New Eastern Star Chapter To Be Instituted in Bronte

A hundred or more dignitaries and other guests will be on hand Saturday when the new Bronte Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star is instituted. The closed-door ceremonies are set for the Bronte School gymnasium at 7:30 p. m.

Among the high officials of the Eastern Star who are expected to be present are Ruby Enloe, worthy grand matron; Dr. Russell Holt, worthy grand patron; Birdie Jane Easterling, from the general grand chapter; and Lorene Hudgins deputy grand matron. Other state officers and representatives from lodges over West Texas are also expected.

Bronte's new chapter will be the first lodge to be instituted in this district in the past 27 years. Formerly, there was an active chapter here, but it has not been

in operation for 20 years or more. Active members of the Eastern Star have been members of the Norton and Robert Lee chapters. Approximately 45 charter members will make up the new Bronte chapter.

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J. W. Latham, 54, Dies Suddenly; Rites Wednesday

Funeral services for John Willie Latham, 54, were held Wednesday at 4 p. m. from the Bronte Church of Christ. Melvin Placke, minister of the church, officiated. Burial followed in Fairview cemetery here under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Mr. Latham became ill while at work Tuesday and was rushed to the Bronte hospital where he died at 1:40 p. m., a few minutes after arrival. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

He was born March 30, 1904 in Robert Lee, the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. (Mary Virdell) Latham. He was married to Miss Alene Corley in San Angelo on July 3, 1927. He followed construction work over the state until 11 years ago, when they moved to Tennyson where he was engaged in stock farming and construction work. He was a member of the Bronte Church of Christ.

He is survived by his wife and two sons, Hervey Latham, Old Glory, and Tommy Ray Latham, Winters. A daughter, Noretta Ann, died in 1932. Other survivors

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Surplus Food Program Set Up for County

Coke County Commissioners Court in session Monday voted to set up a program of distributing surplus food commodities to needy persons. Coke's application to participate in the program has been approved by the state, County Judge Jeff Dean announced.

Surplus food owned by the federal government is distributed by state organizations and Coke County will be under a district supervisor located in San Angelo. Only cost to the county will be handling charges from San Angelo.

An effort will be made to get the program underway as soon as possible and the dates of next Wednesday and Thursday, July 16-17,

have been set for persons to register and make application for the commodities.

Applications will be taken at the judge's office in the court house on both days between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4 p. m., and applicants are requested to appear in person if possible.

Orders for food will be sent in only once a month and it is hoped this month's requests will be filled early in August.

Standards of eligibility as set up by the state will be followed in Coke county. All persons receiving state aid, such as old age assistance, aid to blind and to dependent children, and aid to permanently and totally disabled will be eligible.

No family may receive the surplus commodities if the head of the household is physically or mentally able to work, except in extreme cases. Other standards of eligibility provide the applicant must have legal residence; that is one year in the state and six months in the county. All persons receiving state aid must have his or her application approved by a field worker.

Available for distribution the past month were butter, cheese, non-fat dry milk, lard or shortening, dry beans, rice, corn meal and flour.

Other items which have been distributed at various times were cured ham, turkey, canned fruit juices, potatoes, etc.

Edna Butner Place Last Week's Mystery Farm

Last week's mystery farm was readily known by most everyone here, for it is located only four miles north of town and is known as the Edna Butner farm. It is operated by D. K. Glenn and Mr. and Mrs. Wilson Sharp live on the place.

It is one of the better farms around the area and has about 500 of its 1100 acres in cultivation.

It was purchased by the late M. A. Butner 42 years ago and prior to that time was known as the J. A. McDonald farm. Mr. and Mrs. Butner lived on the farm until his death in 1948. Mrs. Butner is the former Edna Rawlings and the couple was married in 1912. Their only child is Mrs. D. K. Glenn, whose husband now operates the farm.

