Good rain showers swept across the Bronte area Tuesday night. A cold front came into the vicinity. north and east of this vicinity, but bringing some violent weather the rain here was not accompanied by any violence.

Up to 1.2 inches fell southwest of Bronte on the C. E. Arrott ranch. Three-quarters of an inch was reported in the city limits of Bronte. To the north, F. S. Higginbotham reported a half inch. Clifford Clark, who lives east of here, said he had .98. The Tennyson community received 11/4 to 11/2 inches.

This is the first rain of any size to fall in the Bronte area since last fall. Farmers and ranchers were in better spirits about crop prospects Wednesday morning than they have been for some time.

All old age pensioners and families with less than \$125 monthly income are usually eligible to receive surplus food.


