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Longhorns Face Tough Squad Of Hermleigh Cardinals Tonight

Rough goings will be on tab for Bronte Longhorns tonight as they probably will be up against their roughest opposition of the season. The Longhorns will take the field at 7:30 to face the Hermleigh Cardinals in the district opener for both teams. The contest will be played on the Cardinals home field.

Not since 1954 have the Long-

horns downed the Hermleigh bunch, but the game has always turned out to be a bang up affair. The Longhorns lost out to the Cardinals 7-6 last year and in 1956, the Cardinals sneaked by the Bronte team 6-0. In 1955, Hermleigh came out winner in another close contest by a score of 25-20. The score in '54 was 19-18 in the Longhorns favor.

Both teams are strong this year and are rated as high contenders

for the district champion spot. A large backfield will be the only advantage that Hermleigh will hold over Bronte as the two teams have lines that weigh in at an average between 185-190 pounds per man. The Cardinals will be operating with a backfield that will average close to 180 pounds. The Longhorns will be running with a 155 pound average in their secondary.

Hermleigh holds a 3-2 record in the season having beaten Roby, Roscoe and Aspermont. Their two losses came at the hands of Coahoma and Knox City. The Cardinals have rolled up 80 points to their opposition's 60.

On the other side of the line, the Longhorns have amassed two wins, one defeat and one tie. The local lads have downed Wylie and the Colorado City B team and they lost to a strong Woodson team. Eden held the Longhorns to a scoreless tie in the Longhorn's opener. Bronte has scored 52 points while they have held their opponents to but 14 points.

Both teams will be in top condition and an excellent game is promised to all Bronte backers who wish to travel to Hermleigh.

The Longhorns will be without the services of two linemen tonight as Bobby Wrinkle is still out and Stover Taylor received a fractured foot in last week's game. Wrinkle is expected to return to the Longhorn lineup next week, but Taylor is probably out for the remainder of the season.

Free donuts and coffee will be served and free gifts will be presented to all visitors.

