AD-LIB-BEN

Quite a bit of criticism has been circulating the past few weeks of Bronte School trustees and administrative officials because of the deficit which has developed in the school's operating and maintenance fund.

We hadn't written anything about this situation until last week, when it was announced on the front page of The Enterprise in half-inch letters that the school wound up the 1957-58 school term with a deficit of \$22,000.

When we first heard the story several weeks ago that this deficit existed, we were prone to believe that somebody had really fouled up. However, after talking with most of the trustees and the superintendent, we found out that the situation was practically unavoidable and that the shortage was caused by lowering of state funds available to the school and by putting the burden of a teacher salary raise on the local district.

Everyone with whom we have talked seems to be genuinely concerned about the matter and wants to proceed with all diligence to overcome the deficit. The trustees realize they have a problem on their hands and that it is going to take long hours of hard work to find the solution; but they all seem to be willing to spend the time and effort necessary.

That brings us down to the point we wish to make. These men admittedly have a problem, not only on account of last year's deficit but because the want to prevent a recurrence of it without lowering the quality of instruction in the Bronte Schools. In order to solve it, they are going to need the cooperation and help of everyone in the district. We are not saying that they should not be subjected to well-meant criticism if it is deserved, but we do say they should be given a chance to work out from under this problem before we rise up to condemn them for mis-management of the school.

Let's help them by giving them a chance. If they don't come through with what we consider is a good solution, then there will be plenty of time to give 'em hell. Remember, too, that the job they are doing for us doesn't pay too well.

Crews Moving in Here to Work On Highway Construction Job

Men have already begun moving into Bronte in preparation for building a half million dollar highway project north of town.

The contract for 8.587 miles, from the main street of Bronte north to the Sweetwater-Abilene

Y was let recently to Strain Bros., Inc., of San Angelo. Their bid of \$505,422.00 was low.

Actual construction will begin in about two weeks. The work will include construction of grading, structures, flexible base and two

course surface treatment on the road. Included in the structures for the highway are a new bridge over the East Kickapoo Creek where it crosses the highway in the north part of Bronte.

Also included in the contract is the construction of an overpass on Highway 70. It will allow traffic going toward Sweetwater to pass over U. S. Highway 277, which turns northeast at the Y toward Abilene.

Prizes will be awarded to the one with the best "trick or stunt" with the popular hoops and to the one who can keep the hoop rolling the longest.

