Council Trades Small Land Tract To Joe G. Wilkins

The city council in a meeting last Friday night traded a small tract of land, located south of the road at the Ballinger highway lake, to Joe George Wilkins for a lot in the south part of Bronte.

The lot traded for is located in the new addition being opened up by Wilkins and his mother, Mrs. Annie Wilkins. Due to the fact that no space was left in the new addition for a street going through to the San Angelo highway, the council voted to trade for the property so that new residents in the vicinity will have easy access to their homes from the highway.

Other business transacted by the council included approval of bills against the city.

Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, said the city's finances are looking up somewhat since tax money has been coming in for more than a month. She said the general fund is down relatively low, as a note was recently paid off at the First National Bank. This money was borrowed to use in buying right of way for widening Highway 277.

Mrs. Kirkland reported to the council that \$2,636.24 had been collected in taxes.

They include quarterback Albert Grace, lineman Dean Black and Stover Taylor.

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Audit Shows Details of School Deficit; Public Meeting Called

Public Invited to School Meeting

Patrons of the Bronte Independent School are invited and urged to be present next Tuesday night at a public meeting in the school auditorium. This meeting is being held in conjunction with a regular meeting of the Parent-Teacher Association. Main purpose of calling this meeting is to explain the school's financial problems to the people of this area.

As readers will note in the school audit and in the story to the right, Bronte School had a considerable deficit at the end of the 1957-58 school year. Members of the board of trustees wish to talk over the matter with the public and hear opinions from patrons on what to do about the problem.

Time for the meeting is 7:30 p. m.

In this issue of The Enterprise is published an audit for Bronte Independent School District for the period, Sept. 1, 1957, to Aug. 31, 1958. Figures published in this audit were compiled by Niemeir & Pierce, public accountants of Lubbock.

School officials, both on the board of trustees and in the administration, were particularly anxious to have the audit in this issue of the paper, so that local school patrons will be able to acquaint themselves with the finances of the school prior to the public meeting scheduled for next Tuesday night.

Every page of the audit as compiled by Niemeir & Pierce is not included in the published report, as school officials did not consider detailed repetition of some of the material of sufficient importance to warrant the expense of publication. Among the material omitted are detailed schedules of state and county money received

in various funds, totals of which are included in other tables; the table showing reconciliation of the school's books with bank statements and a table showing various insurance policies owned by the school. Officials of the school say that any person interested in seeing these tables is more than welcome to come by the school office and examine them.

The table published show the following information:

1. Questions and answers by the auditor pertinent to the handling of school finances and keeping records on them.
2. An analysis of assessed valuation and taxes levied in the district.
3. A recapitulation of receipts and disbursements in the four funds of the school.
4. A detailed table of receipts and disbursements for each of the four funds of the school.
5. A table showing bonded indebtedness and notes owed by the school district.

Readers will note that the audit shows a deficit at the end of the last school year of \$22,806.47. This figure has been reduced since the audit was completed to \$16,875.56. Either money or the promise of money in the amount of \$5,930.91 have been received from the state or county since the audit was completed.

School officials say the deficit was caused by three factors, all hitting at once:

1. The school had to bear the cost of a teacher pay increase recently voted by the legislature. This item cost \$7,231.28 last year.
2. A decrease in state money made available. A total of \$11,839.48 was the amount of the cut