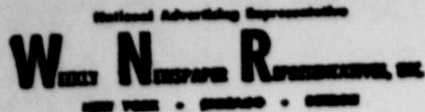

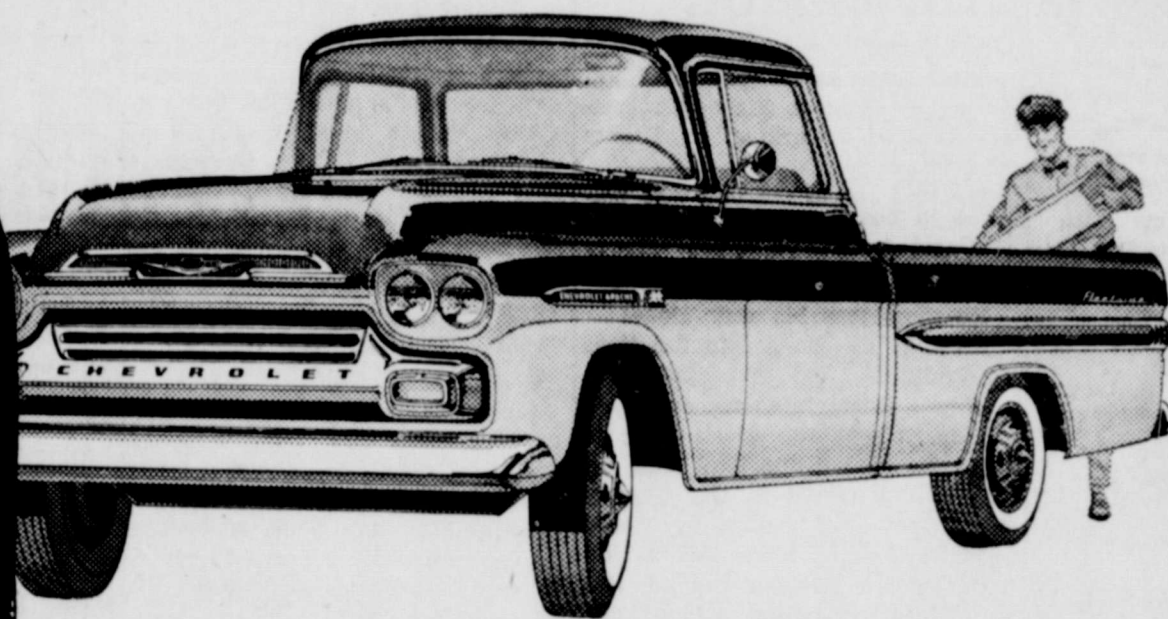
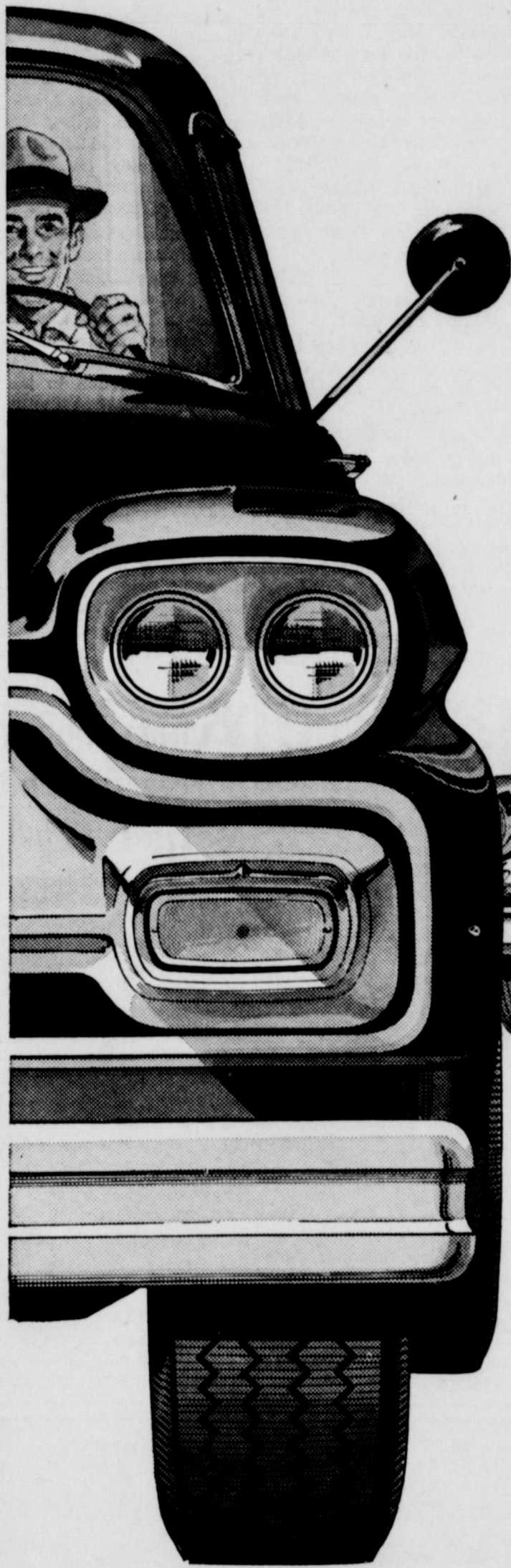

Rowland came to Goodfellow in March this year after serving at Yamato Air Station in Japan. He began his career in the military service as an infantry rifleman and was in combat for 27 months, during World War II, serving with the 36th Infantry Division of the Texas National Guard.

It was on the battlefield of Cassino, Italy, in 1943 that the young soldier made a promise to God: that if he survived, he would spend the rest of his life serving God.

By the end of World War II, Rowland had earned his way up to the position of Sgt. Major and returned to civilian life. Before entering study for the ministry, he served a time with the procurement department of civil service.

In January, 1952, he entered the Air Force as a Chaplain after completing his seminary work. Besides this, he holds a B. S. and M. S. degree in Education. He also is the holder of five major battle stars and the Bronze Star medal for combat action in the Italian Campaign and Southern France during World War II.

He is well qualified to speak on the topic for discussion Tuesday night, "Keeping Faith With the Younger Generation."

Devotional for the meeting will be given by Marsha Campbell. A short business session will be held and yearbooks distributed.

Bank Deposits Show Increase Over Last Year

Deposits at the First National Bank in Bronte showed a substantial increase over the previous quarter when a call was made for a statement of condition on Sept. 24.

The call late last month showed a total of \$2,348,257.37 on deposit. Of this amount \$2,142,650.44 was deposited in regular checking accounts and \$205,606.93 was on time deposit.

The above figures show a \$38,470.19 increase over the \$2,309,787.18 which was on deposit at the last call for the statement on June 23. It is also \$134,025.18 higher than the amount on deposit approximately a year before when a statement dated Oct. 11 showed deposits at \$2,214,232.19.

Loans shown by the September statement amount to \$580,856.69, compared to \$568,047.70 a year ago. Likewise undivided profits were up some \$18,000, with \$90,520.12 in this account last month, compared with \$72,817.92 last October. This figure brings capital accounts of the First National up to more than \$240,000.

