Longhorns Play First Home Game Tonight with Wylie 11

The Bronte Longhorns will make their home debut tonight as they engage the Wylie Bulldogs of Class A competition. Kickoff time has been set at 8 o'clock.

The Longhorns will be making their second appearance for this year while the Bulldogs will be starting their third tilt of the season. Both teams will be looking for their first victory as neither have managed to score a win. Last week in their opener, the Longhorns were held to a scoreless tie by the Eden Bulldogs. Wylie lost to Roscoe last week by a score of 28-0. Two weeks ago, the Jim Ned Indians downed the Bulldogs 14-0.

Wylie has five starters returning from their starting eleven of last year, but they will be hampered by the loss of star quarterback Joe Rex Shulle. Shulle is not expected to return to action until around mid-season. Even with Shulle out of action, the Bulldogs will be a tough competitor. They have a line that will average 185 from tackle to tackle and the backfield carries quite a bit of speed.

The Longhorns will be starting with a line that weighs in at an 185 pound average per man from end to end. Experience is lacking in the backfield, but with the addition of Dee Arrott, freshman halfback, the Longhorns should prove to have a versatile ruing attack.

An excellent game is on tap, and Bronte fans are urged to go out and back the Longhorns.

Soaking Rains Cover Area; Up to 3 In. Fall

Slow-falling showers over a two-day period stacked up nearly three inches of moisture over most of the Bronte area the first of this week. Practically no runoff was noted and farmers and ranchmen hailed the rain as one of the best they've ever seen.

With plenty of time left for fall grasses to come out, ranchmen are looking forward to some early winter grazing before frost nips

their pastures.

The rain is bringing up volunteer oats, also. Plenty of oat seed cover fields, after last season saw one of the best oat crops ever harvested in this area. Cotton farmers are perhaps the only ones who stand not to benefit from the rains.

Rain started falling early Sunday night and the slow showers continued through Tuesday.

These latest rains brought the total for the area north of Bronte up to about six inches during the last few weeks. Several good showers which have missed town, have fallen in that vicinity.

Butterfield Centennial Caravan Due in Bronte Next Thursday

A caravan going from Tipton, Mo., to San Francisco, Calif., will be in Bronte next Thursday, Sept. 25. The group is scheduled to arrive here about noon and visit old Fort Chadbourne.

The caravan left Tipton Sept. 16 and is scheduled to arrive in San Francisco Oct. 10.

Noah Pruitt, Jr., Bronte postmaster, said Thursday that he has accumulated quite a large stack of mail which will be picked up here by the caravan.

Stamp collectors who want a stamp cancelled for the special Butterfield run should address envelopes to themselves and hand them to Pruitt. He will place them in one of the caravan vehicles which will take them to San Francisco. The post office in San Francisco will then send them back to the persons to whom they are addressed.

Pruitt said a special stamp commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Butterfield Trail will be issued at San Francisco on Oct. 10. Persons wishing to secure one of these stamps should send a self-addressed envelope and four cents

to the postmaster at San Francisco.

