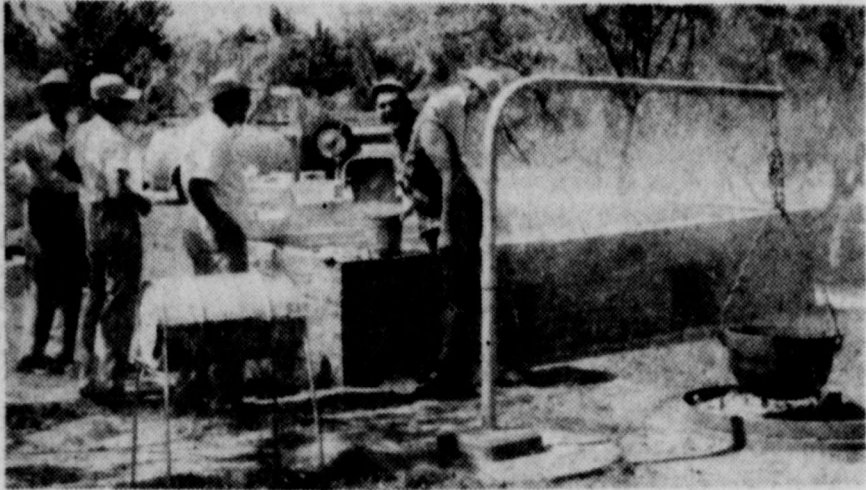

## Bronte School 1958-59 Budget Set at \$127,328

Bronte School officials at their last regular meeting of the board of trustees set the official operating and maintenance budget at \$127,328.00. This is \$10,625.00 less than was spent in 1957-58 and \$20,779.25 less than in 1956-57.

The above budget figure does not include payments on the bond-

ed and other indebtedness of the school. Payment on bonded indebtedness this past year was \$24,998.38, and on retirement of loans was \$5,072.78, making a total of \$30,061.16 used the past year to retire debts. This amount was above the operating and maintenance expense.

Supt. Garland Black stated that the school has tried to take care of the drop in oil and other major valuations the past two years by cutting the operating budget, but were hit this past school year with some \$12,000 less state money than was received the previous year. Besides receiving less state money, he said, the local school was charged with a large portion of the actual cost of the teacher pay raise voted by the state.

Since the state has been deficient in funds allocated to schools for the past few years, Black said it appears that the state intends to force more of the cost of operation upon the local school districts.

## Petitions Want Vote To Separate Sheriff and Tax Offices in Coke

Petitions are now being circulated requesting the Commissioners Court of Coke County to call an election to vote on the proposition of separating the sheriff and tax-assessor-collector office.

A law passed four years ago provides that counties under 10,000

population may vote to set up separate offices for the sheriff and tax departments. At present the duties are combined under one official.

While the Commissioners Court has authority to call such an election without a petition, a number of citizens felt that names should be secured to indicate there was interest in the matter.

It is likely the petitions will be filed at the Commissioners Court session next Monday. That would give sufficient time for the vote to be held in connection with the General Election Nov. 4, thus saving considerable expense.

The sheriff and tax offices were combined years ago when tax collections were small. However, Coke County's taxing valuation jumped to 30 million dollars because of oil development and the tax office is one of the most important positions in the court house.

A number of counties took immediate steps to separate the offices after the new law was enacted. One of them was nearby Reagan County (Big Lake) which has a small population but a large valuation.

If the voters decide to separate the offices, Paul Good would continue in his present capacity of sheriff and tax assessor-collector for the remainder of his term which expires Dec. 31, 1960. However, in the 1960 election officers would be named for the separate positions of sheriff and tax assessor-collector.

## 300 Enroll In School

Supt. Garland Black said Thursday morning that classes in the Bronte School were off to a good start, and that an even 300 students have enrolled.

Of the 300 pupils, 207 enrolled in the elementary school and 93 in high school.

The superintendent said the first grade is the most heavily loaded class with 34 beginners. Miss Ona Parker is teacher of this grade. Black said this number is considerably higher than was anticipated.

This means that local property owners and oil and other major taxpayers will have to bear this increased cost. He said a large number of Texas schools are in the same binding financial situation as the Bronte school.

The estimated valuation for the Bronte district this year on local property is \$1,810,328.00, while oil company and other major taxpayer property is valued at \$6,085,725. The latter figure two years ago was \$750,000 more than it is this year, and major oil company valuations for 1958-59 alone are \$272,180 less than the year before.

