## **Schools to Conduct Annual Clothing Drive for Needy**

Beginning next Monday, Bronte school children will bring bundles of used clothing to school during World Clothing Week. According to Supt. Garland Black, the drive will continue through Friday and shoes and bedding to clothe one million orphaned and needy children and adults in the United States and overseas. World Clothing Week is conducted by the schools in cooperation with the Christian's Children's Fund, Inc., an international charitable organization to assist orphans and other needy children in the United States and thirty-six foreign countries over-

The bedding is distributed during disaster emergency situations, such as floods, tornadoes, or earth-Every student will be given literature to take home explaining the purpose of the drive and asking cooperation of parents