Total assets and liabilities at the September call amounted to \$2,588,777.49.

Longhorns Easily Roll By Colorado City 'B' Team 22-0

A sparse and wet crowd saw the Bronte Longhorns defeat the Colorado City B team last Thursday night as wet weather hampered the action of both teams and the turn-out of Bronte fans. Bronte's second victory came by way of a 22-0 score.

A muddy field slowed the Longhorns and the Wolves to a slow pace as the Longhorns managed to score in the first, third and fourth periods. The Longhorns counted for a touchdown and a safety in the first quarter and one touchdown in each of the last two stanzas. The Wolves offense failed to go against a Longhorn line that badly outweighed them.

After taking the opening kickoff on their 41, the Longhorns drove

to the one yard line where they ran up against a stonewall. After yielding to the Wolves, the Bronte defense dug in and on the first play from scrimmage Stover Taylor broke through the C-City line and nailed the ball carrier behind the double stripe for the two pointer.

Until the waning seconds of the first period, both teams battled at midfield with neither being able to go against the other. The Longhorns went to the Wolves 36 but were unable to go any farther and C-City took over on downs. After picking up two yards in two plays, the Wolves attempted a pass that was intercepted by Benny Corley. Snaring the ball on the Wolves 45 yard line, Corley picked up beautiful blocking and went over standing up for the Longhorns' first six pointer. The extra point try was missed and at the end of the first period, the Longhorns held an 8-0 lead.

Early in the second quarter, the Bronte team let two scoring chances slip by as they drove deep into the Wolves end of the field. After taking a punt on their 28, the Longhorns used a strong ground attack behind outstanding blocking by the big line to move to the 13 yard line. After being held, the Longhorns received another break that they did not take advantage of. Lanny Denman jarred the ball carrier loose from the ball and then recovered to give the Longhorns possession on the Wolves 9 yard line. Four plays later, the Longhorns again yielded to the Wolves on the 19 yard line. Two plays later, the first half came to an end with the Longhorns still leading 8-0.