Mr. Butner was one of the pioneers in using soil conservation practices. In 1928 he built the first terraces on this place which were to be seen in this part of the country. Glenn has continued use of soil and water saving practices. He said all the cultivated area is terraced, and presently 400 acres of cultivated land is in the soil bank. Pasture land has been provided with water retaining structures, mainly two large and several smaller tanks. The pasture

land is also divided into three parts and stock are alternated so that none of it will be overgrazed.

Until the recent drouth about 200 head of sheep and 50 head of cattle were run on the place. Their number has been greatly reduced, however.

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

I gave some information last week or the week before on the new septic livestock insecticide which I believe needs further comment. First, I stated that 60 days protection from screw worms has been obtained by spraying livestock with the compound. That statement is true, but the manufacturers make no such claim. Some trials have not given the protection that others have; thus, the manufacturers do not claim the maximum that has been obtained. Even though it may not give protection for long periods, it should prove to be very valuable to some operators.

Now that the cotton is squaring and beginning to bloom in a few fields, I would check closely for insects, particularly thrips, flea hoppers and lice. They can be very damaging in a field of young fruiting cotton. Early setting of bolls while moisture is still available can change the total yield of a field considerably sometimes.

We have found light thrip and flea infestations so far, but they probably will increase. We found some heavy lice damage in three fields checked this week. Lice do not knock squares like fleas and thrips do, but they can retard the cotton's growth considerably. Indirectly they can be just as costly as the insects that knock the squares and bolls.

Mr. Ed Roberts has one of the most prolific sows that we have any account of. She has weaned more than 100 pigs in the six years that she has been in the pork business. That is quite an achievement. That is one sow that has seen both the highs and lows of pork prices, but kept on doing her part regardless.

SOCIAL SECURITY

The Social Security office left with us a schedule of the days a representative plans to be in Robert Lee during the next three months. You can council with them in the commissioners court room in Robert Lee on the following dates, beginning at 1:30 p.m.: July 17, August 21 and September '8.

The 1958 Federal Gas Tax refund blanks have been received by our office. If you need a copy or desire help in completing the form drop by to see us. Most producers will or already have received their forms through the mail.

Here are a few pertinent points in regard to the tax that may interest you:

1. The period covered for the 1958 claims is July 1, 1957, to June 30, 1958. Amount of tax refund is 3 cents per gallon.
2. The taxpayer (farmer or ranchman) "may claim a refund of the tax on any gasoline which is used on a farm for farming purposes." This means that the person having custom plowing or combining done on his place should claim the tax refund on the gasoline used for these operations. Check on the simple estimate needed for this. For such things as terracing, making irrigation ditches and similar jobs by a contractor no refund can be claimed.
3. The claims for the past 12 months for gasoline "used in farming," should be made before September 30, 1958.
4. Proper records should be kept for substantiating all claims.

