#### **Burglars Take Small Amounts** In 2 Break-Ins

Amateurish burglaries here the past week have resulted in small loses to Bronte School and Spencer Grocery and Station. The office of High School Principal Joe Simpson was broken into Tuesday night. Simpson said the burglars took \$13.25, but left a larger amount of money in the vault. They entered by opening a window of the building and then entering the office through the transom.

Garland Spencer, owner of the station and grocery, said his place was broken into Thursday night of last week. He, too, said the burglars were not to ambitious, and took only 75 to 100 pennies which he had left in his cash register, some cigarettes and cold drinks. He said candy and other small items might have been taken but it was hard to say for sure.

Both Simpson and Spencer said the break-ins were apparently the work of youngstrs.
