School Board Calls Election Feb. 28 to Vote on Tax Rate

Bronte school board has called an election for Saturday, Feb. 28. It will be held in the city hall at Bronte. Purpose of the election is to vote on raising the school tax rate in the Bronte District.

The proposed raise would increase the tax rate for maintenance and operation from 75 cents per \$100 valuation to \$1.50. The bond requirement tax of 50 cents per \$100 would remain as it is, which would actually set the maximum school tax rate at \$2.00 per \$100.

If the election carries, it would in effect give the school board authority to set the tax rate according to anticipated needs each year, not to exceed the \$1.50 rate.

Need for an increase in school taxes has been apparent for some time, as the school's expenditures have been exceeding receipts for the past two years. It is estimated that at the end of the cur-

rent year, Aug. 31, 1959, the deficit will have increased to approximately \$40,000.

A public meeting was held Monday night to explain the situation to local residents. Similar meetings have been held in the past to explain the school's financial troubles to various groups.

If the tax election carries, it will authorize the school to operate under a law known as Senate Bill 116. As stated above, this law provides for setting the maximum operation and maintenance tax at \$1.50 per \$100. It also provides that all expenses of the school must be met from the operation and maintenance tax, including the repayment debt.

D. K. Glenn will be election judge for the forthcoming election.

Meeting Called To Form Water Control District

A meeting of all landowners having property on the Kickapoo watershed has been called for 7:30 p. m. next Tuesday night, Feb. 17, at the city hall in Bronte. Purpose of the meeting is to organize a Water Control and Improvement District for this area.

F. S. Higginbotham, chairman of a steering committee which is working on water control dams on the Kickapoo Creeks, said the time has come when further progress on the project is dependent on the formation of an organization with the power to transact business.

Higginbotham said he and his committee are very encouraged with prospects for the dams for this area. Coke County Commissioner's Court has set aside \$18,500 for costs of preliminary planning on the project. The actual construction costs will be financed by the federal government.

Higginbotham urged that all landowners on the watershed be present for the meeting next Tuesday night.

Funeral services for Choice Anderson (Happy) Bradshaw, 47, of Anson were held in the Bronte Church of Christ Sunday afternoon at 2 p. m. Melvin Placke, minister for the church, officiated. Burial followed in the Fairview cemetery here under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Mr. Bradshaw, former Bronte resident and a trucking contractor, died Friday of a heart attack in Tullia, Texas. He was stricken at an elevator there, where he was hauling grain, and was pronounced dead on arrival at a hospital.

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Everyone is invited to the big Parent-Teachers Valentine Festival to be held at the local school Saturday night. The luncheon will open at 6 p. m. and will begin serving a spaghetti supper. Italian style spaghetti and green salad will be featured on the menu, along with cake, pie, coffee and hot bread. PTA officials stressed that those persons on the various committees are responsible for getting their stands erected and having their materials in place in time for the Festival. Events have been planned in the basement of the high school building, the lunchroom, the auditorium and several rooms in the elementary building.

The Carnival this year represents a departure from some of the customs of previous years. Coronation of the school queens took place last fall and the talent program will replace it as the finale of the festival. The spaghetti supper has been scheduled instead of the usual spanish room and a number of new games and concessions will be in operation.

All proceeds from this event will be used by the local Parent-Teachers organization for needed projects at the school. During the past two years, the PTA has placed both an eye and ear testing machine for use by the school nurse in testing the sight and hearing of the Bronte school children.

New Addition to Kickapoo Church To Add 2240 Sq. Ft.

The new addition to the Kickapoo Baptist Church is progressing "faster than we ever expected", Rev. R. W. Blackmon, the pastor, said this week. The new structure which is being built on the rear of the sanctuary, is 32 by 70 feet and contains 2240 square feet of additional floor space.

The new addition is being built by Jack and James Lee. Rev. Blackmon said he and his entire congregation are more than pleased with the way workmen have "gone up" with the structure.

The addition contains eight rooms...two large rooms, 13 by 26 and 18 by 22, will be used for assembly rooms and class rooms. There is also a new kitchen, utility closet and halls. The other rooms, which will be used for classrooms, range in size from 9 by 13 to 18 by 22.

The entire building will be air conditioned with evaporative type coolers. Complete plumbing and heating facilities are being installed along with the construction work.

The building will be completed at a cost of about \$7,000, Rev. Blackmon said.

The Kickapoo church has been located in town only about four years. The church was moved into town from about five miles north of Bronte and a new sanctuary constructed.

Fire Destroys Home in Bronte

A wind-fanned blaze destroyed the home of the C. H. Brown family Monday night. The fire started about 9 o'clock, apparently from defective wiring in the attic. The house was owned by Marion Mitchell of Pecos. It was located in the western edge of Bronte north of the Robert Lee highway.

The Brown family was not at home at the time the fire started. He is an oil truck driver, employed by Scurlock Oil Co.

Quite a few of the household articles of the family were saved from the fire, including a refrigerator, deep freeze, washing machine, two mattresses and part of their clothing.

Mr. and Mrs. Brown have four children, a daughter, 14, and three sons, ages 11, 7, and 3.

The children have been taken to Sweetwater to stay with relatives and Mr. and Mrs. Brown are staying temporarily with Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Dunklin. Mrs. Brown said they would probably move to Sweetwater where they own a home.

The Bronte volunteer fire department was at the scene of the blaze in a short time after the alarm was turned in and although unable to save much of the structure, they prevented the fire by being spread by the wind.