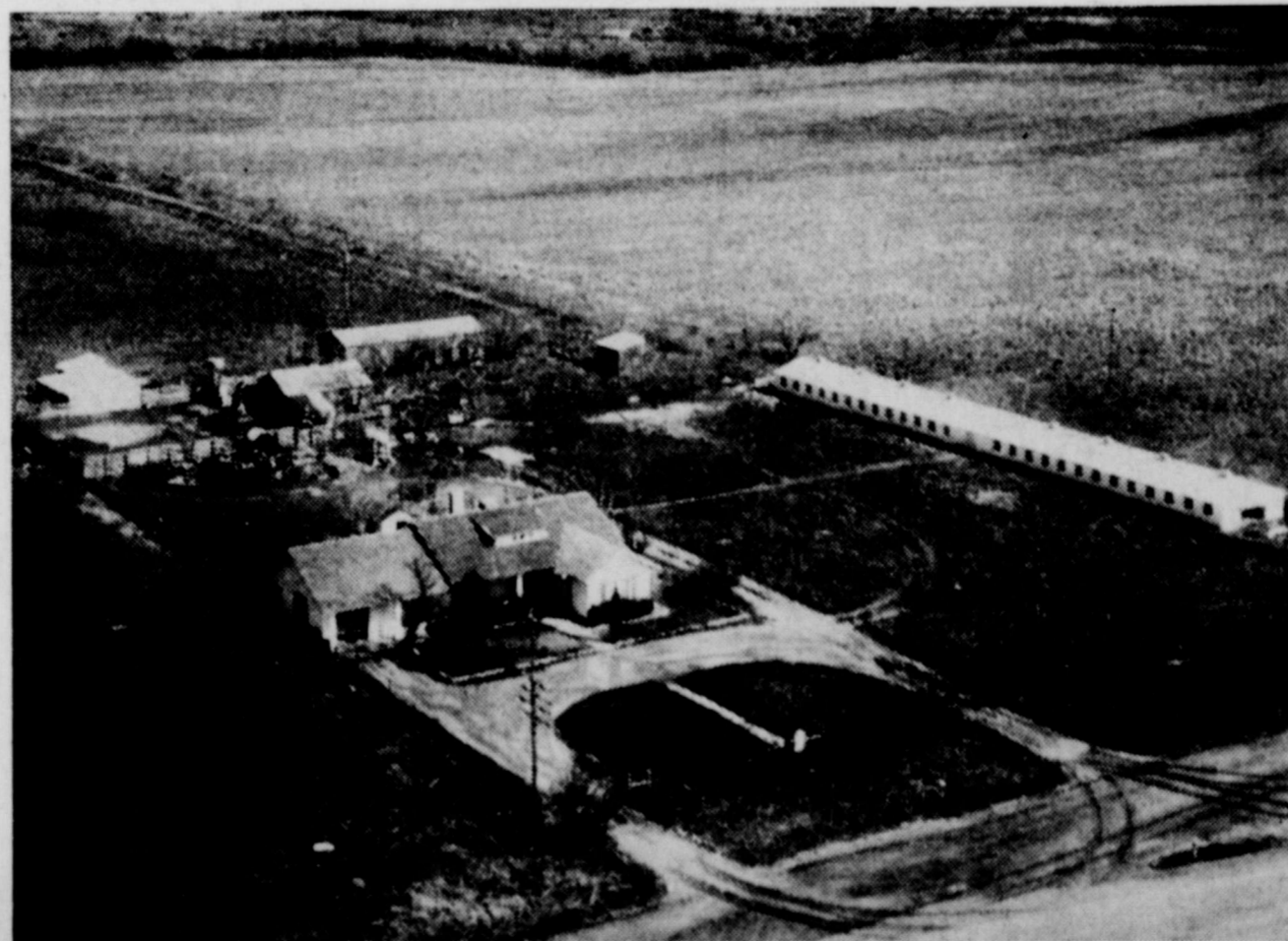
The caravan time table calls for its arrival in Bronte at 11:30 a. m. In addition to the visit to Fort Chadbourne, the group will eat lunch here. The caravan consists mainly of trucks. An old stage coach resurrected from the junk pile has been repaired and is being carried in a large van.

From here the caravan will go to Tennyson, Orient and San Angelo, where an overnight stop will be made.

The Butterfield Trail was the second overland mail route to the Pacific. It was preceded by the "Jackass" Mail run from San Antonio to Sa Diego, Calif., which operated in 1857 until its owner James E. Birch, went down in a storm at sea off Cape Hatteras.

The Overland Mail Company was organized in 1857, when John Butterfield, New York transportation magnate, was awarded the contract to carry mail "from the Mississippi to the Pacific." The contract was authorized in 1856 by Congress. Butterfield organized the company and began operating the stage line between Tipton, Mo., and San Francisco on Sept. 16, 1858. Coaches ran regularly along the route until interrupted by the Civil War. Fort Chadbourne was one of the main stops along the line.

