Lofland said Wednesday morning that construction will begin on their new yard just as soon as possible after Feb. 15. It will be located just east of the railroad and will face south on the Robert Lee highway.

Three buildings will be construced for use of the new yard. The office building will be 20x60; the lumber shed will be 20x132 and a cement house will be 20x24. Mr. Elliott moved to Coke County December 2, 1958, and has caught six bobcats and one coyote to date. Mr. Elliott and his wife live ten miles north of Robert Lee on the Baze ranch now operated by S. E. Adams.

The bobcats were caught on the Harris ranch, leased by J. O. Rudd, and the Bert Blaylock ranch. The coyote was trapped last week on Tom Williams place about five miles south of Bronte.

Coke County Trappers Association is the organization responsible for obtaining a trapper to control predatory animals. The association is also responsible for helping pay the expense of employing a government trapper and this is done by each member paying 50c per section each month.

Every rancher is invited to become a member of this association and help control predatory ani-







County Agents News Column

The weather conditions existing as this is being written are not what the sheep men that are lambing would prefer for lambing, but at least we are receiving some badly needed moisture. Staying on the optimistic side, we hope it will warm up and at the same time continue to rain at more frequent intervals. As close as we are to spring, subsoil and surface moisfrom Denver City Tuesday visit- ture conditions must improve before we can get too jubilant about the coming pasture and crop

Several people have called us her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dink lately in regard to pruning trees, Beaver. Donna spent three days both ornamental and fruit trees. January and February are generally considered to be the best months in which to prune trees. Since January has already past. the job should be done at your earliest convenience.

Pruning is done for a purpose. Either to shape a tree, or to remove dead or excess limbs, or to make a shade. You with that in mind before you commence pruning, decide on a shape to shoot for, then prune to achieve your goal. Mike Payne, also of Stanton.
