Plans Being Completed for Labor Day Celebration Here

A big Labor Day celebration is being planned for all the people in this area. It will be closely patterned after the all-day event which was held last Labor Day. The morning will be used for swimming and diving contests and a barbecue supper will be served in the county park at 6 p.m.

Aubrey Denman, park custodian who is in charge of arrangements, said practically all merchants of Bronte were highly in favor of having the celebration again this year. Funds for financing the affair are furnished by local business men. The swimming pool will be open all afternoon for those who wish to use it.

Denman said that Robert Lee swimmers have been invited to participate in the pool contests during the morning, but he has not heard whether or not they can come.

Swimming contests include the following events:

Boys under 8—Free style width of pool, approximately 10 yards.

Girls under 12—Free style 25 yards, back crawl 25 yards.

Boys under 12—Free style 25 yards, back crawl 25 yards.

Girls 13-15—Free style 25 yards, back crawl 25 yards.

Boys 13-15—Free style 25 yards, back crawl 25 yards.

Girls 16 and over—Free style 25 yards, back crawl 25 yards.

Boys 16 and over—Free style 50 yards, back crawl 50 yards, breast stroke 50 yards, butterfly 50 yards.

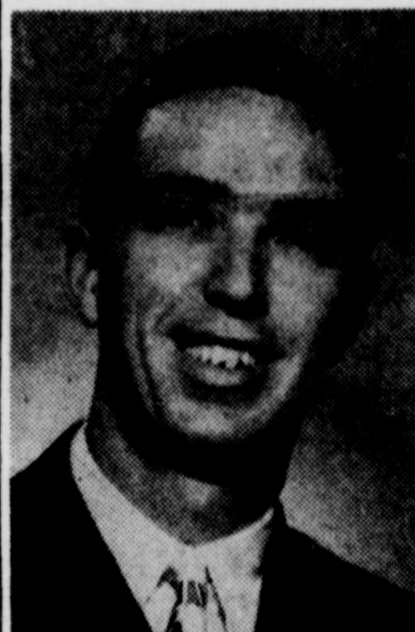
In the diving competition four dives will be required in the following classes:

Girls under 12, boys under 12, girls 13-15, boys 13-15, girls 16 and over, and boys 16 and over.

Most Bronte business houses will be closed for Labor Day, as it is one of the holidays set aside at the first of the year by local merchants. Some stores and stations on the highway and cafes will remain open to accommodate holiday trade.

Second Democratic Primary Is Scheduled for Saturday

Another election is on the docket for Coke County voters Saturday, Aug. 22. This Democratic runoff primary finds only two races being voted on. A runoff is necessary for justice of the peace in both precincts 1 and 2 of Coke County and for Supreme Court, Place No. 1.

In Precinct 2, George Wrinkle and J. T. Liles are seeking the JP position, while in precinct 1, E. C. "Doodad" Davis and Roy P. Ross are still in the running.

Wrinkle and Ross led their respective precincts in the first primary, but did not receive a majority.

For the Supreme Court, Place 1, Robert W. Hamilton led the ticket in the first primary but is faced with a runoff with J. Edwin Smith.

There will be only four voting boxes in Coke County in the second primary, two in precinct 1 and two in precinct 2. Voting places will be open at Bronte, Olga, Robert Lee and Silver. The county Democratic committee decided to dispense with most of the smaller voting boxes and cut the costs of the election.

County Clerk J. L. Tinkler reported Wednesday that nineteen absentee ballots had been cast, 7 in precinct 2 and 12 in precinct 1.

C. R. Smith & Co. to Reopen After Remodeling, Restocking

C. R. Smith & Co. will reopen their store in Bronte Saturday morning at 8 o'clock. The store has been closed for some time while repairs and re-decorating was being done. The store was da-

amaged in early June when a fire next door in the Bronte Pharmacy building flooded the Smith building with smoke, leaving the merchandise, fixtures and the structure itself covered with a black film of soot.

Following a fire sale during which all the damaged merchandise was disposed of, Smith refinished his building and fixtures, and completely restocked his store.

In addition to the lines which were carried before the fire, the Smiths have added some new lines, including ladies sportswear, lingerie, dresses, costume jewelry, fabrics and their notions department has been enlarged.

Smith emphasized that not one item in the store was carried over from the stock before the fire damaged his store.

In addition to operating the retail dry goods store, Mr. and Mrs. Smith operate a blouse and skirt factory in the rear of their building. They manufacture the Joni-Lyn line and have built up a large wholesale trade all over Texas.