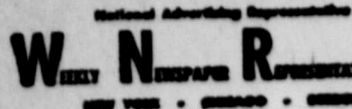

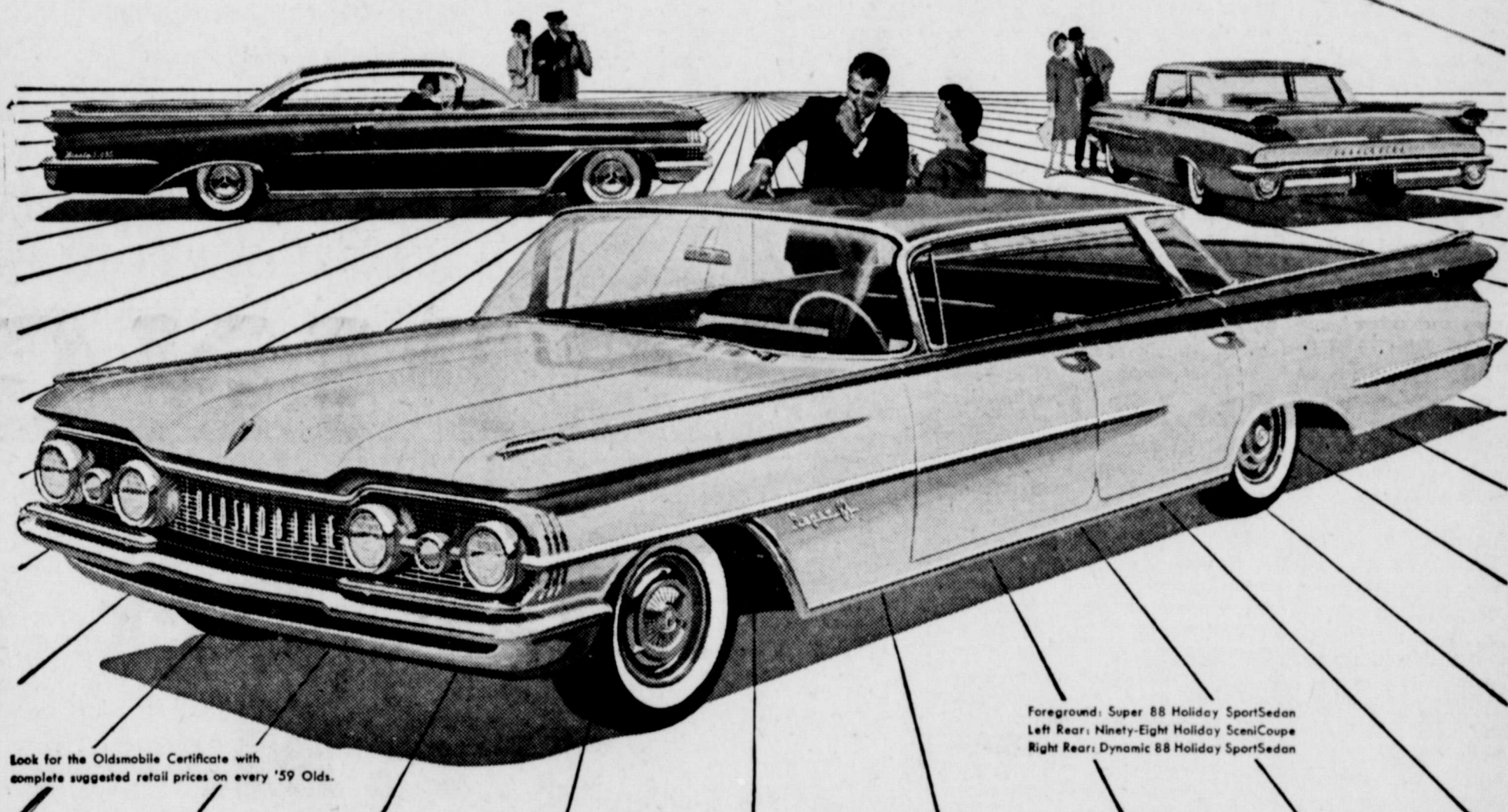

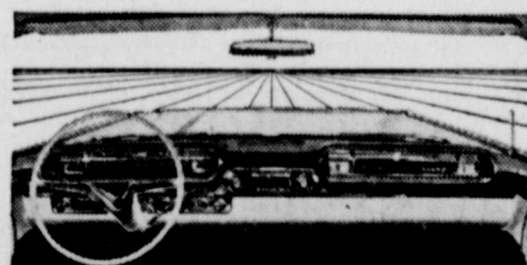

Press Box Chatter

Witnesses of last Friday night's contest between Bronte and Woodson were a little disappointed in the game's officials. Not since the Bronte-Rochelle game in 1947 has this writer seen any sorrier officiating than that of last week. Throughout the entire game, Bronte drew only five yards in penalty and Woodson was set back only 15 yards in penalties. It has never been my intention to complain about referees because they are undertaking a very tiring job, but when they let the game get out of hand as they did Friday night, then I think it is time that something be done about it. Probably for the first time in my viewing of football, I saw a coach of one of the teams in action come out on the field in a very bad way. Anyone in the stands might have done the same thing if they had come 200 miles to play football and then had to put up with officials such as these.

The picking of the officials can't be blamed on the Bronte coaching staff as the officials come from the San Angelo Officials Association. It is up to the association to furnish the referees and in many cases they are not known until game time. Woodson Clips Bronte 14-12 In Rough and Tumble Contest

A battle between the Longhorns and the Cowboys took place last Friday night as the Bronte Longhorns and the Woodson Cowboys met on the local gridiron. After a hard fought contest with a few extra curricular activities, the Cowboys emerged as the winners over the Longhorns 14-12.

Only the ability to convert their extra point was the difference between the two teams. The Cowboys managed to muster one of two tries for extra point to give them the deciding two point edge. The Longhorns failed to convert in their desperate bid for their second victory.

Both teams battled back and forth between the two thirty yard lines with each club managing to cross the twenty yard line twice. On both occasions, both teams pushed across for touchdowns. The Cowboys tallied a touchdown in the second and fourth periods as did the Longhorns.

