Bronte school authorities announced this week that admission prices to football games in the District will be increased slightly this year. Single adult tickets will be \$1.00, while student tickets will sell for 50c.

Season tickets for all home games are on sale at the school with prices running \$4.25 for adults and \$2.00 for children. Season tickets will admit the holder to five home games.

The increase in prices was set for the entire District 6-B and will prevail this season at all games played at schools which are members.

City Council Allows School Cheaper Water

In a meeting of the Bronte City Council last Thursday night, the west Texas Conference of the group voted to sell water to the cheap water is to be used only to water the football field on which grass has been started. The reduced price, which is 20c per thousand on excess of 4,000 gallons, will be in effect for 45 days.

> The turf on the football field has just about died this summer and school officials are anxious to get it back in shape.

> In other business transacted by the council, meeting night for the city's governing body was changed from the first Friday night of each month to the first Thursday night of each month. Change will be effective during football season.

The council set a price of \$60 as its offer to E. M. Hall for a channel easement on five lots which he owns in the north part of Bronte. The city has to secure the easement as part of its obligation in furnishing right of way for rebuilding U. S. Highway 277. The lots are located in the creek, near the bridge in the north part of town. Hall had not accepted the offer Thursday, Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, said.

Considerable discussion was held regarding placing water meters at all churches and parsonages in Bronte, so that they can be charged for water used above the 4,000 gallon minimum. It has always been the practice here to charge churches and ministers' home the minimum rate, with no charge for excess water used. The council decided to postpone action on this question until the next meeting.