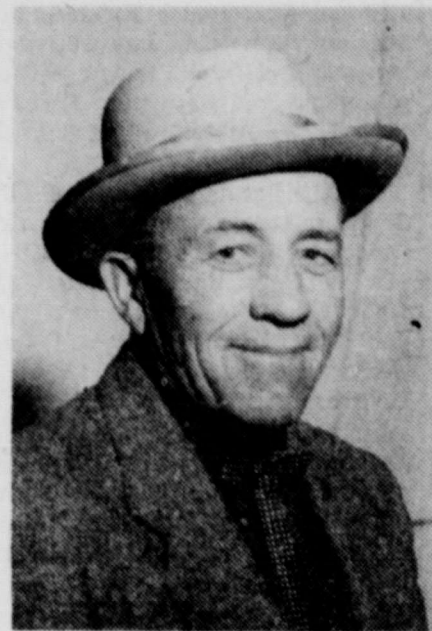

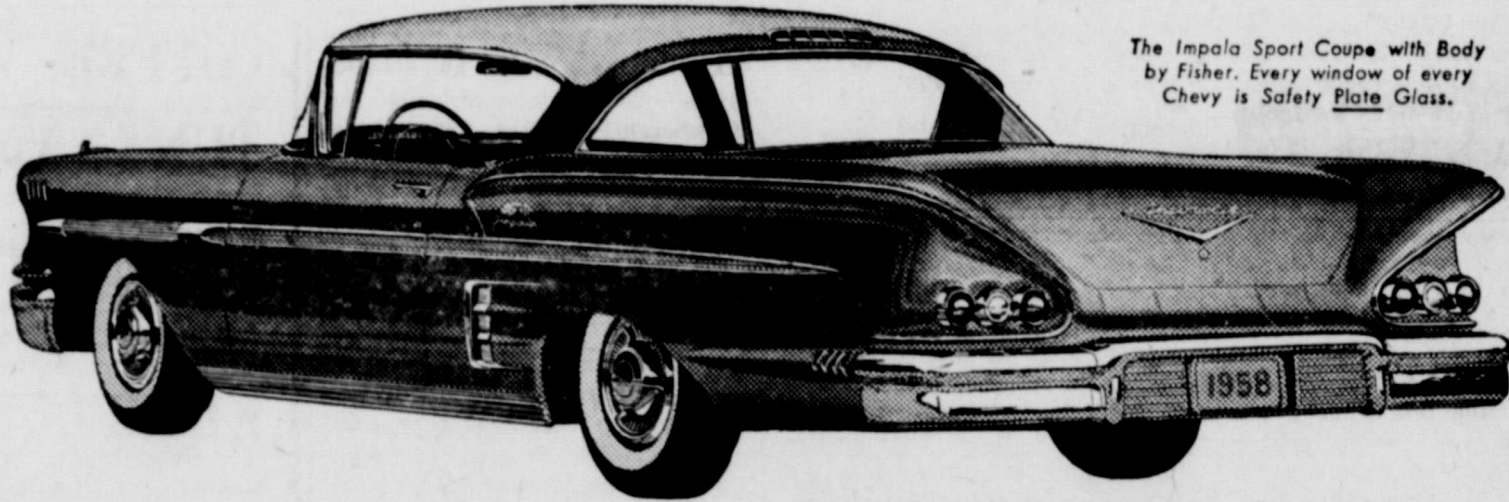

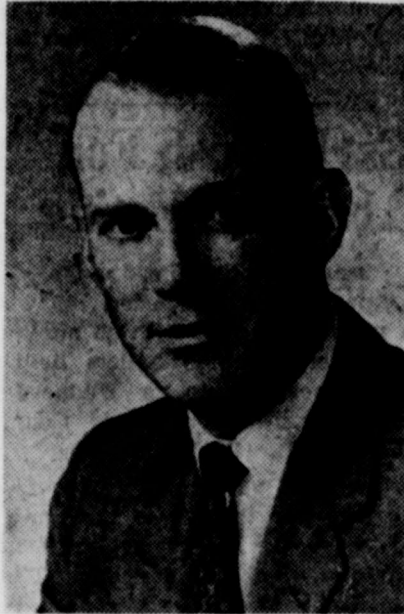
Richards Sheep Top Ft. Worth Market Monday

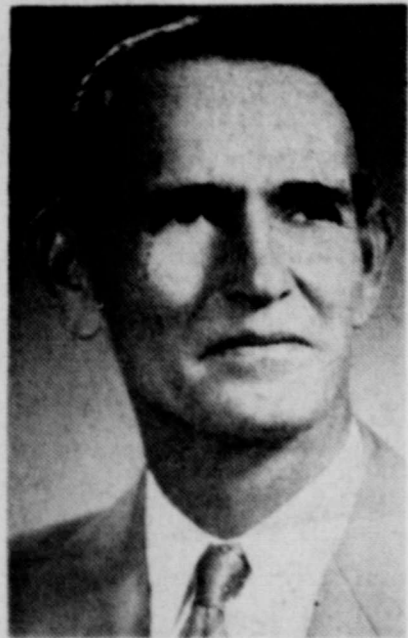