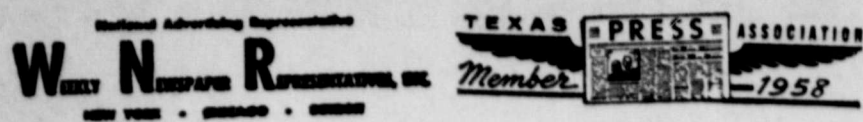

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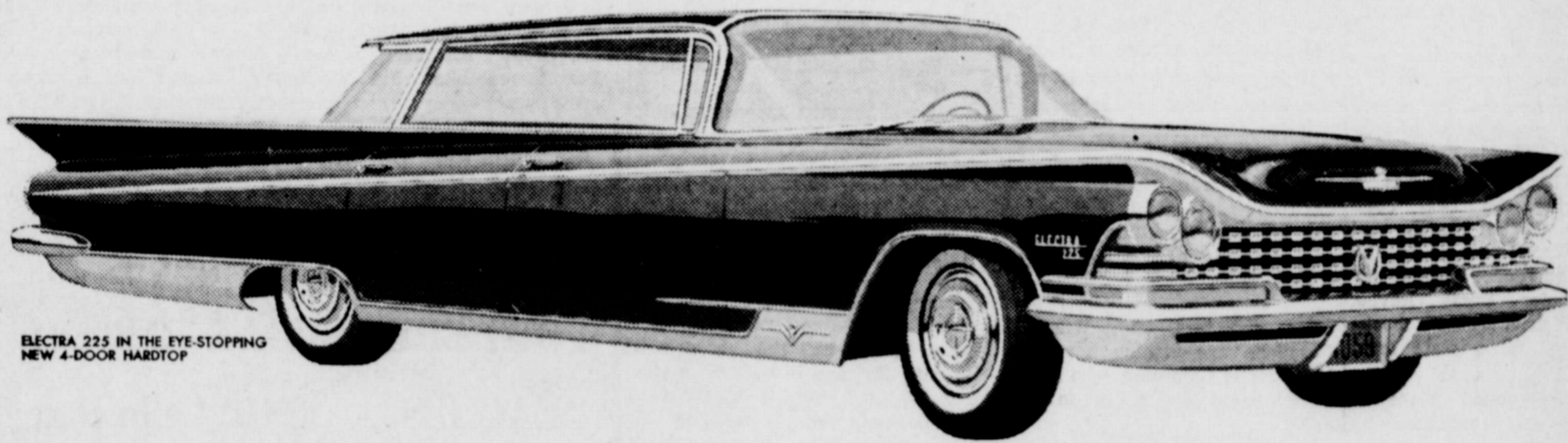

Minutes later, the first half ended with the score standing 0-0.