The Bronte School tax rate is \$1.25 per \$100 valuation. The payments of bonded indebtedness each year must be taken out of the local funds. The amount for this year will be \$20,000 on the principal and \$4,988.38 interest. This will leave a balance of \$180,000 owed on the new elementary building. The old building was paid out last year, thus retiring that debt. The balance paid on the old building last year was \$9,000.00.

School officials here expressed the opinion that maintenance and operation expenses have been cut to the minimum without impairing the quality of instruction. They have asked for a meeting some time in October with representatives of oil companies and other major taxpayers to discuss what can be done to improve the school's financial situation for the 1959-60 term. By the time for this meeting the school's audit for the past year will have been completed and figures will be presented at the meeting, Black said.

### FRESHMAN CLASS OFFICERS

Eddy Spiller was elected president of this year's Freshman class at a class meeting this week. # District 6-B Grid Competition Starts Tonight

Football gets underway tonight in District 6-B with four of the six teams having games scheduled. Bronte and Robert Lee are the only two teams having open dates.

Teams seeing action tonight will be Loraine playing host to Roscoe, Eldorado at Rocksprings, Trent at Aspermont, and Hermleigh going against Coahoma at Hermleigh. Robert Lee opens the season Sept. 11 while Bronte waits until Sept. 12 for their opener.

From all indications, District 6-B should be one of the rougher districts in Class B football this year with almost all teams returning a large squad of lettermen. Up until this year, this district was composed of only five teams, but with the addition of Eldorado, it will now be made up of six schools.

Hermleigh appears to be the strongest as they have 17 lettermen returning from a squad that tied for district honors last year. They will be led by a line that will average 185 pounds and a backfield

that will hit the 175 pound mark. The Cardinals will also be under a new coach, Bill McGuire, who comes to Hermleigh from Newcastle.

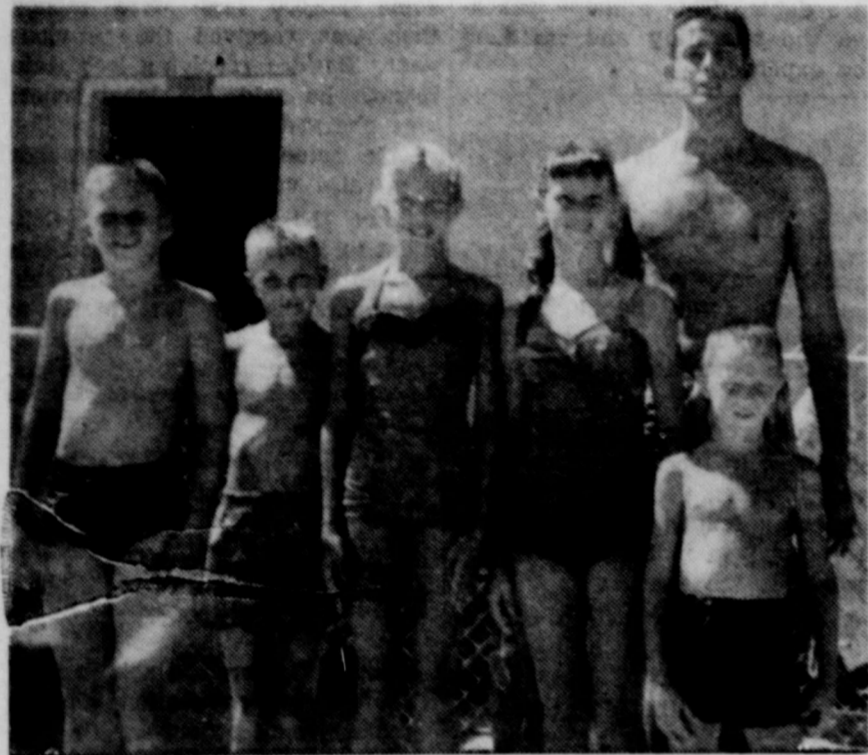
Operating with ten returning letter winners, the Robert Lee Steers will be seeking their second consecutive district crown after finishing in a tie with Hermleigh last year. Freddy McDonald will spearhead the Steers this year as they will be using one of its smallest units in the past few years. Up front, Melvin Duncan, 197 pound guard, will be the key man for the Steers on offense and defense.

