will deliver the sermon for the evening.

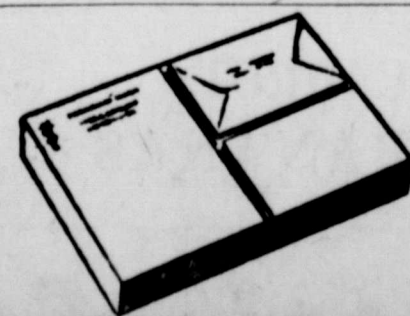

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Present Supervisors —

John Coalson, former Bronte resident now living at Meadow, has planned a new diversion and terrace system on his farm three miles north of Bronte.

Other participants in the flood disaster program who have rebuilt or repaired their terrace systems are: A. Z. Denman, Mrs. S. A. Jackson, Mrs. Ara Scott, all of Bronte; V. V. Wojtek, Robert Lee; W. L. Carr, Silver and B. D. Gartman, Sanco.

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson announced that more than 1,000 farmers and ranchers either are starting on complete farm or ranch plans in the newly launched Great Plains Conservation Program or have applications awaiting action. The Coke Soil Conservation District has received nine applications to date.

The USDA's Soil Conservation Service reports 66 of these plans for faster application of soil and water conservation have been launched in seven states — Texas, North Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Colorado.

The contracts signed involve 74,399 acres of farm and ranch lands, an average of 1,100 acres per unit. Cost-sharing is guaranteed by the Federal government to cover periods of conservation work of from three to ten years.

Texas, with 65 of its western counties taking part, leads with 51 contracts signed for units totaling 42,588 acres.

Regrassing practices lead at present in the interest of farmers and ranchers, with cost-share help provided in most of the ten states at about 80 per cent of the cost of establishing grass. There is much interest, too, in water conservation practices. Many of the soil conservation practices, which a plan may call for, must be applied at the owner's own expense.

Congress has authorized \$150,000,000 for a ten year program of helping farmers and ranchers in the ten Great Plains States stabilize their lands and, as a result, their economy through stepped-up soil and water conservation.

In most cases the operators want to finish their jobs as fast as possible — in three, four or five years.

A total of \$10,000,000 was provided for the first year of the program's operation, and another \$10,000,000 has been recommended in the new budget for the succeeding year.

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY
 Now is the time to watch for mineral deficiencies among cattle, sheep, hogs and goats. Near the end of the winter and in early spring before much new growth appears, livestock have nearly depleted their supply of stored minerals.

We have checked several animals lately showing deficiencies. There are many more that are not making the gains that they should be making. Many mineral deficient animals do not get sick or get down, they just fail to produce as well as they are capable of producing.

A few dollars invested in mineral salt, bonemial or tankage may be money well spent. If you want more information, give us a ring.

Still more news is being made by hybrid grain sorghums. Four varieties have out produced martins consistently. They are Amakrio, R. S. 610, Kx3010 and H 6542. Seed will be available on all but the H6542 in 1958.

We hope that some of the farmers in the county will try at least one of these on a small scale this year. Under other conditions, they have proved their value. We do not know their capabilities in Coke County. A few acres planted as a trial plot this year may show a new, better variety for our county. If you can try a few acres of one of the hybrids this year, particularly R. S. 610 and RS 630 (if available).

R. S. 630 is a new white seeded variety that looks promising. It outproduced all common varieties in experimental tests and out produced other hybrids in many

of the tests. 1958 may be a year of heavy insect infestations. Be on the look out for them. As the old saying goes "an ounces of prevention is worth a pound of cure." By watching closely, an outbreak may be avoided and the potential loss avoided.

Lice are thick on nearly all the cattle we have seen. They can be controlled with two sprays, a week apart, with Lindane or toxaphene. The cost of the insecticide will probably be less than the loss in weight of one calf due to lice. A heavy infestation can cost one farmer or rancher several dollars — dollars he sometimes does not realize he has lost. If you need help figuring how

to mix your spray or would like a bulletin listing sprays to use, how to mix them, drop us a line or telephone us.
