There were several grand-LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, PROHIBITING THE son's and one granddaughter also SALE OF BEER FROM THE HOUR OF 12:00 O'CLOCK absent. MIDNIGHT TO 6:00 O'CLOCK A. M., PROVIDING FURTHER THAT ON SUNDAYS THAT BEER SHALL NOT BE SOLD REFORE 12:00 O'CLOCK NOON: PRESCRIBING A PENALTY group. AND PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE-COME EFFECTIVE FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE AND PUBLICATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD, TEXAS:

- 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell beer, as it is defined by laws of this state, from the hour of 12:00(twelve)O'clock Midnight to 6:00(six)O'clock A. M., providing that on Sundays beer shall not be sold before 12:00 (twelve) O'clock noon.
- 2. Any person, firm or corporation violating this ordinance shall be punished by having the license issued by the City of Baird, Texas, to such person, firm or corporation,
- 3. Each illegal sale of beer shall be a separate offense. 4. This ordinance shall become effective from and after its

(The following letter accompanied Miss Ledbetter's "Old Bill" entry)

"Many wonderful improvements have been made since 1904. Then we had lights only, costing five dollars monthly in advance. We used about ten kilowatt-hours, a rate about ten times as high as today.

"The West Texas Utilities since has become one of the finest institutions any town can have. They give the best of service. They've lowered the rate until today electricity is a small item compared to other living costs.