Loraine, the last place club in the district last year, should be strong contenders this year as they have practically the same squad as that of 1957. With one of the largest clubs in the district, the Bulldogs hold down the spot of being the dark horse as they have the potentials of either finishing first or last.

Eldorado, a class A team last year and the new addition to this district will have 13 lettermen returning. In their respective district last year, the Eagles wound up on bottom of a tough Class A conference.

Trent appears to be the hardest hit by graduation as they lost over half of their starting lineup from the 1957 team. Despite this, the Gorillas could still prove to be just as rough as the next team.

Ten lettermen are returning to the Bronte Longhorns as they open the season under a new head mentor, Norman Porter. Porter has indicated that he will be using the split T as well as the wing T that Bronte has employed the past several years. The Longhorns have a line that will compare with that of Hermleigh, but their backfield is smaller and experience will hamper the Bronte lads as they make their bid for the title.

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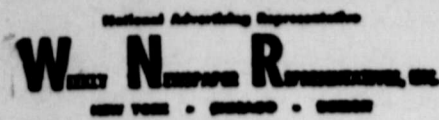

**Petition**

Following is a copy of the petitions being signed requesting an election to vote on separating the sheriff and tax assessor-collector offices in Coke County:  
**TO THE HONORABLE COUNTY JUDGE AND COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF COKE COUNTY, TEXAS:**

WHEREAS, on November 2, 1954, Article VIII Section 16a became a part of the Constitution of Texas, said article providing that "In any county having a population of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, the Commissioners Court may submit to the qualified property tax-paying voters of such county at an election the question of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorized county officials. If a majority of such voters voting in such election shall approve of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to such list, then such official shall be elected at the next General Election for such Constitutional term of office as is provided for other Tax Assessors-Collectors in this State."

AND WHEREAS, the sheriff now serves as ex-officio assessor-collector, this amendment permits the voters of the counties to decide in a referendum whether the new and additional office of assessor-collector should be created; and,

WHEREAS, it is felt that this extra duty imposes a heavy burden on the sheriff and takes up a large portion of his time which should be devoted to other duties; therefore,

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED, resident qualified electors and tax-paying voters of Coke County, Texas, who each owns taxable property in said County and who each has duly rendered the same for taxation, respectfully pray your Honorable Body to order an election at the earliest possible date, for the purpose of submitting the following proposition to the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of said County, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

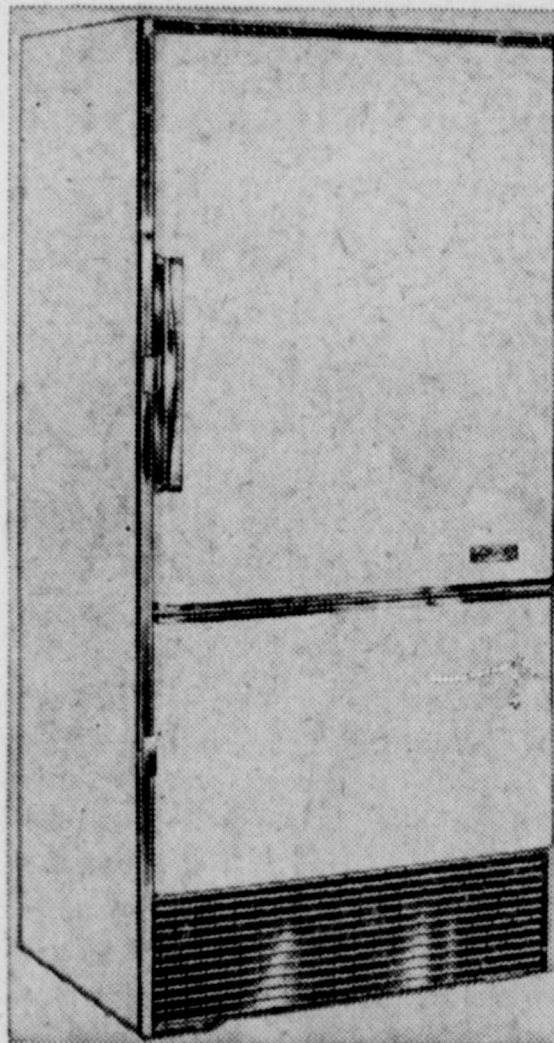