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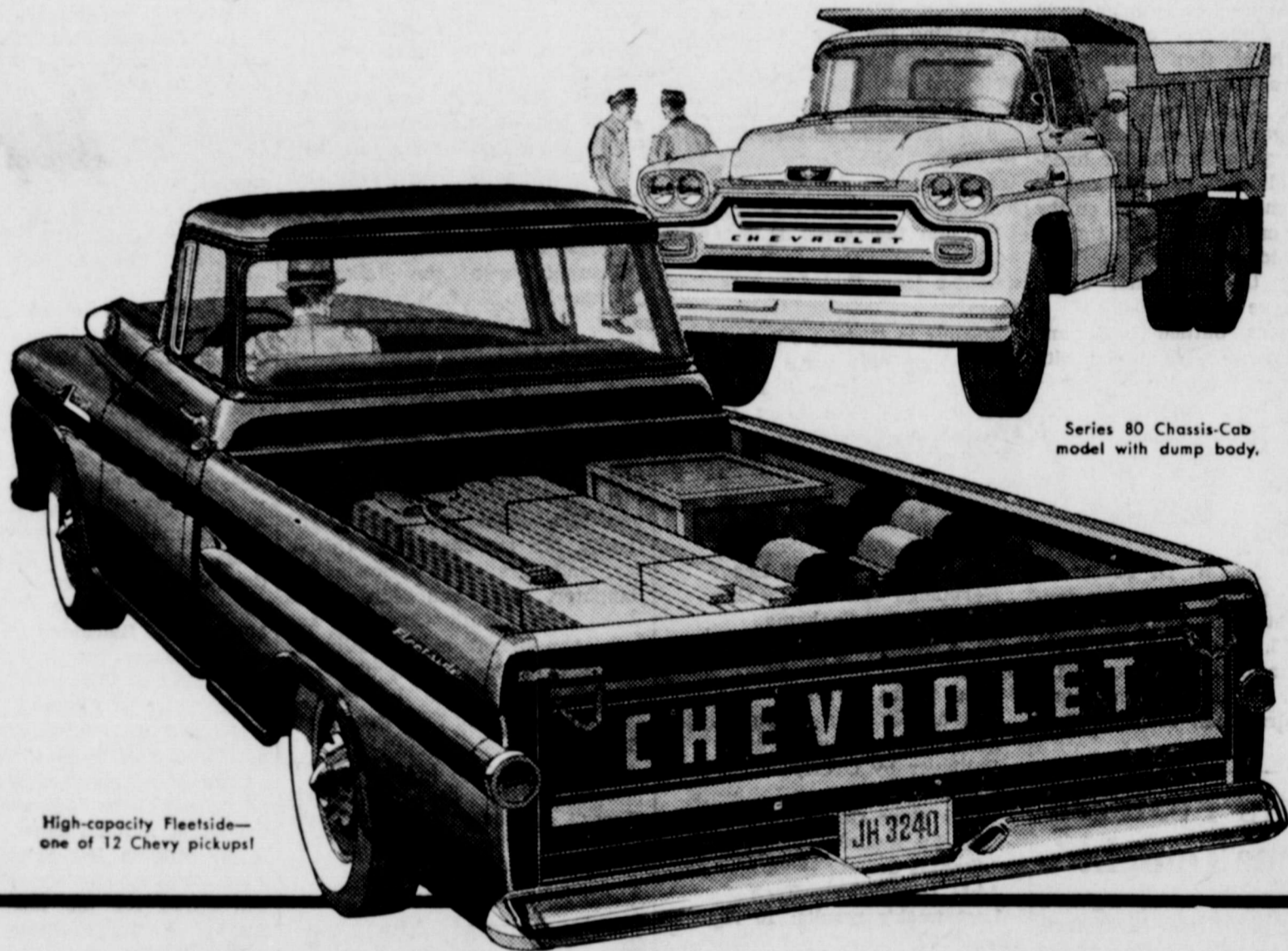