Woodson drew first blood as they scored the second time that they had possession of the pigskin. After holding the Longhorns on their 22, the Woodson boys marched 78 yards for paydirt. Starting late in the first period, the smaller Cowboys disregarded the size of the Longhorns and succeeded in going the distance without too much opposition. Ronnie Holliday carried for nine yards to the 31 and halfback Linday Sanders picked up 12 to the 43 and a first down. Sanders combined two carries for 17 yards to put the Cowboys deep in Bronte territory. A pass from Larry Sullivan to Gary Flatt picked up six yards to the Bronte 27. Holliday picked up six more yards to the 21. Again the combination

of Sullivan to Flatt paid off with a 21 yard toss and the score. The attempted run of the extra point was stopped and the Bulldogs held a 6-0 lead seconds deep in the second quarter.

Midway in the second period, Alonzo Robbins intercepted a Cowboy pass on the Bronte 17 yard line and before being brought down, Robbins had returned the ball to the 42. Dee Arrott carried twice for nine yards and Albert Grace went for the first down on an eight yard pickup. Arrott carried for three yards to the Woodson 33. Grace then found Benny Corley open and connected with a pass good for 32 yards to the one. Corley then hit the center of the line for paydirt. An attempted pass failed on the Longhorn try for conversion. As the first half came to an end, both teams were even at 6-6.

Touchdowns in the third period came few and far between as neither team found daylight in the others defense. Two fumbles brought the Longhorns to a halt on two different occasions while the Cowboys were forced to punt.

Late in the third quarter, after recovering a Bronte fumble on the Longhorn 49, the Cowboys found the pickings easy and a freak play gave them their final touchdown. Using a powerful running attack, the Bulldogs marched to the 10 yard line from where they scored. Holliday started off tackle and a bone jarring tackle resulted in a fumble that succeeded in rolling over the foal line where Sullivan pounced on the loose pigskin for the touchdown. Behind outstanding block, Sullivan pushed over for the extra point to give the Cowboys a 14-6 lead.

Immediately after receiving the kickoff, the Longhorns wasted little time in starting for the double stripe. Moving from the 20, Arrott picked up nine yards and Grace picked up two for the first down. Grace then hit Corley with a pass good for seven yards to the 38. Dee Arrott then brought the crowd to its feet as he skirted end and raced 31 yards before being knocked out of bounds on the Woodson 31. Mickey Black then gained five yards but a four yard loss held the Longhorns on the 30. Albert Grace then put the Longhorns on the 10 yard line as he picked up 20 yards around left end. Corley picked up three and Arrott added six to the one. Arrott found an opening off tackle and went into the end zone for the score. Again the Longhorns failed to convert and the Cowboys had a 14-12 win as the final whistle sounded.