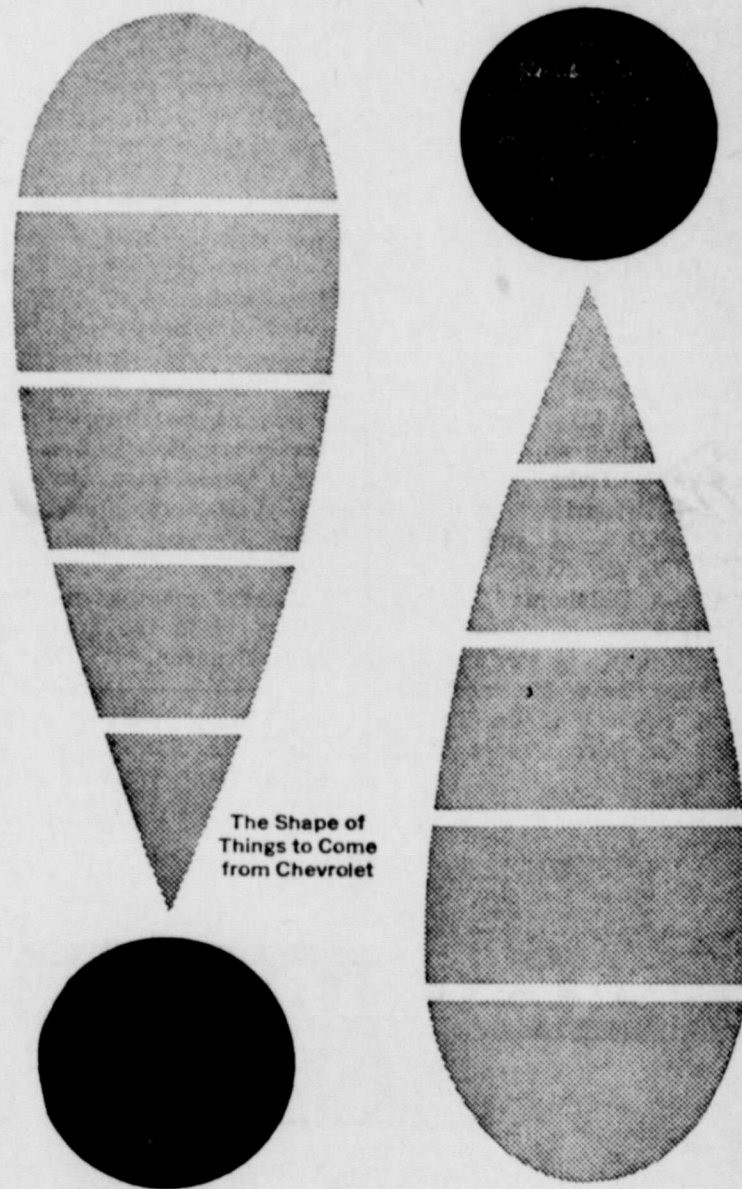

The question has arisen and must arise in each operators mind as he is buying — what will the market be next year or when I go to market with these animals? No one knows, but the economists have plotted the trends.

At the present, indications are that neither will change a great deal, up or down, except for local changes such as we are having now brought on by the surplus of grass.

The outlook, following present trends, is different for swine. The number of slaughtered hogs is expected to increase this fall, then increase still more in the spring and next fall.

We mention the hog market because some operators and also economists are wondering what effect cheaper pork and cheaper poultry may have on the beef cattle and sheep markets. They possibly should be taken into consideration, particularly in the long range outlook.

This is National Fire Prevention week. The best defense against fire is fire prevention. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council reports that by not giving fire a place to start, the Nation's annual fire losses of about 150 million could be cut in half.

H D Agent's News Dept.

I had a good time in Dallas over the weekend. Marjorie Gladys Rives looked very pretty in the State Dress Revue and I'm certain you all would have been proud of her representing Coke County as I was if you had seen the Revue.

The fair is as big and vast as advertised and while I didn't have time to see nearly all of it I did see some beautiful and interesting exhibits.

Since its fall house cleaning time let's see if we can do something about those crowded closets! If you have to cram all of your clothes into one small closet, perhaps a different arrangement will help solve your problem.

Extension home management specialists suggest starting at the top of the closet with hats. A square hat box uses the shelf space to better advantage than a round one. Find a box as large as the shelf will take, so more than one hat can be tucked into it.

Liberal use of tissue paper keeps the hats in good condition. If shelf space is limited, perhaps a second shelf can be added. This higher shelf will be good storage space for seasonal items or anything that is seldom used.

Lower down, the rod for hangars might be changed from a single one, the full width of the closet, to two shorter ones installed from back to front. This arrangement adds space and convenience especially in shallow and wide closets.

On your rod or rods, hang garments by sections according to lengths, blouses to the back or end, then suits and skirts and lastly, dresses. Under the short pieces you will have storage room for out of season garments.

If your closet is still too stuffed, take a good look at your wardrobe. A garment you haven't worn in months probably isn't so valuable to you as the closet room. Store out-of-season clothing carefully to make room for seasonal garments.

Good closet accessories will help keep your wardrobe in good condition. You can make your own shoe bags, hat boxes, glove boxes and dress covers. Directions are given in a new extension bulletin.