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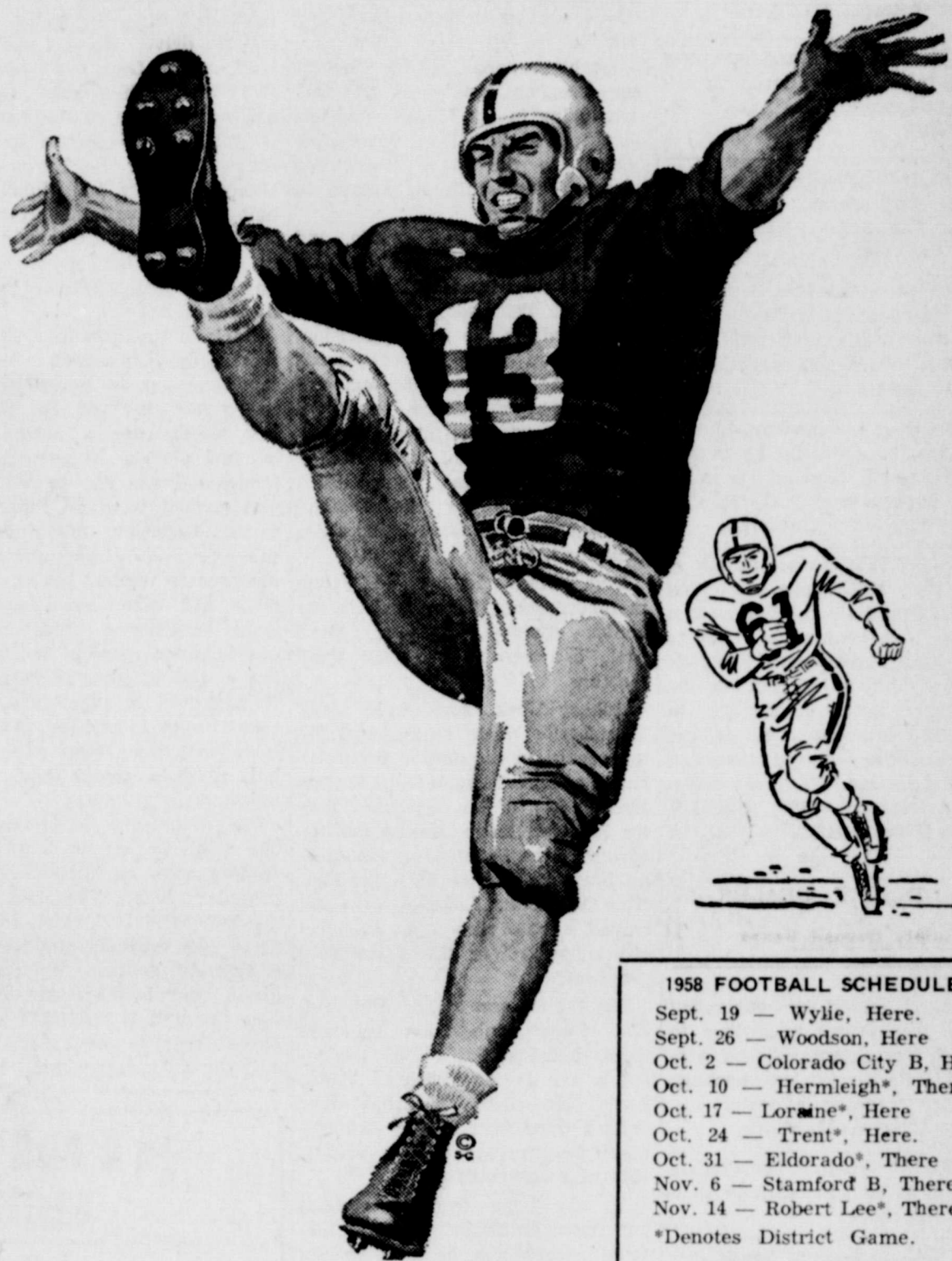

County Agents News Column

By Sterling Lindsey

RAT-MICE CONTROL

Several persons have contacted us seeking information regarding the rat and mice control program being conducted by the 4-H Clubs. We will attempt to give more information concerning the program.

First, apologies must be made to those of you who ordered bait, expecting it to be delivered on Thursday, Sept. 18, and did not receive the poison. If that happened, in a way of explanation, unfortunately more bait has been requested than the clubs ordered for the drive. At this writing the bait secured from the Rodent Control Service has been used. An attempt will be made before this is published to secure bait from either or both the Taylor and/or Runnels County 4-H Clubs. If the bait is not available from them, the local 4-H Clubs are expected to have another supply in one day next week, possibly by Monday, Sept. 22.

Back to the questions, first and most commonly asked is the question of how much bait does it take to do the job? As we stated in last week's paper, normally one to two pounds is enough for a homestead and five to ten pounds will control them on the average farm. However, the number of mice present is astounding. They continue to reinfest areas. It possibly will take more than the above amounts to control the present invasion even in the average home and on the average farm. Regardless of the amount it takes, within reason, controlling them will more than pay for the bait used in saved feeds, equipment, etc.

We would like to re-emphasize one vital, important point in controlling rats or mice with anticoagulant baits. That fact is that the bait **MUST** be eaten regularly for a five to seven day period to effectively control the rodents; check your bait stations to make sure the bait is available to them for at least a week, and better still for a longer period. If more

of the pests move in, the program of effective controls.
