Mr. Sheffy immediately began work in naming his committee for the county. Miss Madge Winders, who works in the courthouse, has been named secretary-treasurer for the county group. Committees for each community will be named soon.

The American Legion started its drive for funds for the U. S. O. in its Monday night meeting and it is reporting a nice subscription.

Castro County's quota is \$300 for the national movement to secure funds to establish 360 service units to supply members of the arms forces and defense workers, both men and women, with social club facilities.

WHEAT CARDS ARE FARMERS' BUSINESS "OK"

"If you have a wheat marketing quota card, you are free to dispose of your wheat in any way you wish," E. L. Ivey, chairman of the Castro County AAA committee, pointed out this week.

Under AAA regulations, which went into effect with the approval by wheat growers of marketing quotas in the referendum May 31, wheat producers cannot obtain a marketing card until they have satisfied any claims the AAA might have against their wheat for production on excess acres, the AAA committeeman said.

"Since this is true, then it naturally follows that a producer holding a card on his wheat can sell it, or do whatever he wants to with it," he continued. "This wheat is absolutely clear as far as the AAA is concerned and eligible to move in the regular channels of trade."

Producers who do not clearly understand the operations of the wheat marketing quotas should ask for fuller explanations at the county AAA office, the committeeman declared.

START RECREATION

The young people of the Methodist Church will begin a recreation program for entertainment of youngsters not only of that church but any who will care to attend. The idea is to provide clean, wholesome recreation for young people of Dimmitt. Various games will be provided for the youngsters which will include new and familiar games. The time and dates will be announced next week.

Hoppers Hatching In County, Agent Reports Tuesday

Grasshoppers are hatching in some areas of the county, according to M. U. May, county agent, who reports this information from farmers over the county. At present they are in small areas and are doing no apparent damage, but while they are in small areas is the best time to poison them before they mature and start migrating.

Government poison will be available this year as has been in the past and if the grasshoppers hatch in sufficient numbers to cause damage to crops the poison can be obtained through the county agent.

At the present time there is little poisoning being done and until more demand for poison is made, mixing stations will not be operated, County Agent May said. He further advised that anyone wanting poison for grasshoppers should notify him and when sufficient demand for it is evident, mixing stations would be put into operation. There is sufficient material in storage in Castro County at the present time, and more can be obtained if the outbreak of hoppers should make it necessary.

Selectees Register Tuesday, July 1

All young men in Castro County who have become 21 years of age since last October 17, 1940, are required to register under the National Selective Service Act Tuesday, July 1.

Kenneth Turner, secretary of the board, stated the registration will take place in the selective service room on the third floor of the courthouse. There have been several volunteers recently, Mr. Turner stated.

WHEAT TRUCKS BEGIN TO MOVE DESPITE RAINS

Wheat truck began to move from the Castro County Soil Conservation district program has now been completed and will be sent to the State Soil Conservation Board this week, according to Orbin Nowell secretary of the board of supervisors. The board consists of R. A. Axtell, Colin Walton, Ed Wilhelm and Albert Springer. A part of the district program will be given each week in The News in order that people of Castro County will become more familiar with the program of the SCS.

The program was prepared by the farmers themselves and is the only one which was ever started by the farmers and is entirely operated by farmers.

By having the program the service of all governmental agencies will be made available to the district supervisors to carry out a program of soil conservation on individual farms in Castro County, which will probably include soil maps, contour maps, and engineering services.

The purpose of the district as stated in the program prepared by farmers and the board of supervisors reads as follows:

"The farmers have become soil conscious due to the extreme damage caused principally by wind erosion, for the past several years, which has decreased the yields and income for every farmer. They have realized that something must be done to stop this great damage. And, as a result, through cooperation in a district, a system of attack can be made to combat this great hazard.

"The district group of farmers hope to achieve this by having made available to it the services of local, county, state, and federal agencies who can arrange their program to assist the farmers to bring this purpose to a successful conclusion. Through this medium, the farmers of the district expect to making a more stable and profitable agriculture."

County agent M. U. May, has been requested by the supervisors to carry out the educational program for the district and it is through him that these articles will be presented.

PARITY MONEY TOTAL IS HIGH

Total of \$15,975.89 already have been received by Castro County wheat farmers cooperating with the 1941 AAA program, Lowell Sharbut, secretary of the Castro County Agricultural Conservation Association announced.

These payments were received in the county office last Thursday and were the first received in this county under the wheat parity program of the AAA. Payments are made to cooperating farmers at the rate of 10 cents per bushel on the farm's normal yield times the wheat acreage allotment.

Aside from the benefits to the farmers, the program will probably mean new citizens in Castro County and the establishment of district headquarters here.

June 16, 1941, Barracks 270, Chanute Field, Rantoul, Illinois. Dear Mr. Reynolds: I received the 10-page copy of the Castro County News today. At first I thought that the Denver Post had sent me their Sunday issue. I really enjoyed the paper. It keeps me informed about the home folks as well as my buddies who are in other branches of the service. The boys here in the barracks enjoy reading the editorials of national interest which appear in The News.

I only have five more weeks of school here at Chanute Field, and from here I will be sent to Denver, Colorado, to complete my three years of service. I will graduate here July 18.

To you and all the other Legionnaires, "thanks a million" for sending me the paper.

I plan a visit home as soon as I finish here (15 day furlough). Sincerely—John G. Davis, Jr., Pvt. A. C. T. S. (air corps tech school).

More power to you, Buddie. Be sure and come to see us when you get the furlough. That special edition was a hummer! Had you boys read that we are getting an air corps camp at Lubbock? Yea, boy! About 60 to 100 buildings! It will be for advanced classes, and will be some 10 miles west of Lubbock.

Bob Huckabay and Kelton Hickman volunteered last week and have been sent to Jefferson Barracks, Missouri, for air corps mechanical training. Both of these lads have a soldier daddy.

Dear Sirs: I received my third copy of Castro County News today and must say, I have appreciated them very much. I certainly do like to read the column "Better Buddies" too. We all like to hear from the other boys in the service and what they are doing and the advancement they have made. Speaking of advancements, I want to congratulate Corporal Holland on his advancement. (Did it cost you many cigars.)

I have been assigned to the 96th School Squadron scheduled to go to Victoria, Texas, sometime in the near future or as soon as the field is completed. I entered the service on March 7, 1941, in Lubbock, Texas. Was sent to Randolph Field for four weeks, recruit drilling and since that time I have been working in the kitchen. We feed 1,100 men three times a day in one kitchen. At present we are on field rations, but the food is still very good.

We are quartered in tents. My tent has five cots sleeping in it. We have a radio and a few shelves for our pictures and we hang all clothes on hangars or keep them in footlockers.

Well, I don't know anything else that I might write that would interest anyone, so, I remain—One of the Buddies, Private Alex Williams.

Later we learned that Buddie Williams received a promotion to third class specialist. Congratulations—we know you boys can put it out, so like to hear of the advancements.