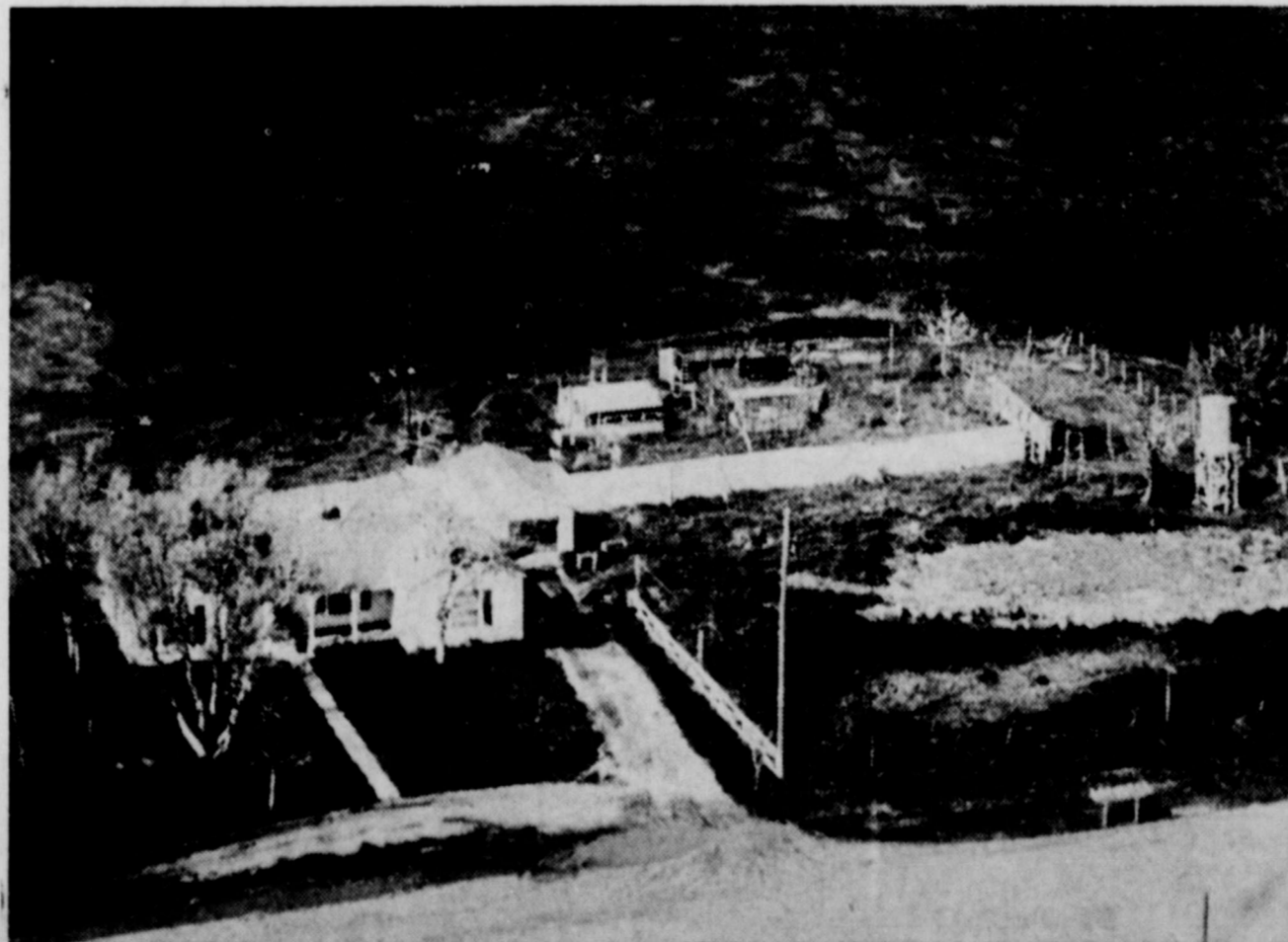
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Bronte Independent School Increase in Value of Assets for 5 Years

