Members of the committee brought out that pledges of any size will be welcome. They also pointed out that contributors may spread their payments out over a

period of a year if they wish. In order to build the home at Bronte, local residents must furnish one-fourth of the estimated cost of the project. The \$347,000 project would provide a home for 68 elderly persons. It will be operated by the Methodist Church but admission to the home will be open to persons of all faiths.