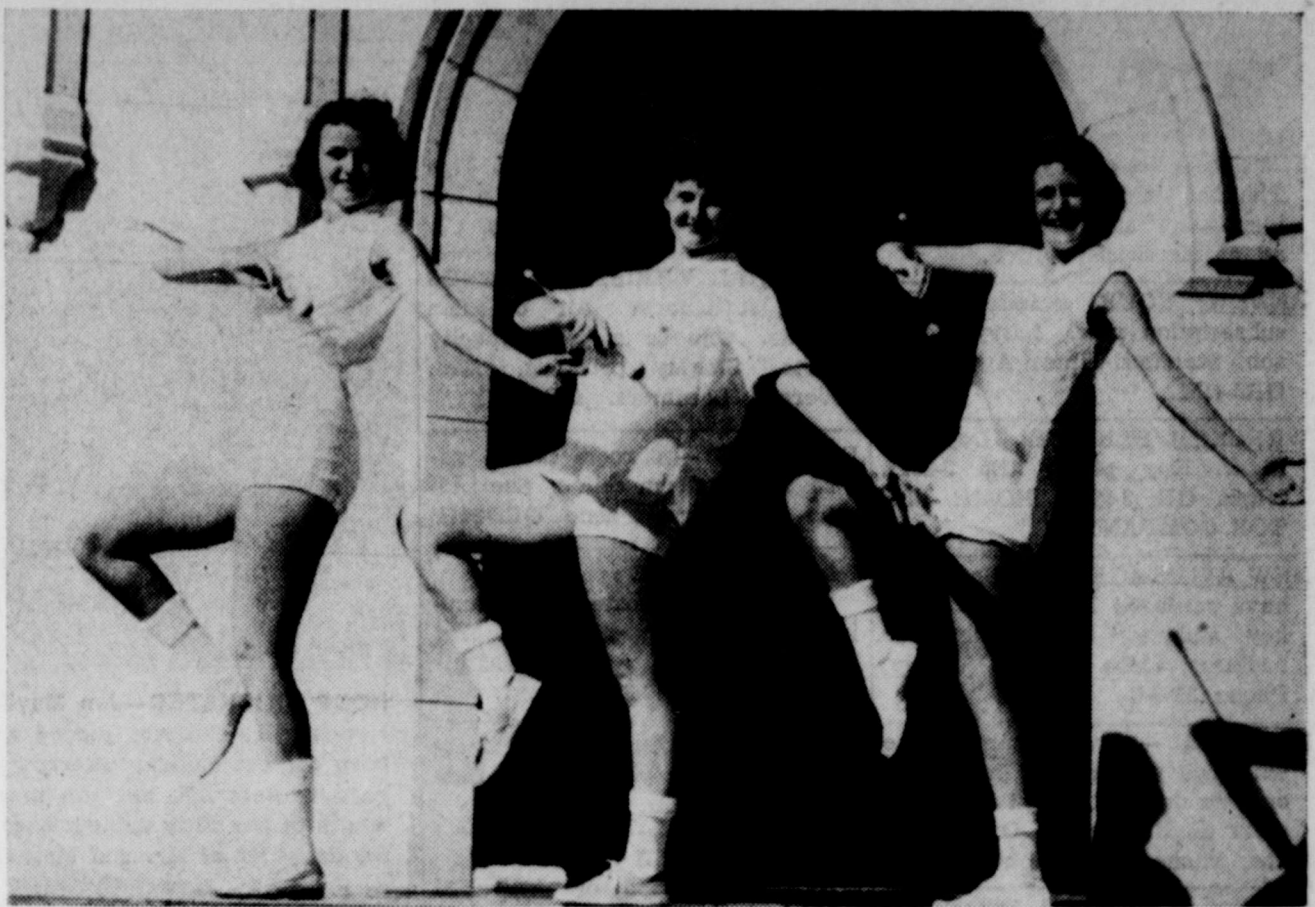
A range survey has been made on the R. L. Herring ranch in the southeast corner of Coke County prior to the development of a conservation plan. Range surveys are made to give some estimate of the productivity of the range and treatment necessary for maintenance and/or improvement.

Assistance with range problems and conservation plans can be obtained from local Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting Coke Soil Conservation District.

A survey made in 1957 shows that there are a total of 342,000 farm ponds in Texas. These ponds had an original total storage of 932,000 acre feet. When the survey was made an estimated 100,000 acre feet of the original capacity had been filled by silt.

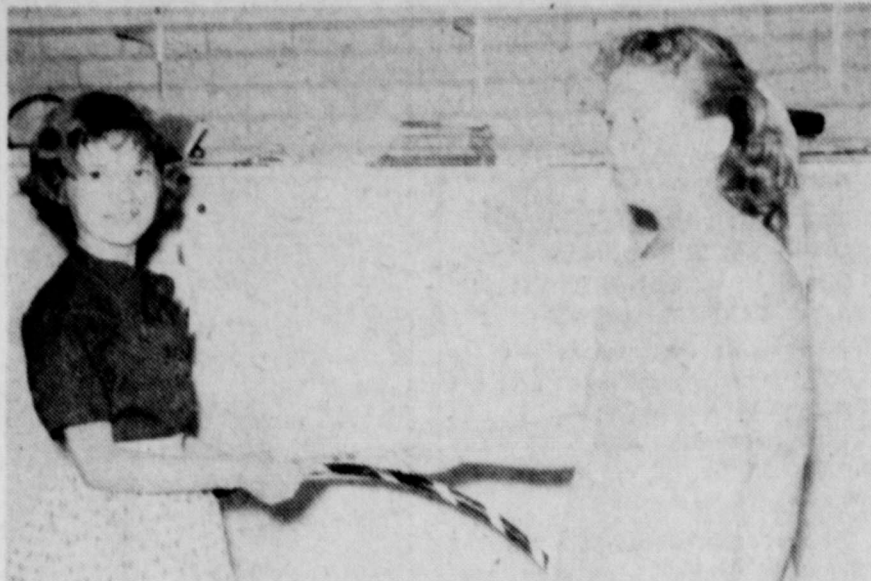
