# Meeting Called to Study Rabies Problem in County

(From Robert Lee Observer)

County and city officials have arranged for a public meeting next Monday when a definite program will be set up to combat the serious rabies outbreak which has spread through Coke County.

Dr. George A. Martin, veterinarian of public health of the State Health Dept. at Austin, will be here to advise local authorities on what action may be taken to eradicate the terrible disease.

Dr. Martin has had wide experience in this work and assisted in stamping out rabes in other communities in recent years. City and county officials, medical doctor,s county agents, government George Powers, a brother-in-law, for some time. trappers and all persons interested are invited to be present.

The meeting has been set for 1 o'clock next Monday afternoon at Delmir Sheppard and Ell Hatley June, 1941 through June, 1946 in the district court room in Robert Lee.

Rabies is getting to be an everincreasing danger in this area. From reports received here in the last few weeks, it appears that it is more prevalent in the west part of the county than it is in the immediate vicinty of Bronte. However, we heard only ths week that a rabid fox had been killed north of town and that a cow, southeast of town, was believed to have had the disease.

With the large number of stray dogs which are running loose in Bronte chances for the disease to crop up right here in town are increased a great deal.

Through the efforts of interested persons in Robert Lee, a meeting has been called for next Monday to work out a plan of attacking the outbreak. We certainly feel that Coke County Commissioners should do whatever is necessary to prevent this dread disease from spreading further.

We now the chances for getting rabies here in town would be lessened a great deal if all dogs and other pets were vaccinated. Those which are not given shots should be dispatched at once to wherever good dogs go when they die.


Rev. Blackmon said an all-out effort is being made to break attendance records at Sunday school this coming Sunday. He said a goal of 130 has been set.