Revival Meeting Scheduled Here at Kickapoo Church

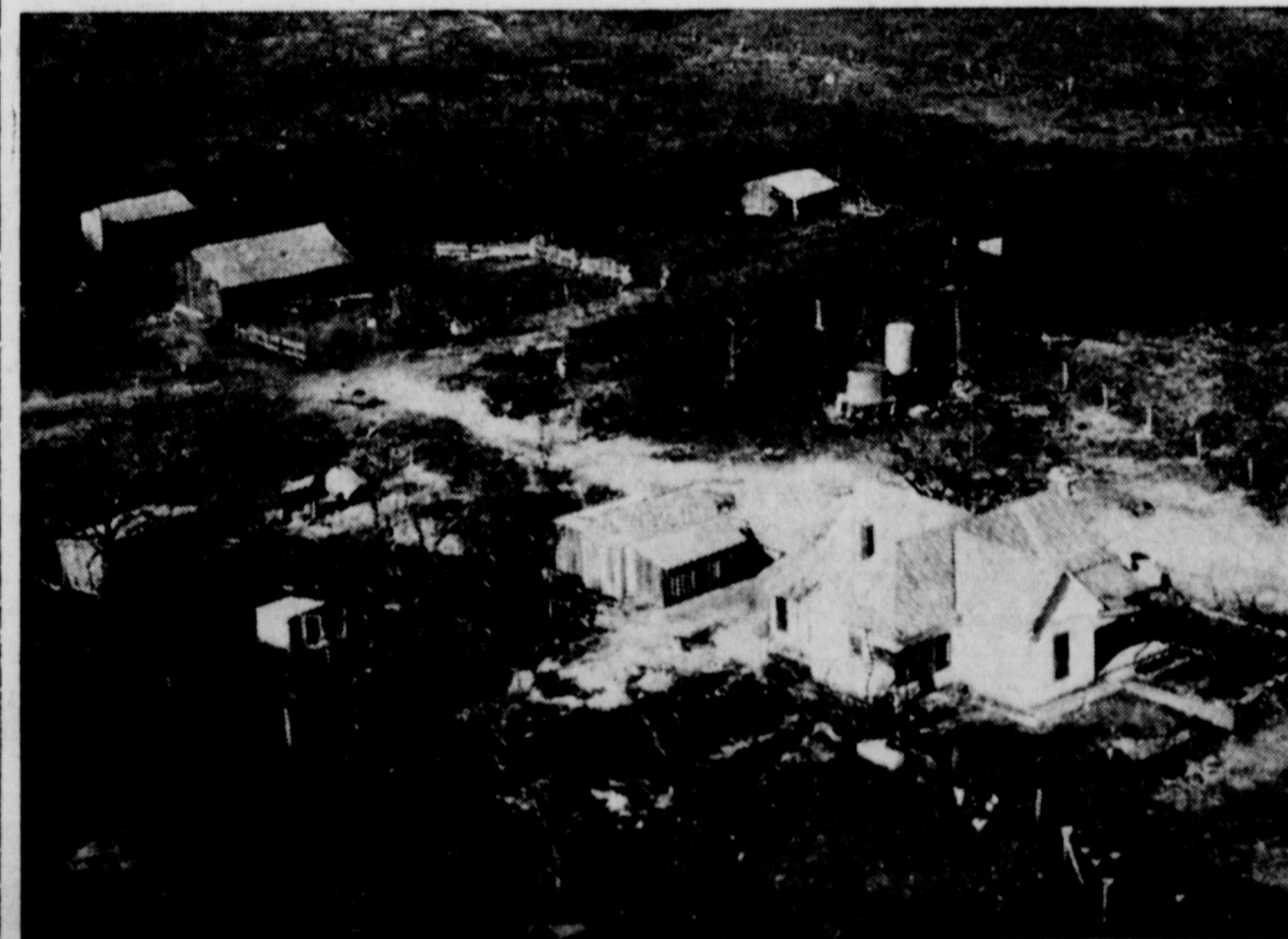

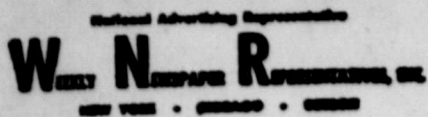
A former pastor of the church, Rev. Clyde W. Coleman, of Grapevine will also be here next week and will be in charge of the song services.

"Miss Wool" of '58 To Be Selected At Angelo Pageant

SAN ANGELO, Texas — A lucky young lady from one of the United States' 13 western wool producing states will be honored with all the royalty the wool kingdom has to offer August 29 in San Angelo.

"Miss Wool of 1958" will be crown at an extravaganza pageant starring Dennis Day. Charles Meeker, State Fair Musicals in Dallas, will stage the gigantic musical and fashion revue in San Angelo's new \$1 million Coliseum. This is the first year the wool pageant has been held on a national basis.

Finalists in the Miss Wool Pageant will be entertained for a week in San Angelo. Arriving August 25, they will begin a round of public appearances, parties and fittings for the \$5,000 all-wool wardrobe to be modeled by them at the pageant and awarded the new wool queen.