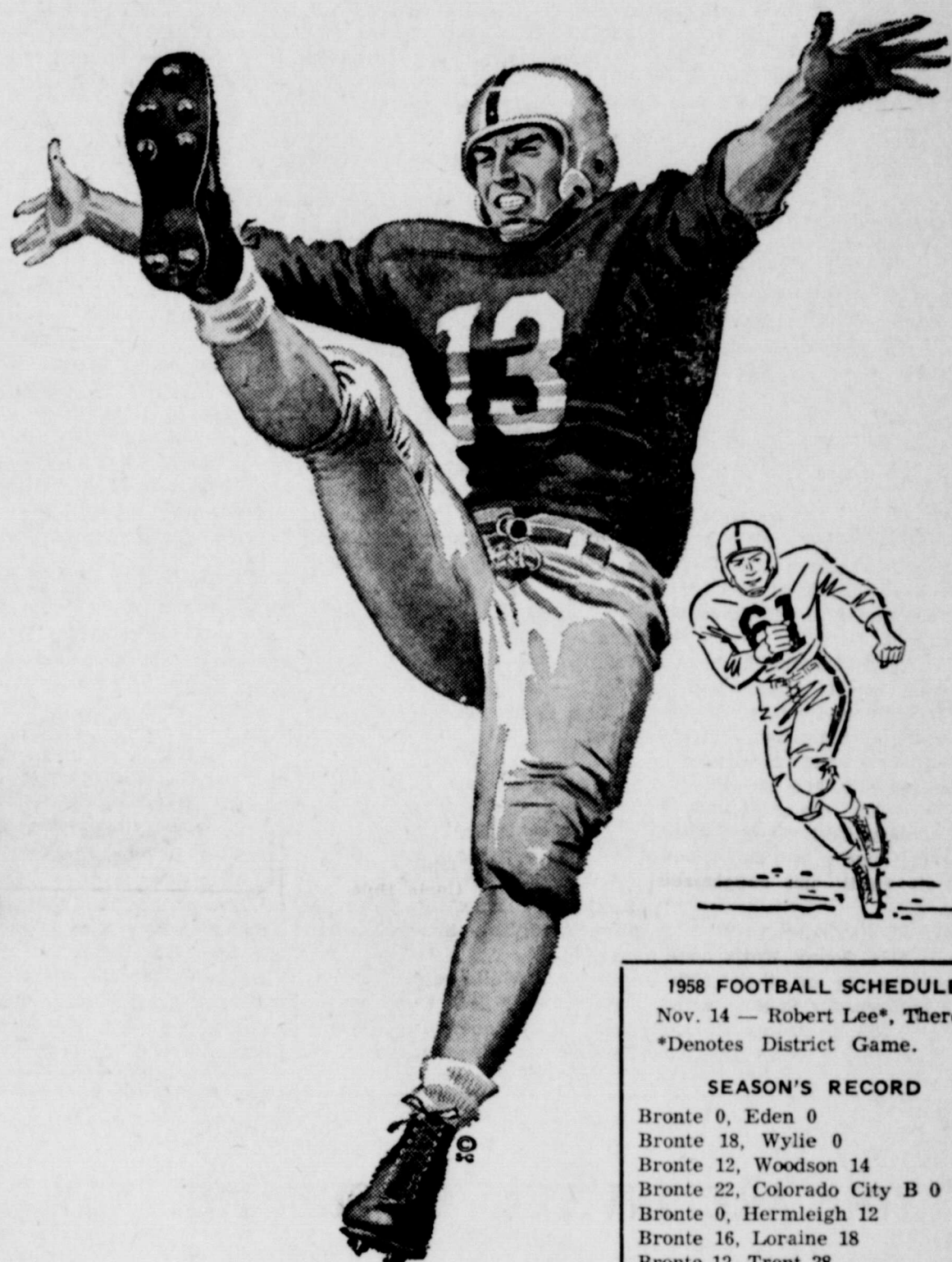

Mr. Bishop, representative for Coke and neighboring counties, will address the group following a buffet type meal. The club members feel honored to have Mr. Bishop present for the occasion.

Another highlight of the evening for the club members will be the presentation of awards for outstanding work during the year. Approximately 50 girls, boys and leaders will receive recognition for their achievements. Ninety-three county, district, leader and year pen awards will be made, the largest number ever presented in Coke County.

Deer Hunting Season Opens Sunday, Nov. 16

Deer hunting season opens Sunday, Nov. 16, and continues through Dec. 31. This is the second successive year that Coke County has been open for deer hunting.

Game Warden Glen Crooks says the law provides hunting hours are from 30 minutes before sunrise until 30 minutes after sunset, and that the bag limit is two bucks for the entire season.

Persons must have a license to hunt deer or turkey, even on their own property. The license costs \$3.15 and includes two tags, one of which must be attached to each slain deer. Persons under 17 and over 65 years of age are exempt from being required to have a license.

Mr. Crooks also points out that it is illegal to hunt on any property, (whether or not it is posted) without permission of the owner or operator.

No estimate of the number of deer killed in Coke County last year has been made, but the figure might run as high as fifty. The animals seem fairly plentiful again this season, but some think they have been scattered. Feed is very plentiful everywhere and any game taken this fall will be in good condition.

Persons who sell hunting privi-

leges are required to obtain a license at the office of County Clerk J. L. Tinkler. So far those registering hunting leases include Bert Blaylock, Clark Glenn and James Arrott.

As most of you know, we have had a lot of trouble with rats and mice in the country this year. These little rodents cause a lot of damage to feed in the barn as well as giving trouble in our homes.

In September, the 4-H club sponsored a drive to control rats and mice and we feel like it did a lot of good. However, more control measures should be taken if we want to get better results.

We have arranged to have a man from the Rodent Control Service in Coke County on Tuesday, November 18, to give demonstrations on rat and mice control. One demonstration will be at J. D. Huffaker's place located one mile east of Juniper School and will start at 9:00 o'clock Tuesday morning.

The other demonstration will be at Pat Havins farm south of

Robert Lee at 2:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Key Feed Store at Robert Lee and Bronte Feed and Supply at Bronte will handle the rat bait. Everyone interested in rat and mice control is invited to attend one of these demonstrations. I'm sure that the Rodent Control Service representative will be glad to discuss your problems with you on rats and mice.

in state money.

3. A decrease in valuations of oil property and a proportionate decrease in taxes. School taxes levied for 1956 amounted to \$114,214.00, while the 1957 total was \$101,114.00, a drop of \$13,114.00.

A total of the above figures shows that with the two cuts in income and with the increase in teacher pay, the school actually had \$32,171.48 less on which to operate last year than it did the year before.

Supt. Garland Black said that by cutting every possible expense the school was able to absorb approximately half of the shortage.

The above figures deal entirely with the school's operation and maintenance fund and do not include a note for \$4,000 which is owed by the transportation fund. This fund's deficit is \$1,000 lower than 1956-57 when transportation owed a \$5,000 note, which was paid off during last year, the period covered by the audit.

Supt. Black pointed out that another reason for the financial

straits of the local district is the fact that debt retirement payments are an unusually large part of the budget. Payment on the new elementary building this year will run \$20,000 in principal and \$4,988.38 in interest. Bronte's bonded indebtedness is set up to be retired in ten years, whereas most schools retire their bonds in 20 years, and many of the larger schools take as much as 30 years.

The Bronte school board has expressed itself as being in favor of economy in school operation, but not to the point where it will impede pupil progress. They say they are definitely not in favor of cutting out anything which would jeopardize the standing of the school with any accrediting agency or with the State Board of Education.

Readers of The Enterprise are requested by the trustees to study the audit carefully in order to acquaint themselves with the problem facing the Bronte School.
