



> The position which is held by Mrs. Osmo Black, pays \$3200 per year, more than half of which is paid by the state. However, school officials say that if the position is continued the entire salary will have to be paid from local funds.

All teachers in the Bronte School have received notification of the board's intention to renew or terminate their contracts. No answers have been received from teachers as to their intentions to stay or leave.
