Former Bronte Youth Star of District 3A Basketball Champs

A former Bronte boy has distinguished himself during the past basketball season as a key man on the District 3AAA championship basketball team of Lake View. He is Jimmy Tomlinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Tomlinson of San Angelo.

Not only was Tomlinson on the District Championship team, but he also tied for high scorer in district season play. He made a total of 135 points for 16.9 average in district play.

In addition to his record in district play, Tomlinson was given honorable mention on the all-state selections for Class AAA school boy basketball.

Jimmy is a former student in the Bronte schools, having moved to San Angelo with his parents a few years ago. His sister, Mrs. LeDrew Arott, still resides in Bronte.

Red Cross Has Collected \$273.75; Help Is Needed

Coke countians have contributed \$273.75, a little more than a fourth of the \$1020 quota, to the annual Red Cross drive for funds. H. A. Springer, county chairman said Wednesday morning that the drive is coming along fine and that he hoped workers would make their contacts and get their money in as soon as possible.

Robert Lewis Jay, Robert Lee band director and teacher, is the county fund chairman. He reported \$156.00 turned in at Robert Lee and Springer reported \$117.75 turned in at Bronte to make the \$273.75 total.

Springer said he would like to meet the quota and conclude the drive as soon as possible. He urged that everybody contribute liberally to carry on the disaster relief work of the Red Cross.

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Five On Ticket For Trustee of Bronte School

Up to the time of the deadline for filing last Thursday five candidates' names had been placed on the ballot for school trustee. Only two vacancies exist, thus developing a contest for the positions.

In addition to Edward Cumbie and Hurlin Lee, incumbents, the names of Joe George Wilkins, Matthew Caperton and Dr. Dean Adams were filed for places on the ticket.

The school trustee election will be held Saturday, March 4. Absentee voting will be permitted from 20 days until three days before the election.

Holdover school trustees include Allen Sherrod, Luther McCutchen, Jacob Bruce Morrow, Conda Richards and Joe Rawlings.

Members of the board have been putting in many hours of work the past few weeks in their quest for a superintendent to replace Garland Black, who has resigned. Definite selection is expected to be made by the board in a meeting Thursday night.

Grass Fire Burns Off 100-150 Acres

A raging grass fire burned off an estimated 100 to 150 acres of grassland northeast of Bronte Monday. The blaze started from a trash fire north of the home of Jacob Bruce Morrow and was quickly spread to the north by a south wind.

The fire, after passing across the Morrow property, jumped across to a field belonging to L. T. Youngblood and burned off a large area which had been sowed in sorghum alnum grass.

Bronte's volunteer fire department was called to the scene and with the aid of a large number of helpers finally brought the blaze under control some 1½ hours after it started.

No buildings were caught in the path of the fire. However, fire department officers said some damage was done to fence posts.

Plans Made to Have Anti-Rabies Campaign

A state of emergency has been declared because of the rabies situation in Coke County and compulsory vaccination of all dogs and cats has been ordered.

Following a public discussion at the court house Monday, the Coke County Commissioners Court entered an order calling for the drastic action to combat the

spread of rabies. Dr. J. D. McDaniel of Robert Lee was named county health officer and recommended the program. On hand to advise local officials and explain the law was Dr. George A. Martin of the Texas Department of Health.

In addition to the vaccination of dogs and cats, a program of poisoning fox, skunks and other varmints will be launched in the near future.

All costs of the program will be paid from county funds. Dogs and cats will be vaccinated free. Dates for vaccinating have been set for various places in the county. Read the details in the official notice published on another page in this newspaper.

Since vaccination of dogs and cats is mandatory, the animals are to be kept in quarantine for a period of 30 days, during which time strays will be picked up and will be disposed of if not claimed within a 5-day waiting period.

At the time of vaccination dogs and cats will be registered and the record kept in the county agent's office. The present state of emergency is for a period of one year, and vaccinations will be given again next year. Dogs having been vaccinated longer than a month ago, should be treated again. It will increase their immunity and will make the vaccination period even throughout the county.