Other gifts planned for "Miss Wool" include an overseas trip by air and use of a new automobile for the year. She will vacation two weeks in New York and travel extensively as official representative of the wool industry.

In addition to music and entertainment by Dennis Day, the coronation pageant will feature the 50 Golden Debs, Dallas drill team; a 48-voice choir and full orchestra. Several professional specialty groups are also slated during the 2½-hour show.

Other public events planned during Wool Fiesta Week are the Wool Parade, followed by a street dance August 27. Russ Carlyle and his Orchestra will also play for dancing that night in the Cotillion Room of the Town House Hotel. The wool queen finalists will entertain with music and dramatic talent skits during the Carlyle dance.

Miss Miriam La Cour, Raywood, is the Texas finalist. Young women representing other wool producing states are Pat Hildreth, Phoenix, Ariz.; Anne Trebes, Long Beach, Calif.; Barbara Turnage, Denver, Colo.; Carene Clarke, Po-

catello, Idaho; Lee Ryan, Missoula, Mont.; Beverley Bentley, Albuquerque, N. M.; Elaine Cali, Las Vegas, Nev.; Dottye Jones, Salem, Oregon; Rita Fae Wolvington, Belle Fourche, S. D.; Margo Hedges, Ogden, Utah; Sharon Gunwaldson, Yakima, Wash., and Louise Mayland, Greybull, Wyo. All candidates for the "Miss Wool" crown are between the ages

of 18 and 25 and have completed at least one year at an accredited college or university. They are between 5 feet 4 inches and 5 feet 8 inches and wear size 12 garments. Final selection of "Miss Wool" will be made on the basis of personality, beauty, talent and modeling ability.

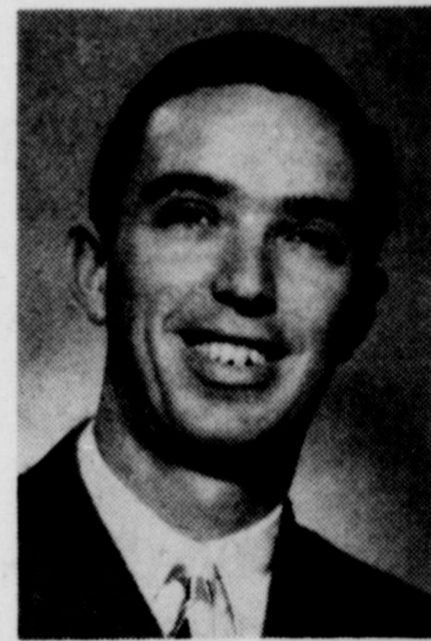

Borders Place Mystery Farm

The mystery farm appearing in last week's Enterprise belongs to Mrs. J. W. Borders and is located near Maverick. Mrs. Russell Carlton, a daughter of Mrs. Borders, wrote that she and her husband live on the farm and that Mrs. Borders makes her home with them. Mrs. Borders and her late husband purchased the farm in 1923 from his parents.

The Aug. 8 edition of The Enterprise is the property of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. (Skinny) Billingsley of Clyde. They bought the place in 1950 from her mother, Mrs. R. R. Ash. Mrs. Ash and her late husband made their home on this place from 1926 until his death in 1947. They built the brick house shown in the picture in 1928 after the frame house which was on the place burned. They followed a diversified

farming program on the 339 acre place during the years that Mr. Ash operated the farm, raising cotton, corn maize and other field crops. Mrs. Ash operated the farm for one year after her husband's death, and then Mr. Billingsley operated it until 1950, when he and his wife bought it. During the past year the cotton land on the place has been in the soil bank. The remainder of the acreage has been lying out this year. Ordinarily Mr. Billingsley runs stock and raises small grain on the farm. He plans to sow it in oats and wheat this fall.