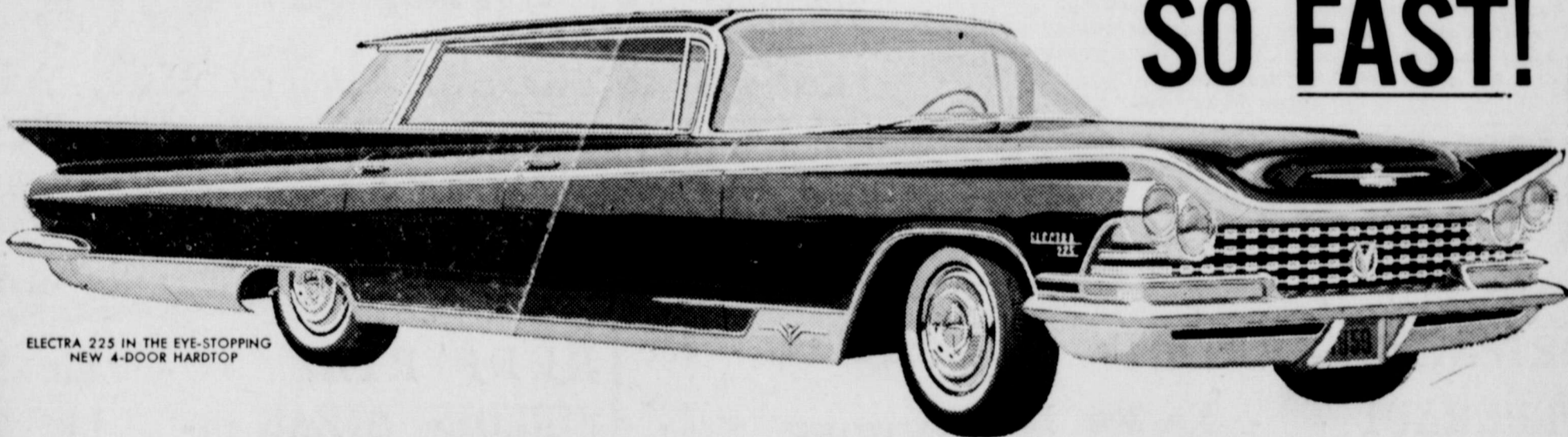

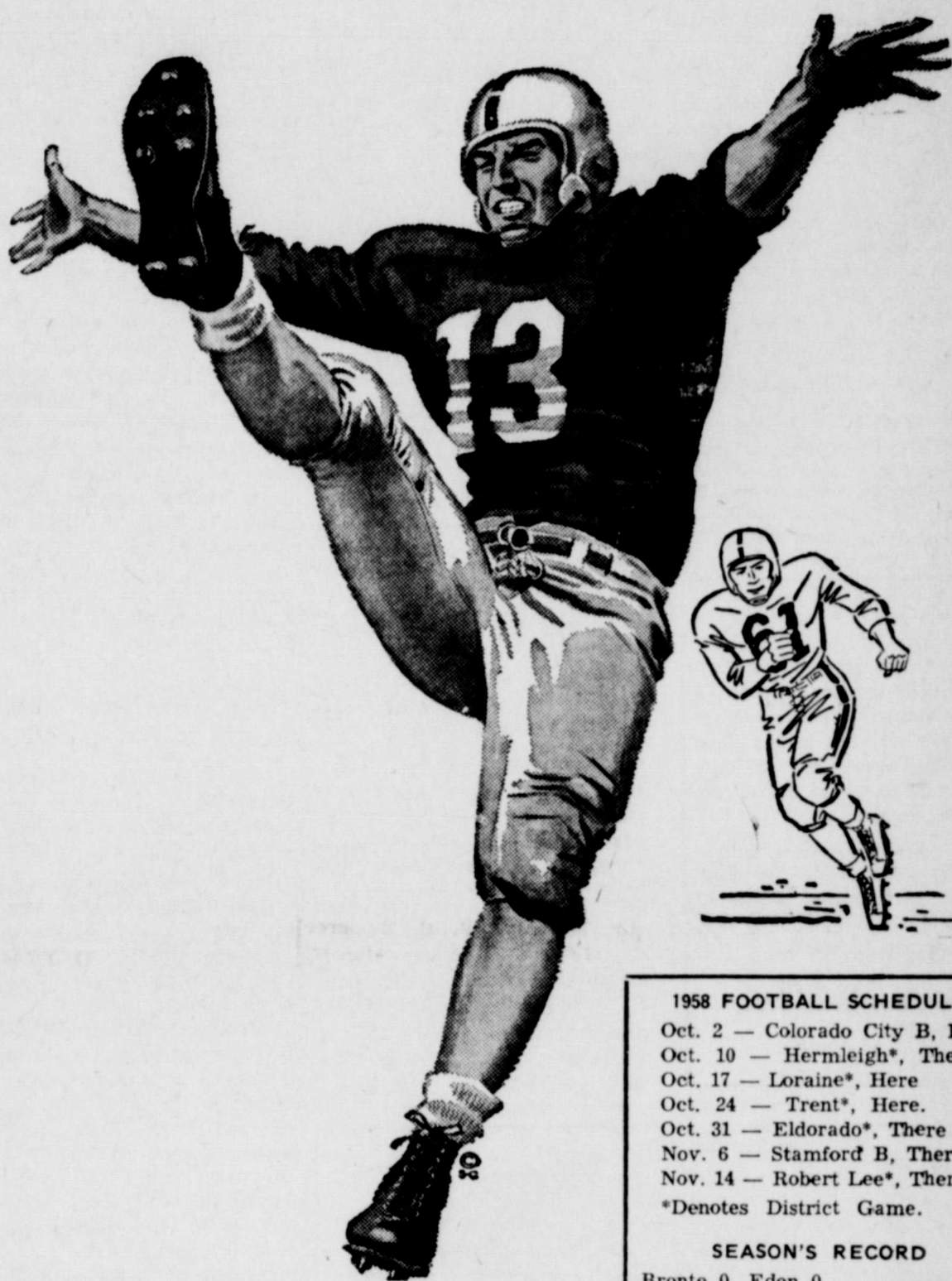