Carl Baker, district representative of the State Predatory Animal Control Service, attended the meeting. His department will supervise preparing poison bait to be made available without cost to farmers and ranchers in a drive to kill off the over population of varmints. The poisoning program will be entirely voluntary, and no poison will be put out in the towns.

Robert Lee city officials have joined with the Commissioners Court in urging all citizens to cooperate in the rabies control program.

Dr. Martin, a veterinarian is well acquainted with the rabies situation over the state and reported on what steps had been taken in other localities.

He discussed the mandatory dog vaccination program and pointed out that it was also necessary to make a drive on fox, skunks and other varmints which are carriers or rabies.

Since the vaccinations will be given FREE of charge, it is requested that persons bringing in animals help hold them while the inoculations are being administered.





An estimated 2500 rabbits were killed Tuesday when the annual Maverick Rabbit Drive was held. Approximately 125 hunters participated in the shoot.


A barbecue dinner was served at the noon hour in the old Maverick school house.

Because of the continuing spread of Rabies, and upon recommendation of the County Health Officer and by authority of the Texas State Law, it is hereby declared that a

State of Emergency Exists

In and For Coke County, Texas

State Health Commissioner

We are concerned over the high incidence of rabies that occurs in Texas from year to year, causing anxiety among the citizens of our State, not to mention the deaths that occur and the expense involved in anti-rabies treatments.

The 54th Legislature at its Regular session in 1955 passed a rabies control law (Article 2372m, Texas Civil Statutes.) The law gives the commissioners court the authority to declare the area of their county lying outside the boundaries of incorporated cities and towns to be subject to a rabies epidemic of the dog population thereof. Upon such order being duly entered finding the existence of such epidemic is a menace to the health and safety of the people of such area of the county, the commissioners court is further authorized to promulgate and establish regulations to control all dogs in such area.

We recognize any increase in diagnosed rabies cases in animals over the median of the past five years as representing a rabies epidemic. The local health officer has the responsibility of outlining and directing the anti-rabies program. Recommended programs would include:

1. Stray dog elimination by proper administration through an appointed dog warden who shall pick up and impound stray dogs.
2. Requirement that dogs be vaccinated and registered.
3. Quarantine of dogs in a procedure which would allow adequate time for immunity to develop in vaccinated dogs, reduce exposure risks and facilitate stray dog pickup. A 30 day quarantine should be the minimum for areas of high rabies incidence.
5. Where wildlife rabies exists as a danger, proper procedures in the reduction of the infected species involved should be initiated.

Compulsory anti-rabies vaccination and registration is hereby ordered for all dogs and cats at county expense. In addition a voluntary program to eradicate fox, skunks and other varmints is being set up.

later, with the hours set from 9 to 11 a.m. and 2 to 4 p.m. Owners will be expected to help hold their animals during inoculation.

30 DAY QUARANTINE PERIOD

After an animal has received anti-rabies treatment, it must be kept up and in quarantine for a period of 30 days. Each animal vaccinated will be

registered and get a metal tag. Records will be kept in the County Agent's office.

STRAY DOGS AND CATS

During the quarantine period stray dogs and cats will be picked up by parties with delegated authority. Af-

ter a period of 5 days these animals without vaccination tags will be disposed of in a humane manner.

VARMINT POISONING PROGRAM

As a means of stopping the spread of Rabies, a program of poisoning varmints is being arranged. Poisoned bait will be furnished FREE. This program is designed only for use on farms and ranches and will not be permitted in the towns. It will be optional with the land owners or opera-

tors. Poisoned bait will be prepared under supervision of the State Predatory Animal Control Service, and dates when it will be available are to be announced later. Farmers and ranchers must get the bait at a designated time and place and spread it themselves.

This action was taken following a public hearing and a resolution duly passed on Monday, March 9, 1959.