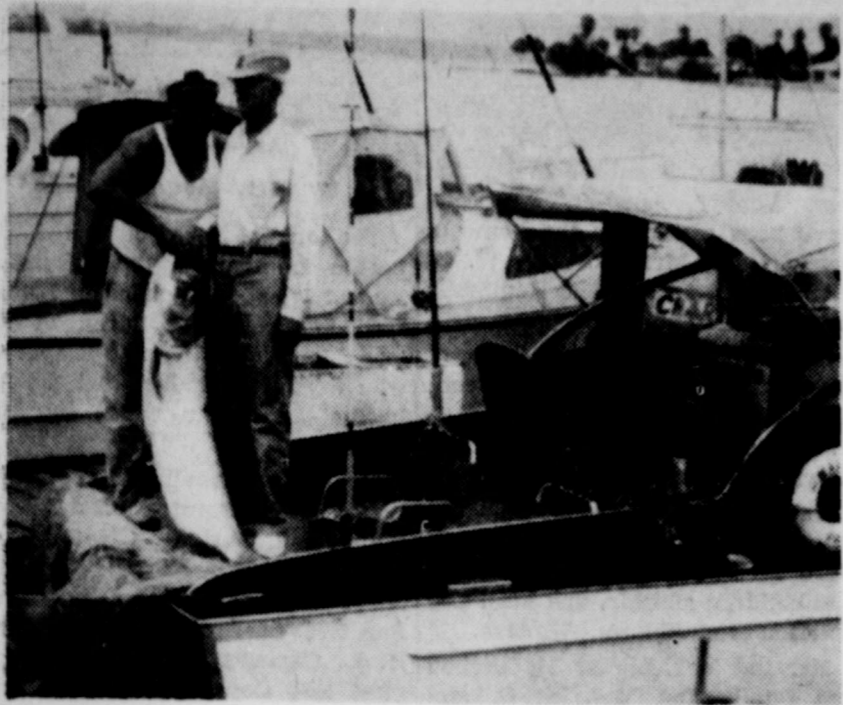

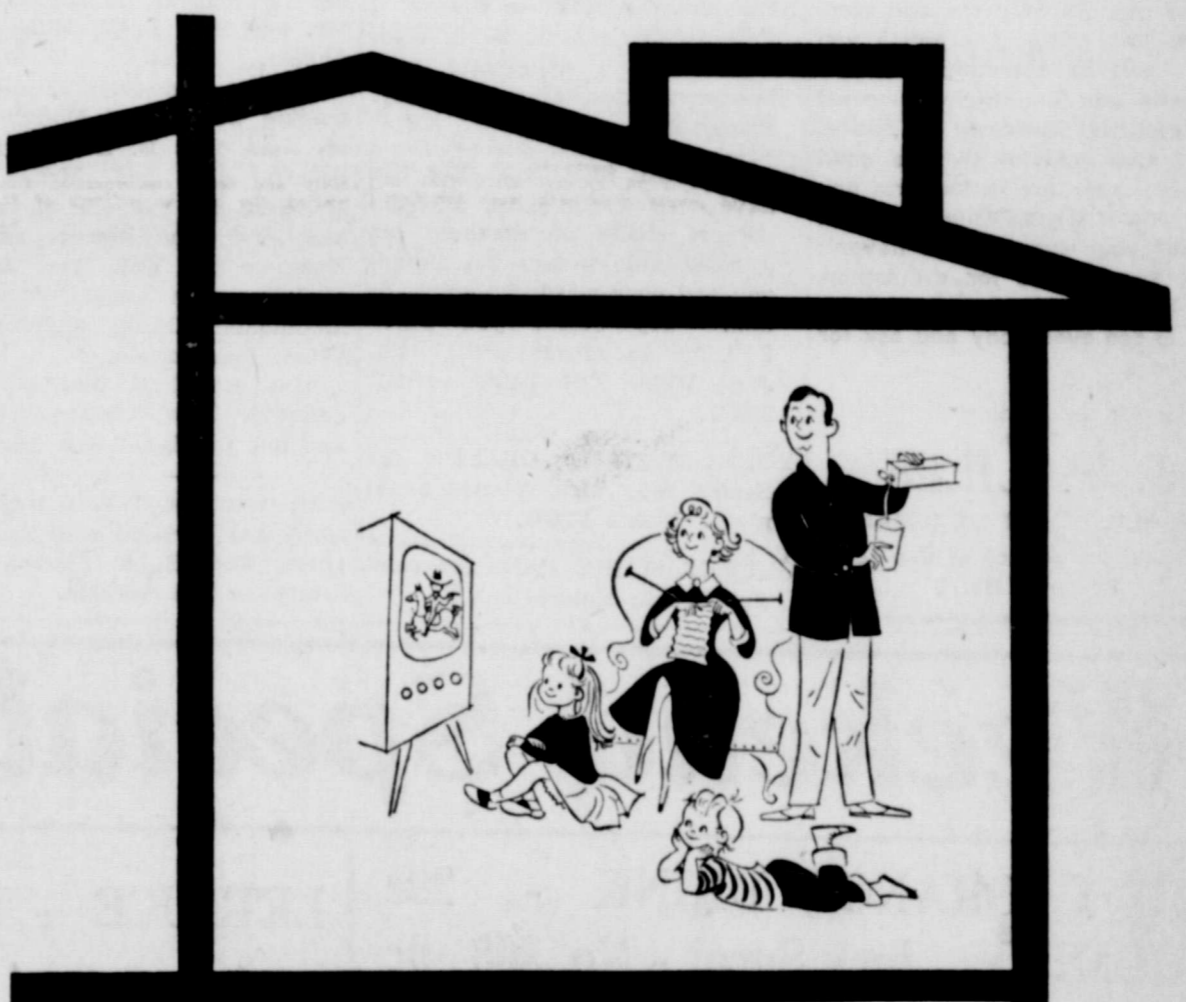
