Coach, Science Teacher Elected

A head coach and a science teacher for the 1959-60 school year were hired in a meeting of Bronte school board of trustees last week. Bob Howard, who has been head coach at Cisco Junior College the past year, was named to the head coach job, and Doyle Parker, a

senior at Hardin-Simmons University, was elected to the science teaching position. Parker will also serve on the coaching staff.

Howard has been in the coaching business for the past ten years and holds bachelor and master degrees from North Texas State

College at Denton. He coached at Comyn high school two years; Bynum high, one year; Boyd high six years; and Cisco Junior College, one year.

The new coach is married and has four children.

Howard has piled up an impressive record during his coaching career, with 67 wins, 24 losses and 1 tie. He is also a basketball, track and baseball coach. He will also teach history.

Parker, who will receive his degree this spring from Hardin-Simmons, is a physical education major, with a science major. He is married and has one child. Parker will be assigned to a spot on the coaching staff yet to be determined, Hurlin Lee, board president, said. He will do graduate work for the first six weeks of this summer.

Thirteen applicants were interviewed during the meeting when the two men were elected.

Lee pointed out that the high school still lacks an English teacher in order to have its teaching staff complete.

The band director's position and three other vacancies also remain in the elementary school staff.

Rites Held for Cliburine Roland, Gunshot Victim

Funeral services for Cliburine Roland, 25, were held Wednesday afternoon at Blackwell Methodist Church. He was the victim of gunshot wounds and was found about 6 p. m. onday by his brother, Bill Roland, lying near a log close to Oak Creek.

Justice of the Peace G. E. Davis of Sweetwater returned a verdict of death from self-inflicted gunshot wounds. After arriving home from work Monday Mr. Roland picked up his gun and told his mother he was going to shoot some crows. Earlier in the day he had stopped at a Blackwell cafe and told some friends, "I'll see you in the morning."

Roland lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Roland, in their home about 1½ miles west of Blackwell on the R. H. Jordan ranch. He was employed by U. S. Gypsum in their Maryneal plant.

Roland was born Aug. 22, 1933, near Blackwell. He was valedictorian of his graduating class in 1951, and was a veteran of the Korean War. While in high school he lettered in football and basketball.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Jarrell Sharp, pastor of the Blackwell Methodist Church, and burial was in Blackwell cemetery.

He is survived by his parents; four brothers, Bill of Blackwell, Willis of Odessa, Charles and Jack Roland of Abilene; two sisters, Mrs. Patsy Boyd of Abilene and Mrs. Eunice Murry of San Angelo.

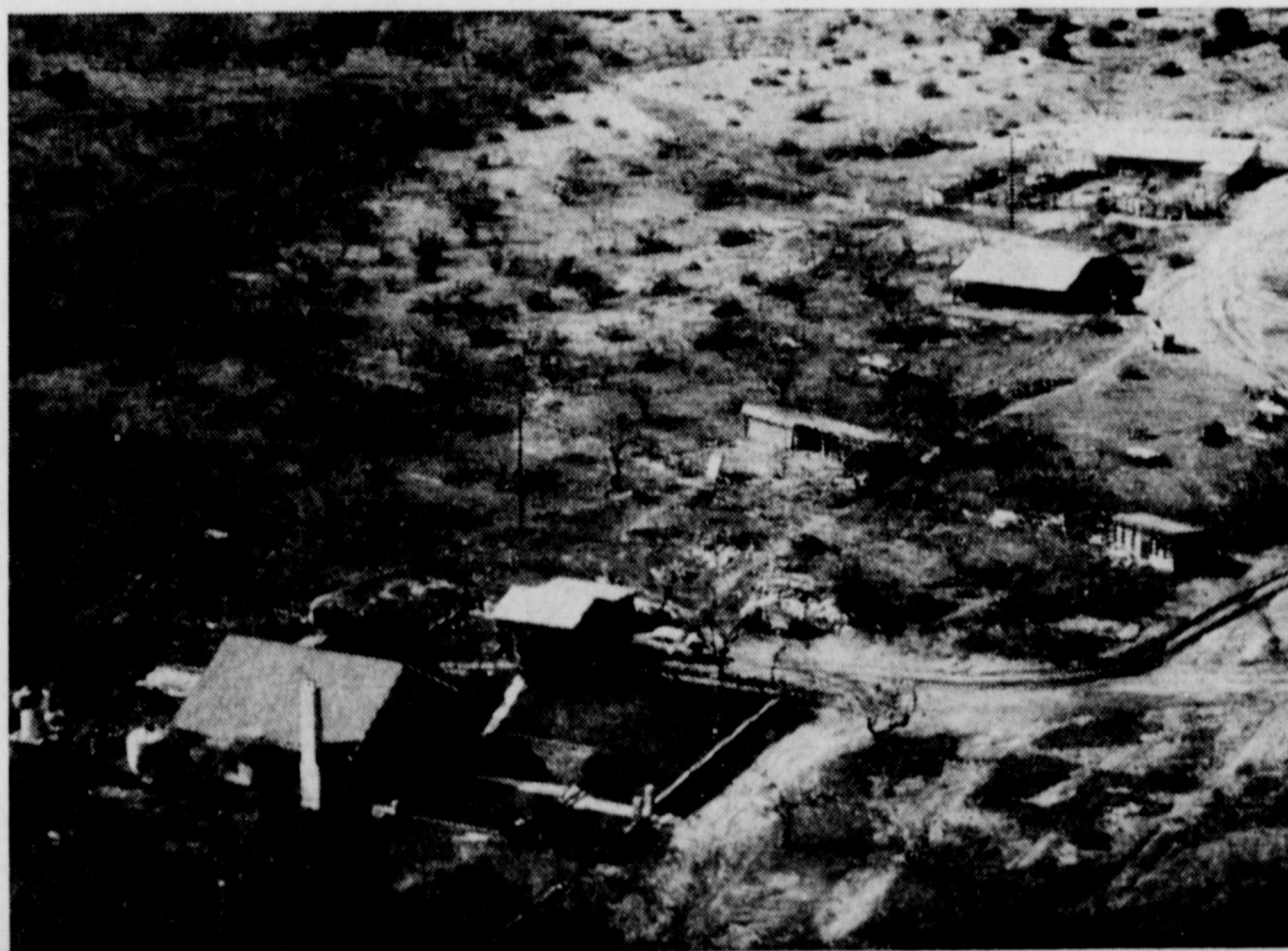

County Agents News Column

The pastures and fields over the County look considerably different, are more moist than they were a month ago, but the moisture situation is far from ideal. Some operators are planting, others are re-planting and waiting for more moisture.

We have checked the soil temperature. Aplanting depth, the temperature is well above 70 degrees. The soil is plenty warm for seed germination, but the moisture is not ample to plant on in many cases.

Four Coke County 4-H club members will journey to College Station on June 9 to participate in the State Judging Contests. Dee Arrott, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Arrott, Tennyson; Eddie Glenn, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. K. Glenn, Bronte; Donald Spiller, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. O. Spiller, Bronte; and Kenneth Wink, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Wink, Sanco, are members of the first place soil judging team in the District.

Some ninety 4-H club members, leaders and parents met at Wojtek's skating rink on Tuesday night of last week for an evening of fun. The spills were numerous, but apparently they were enjoyed.

The United States Department of Agriculture has been for the past few years conducting field studies on controlling screw worms in the Southeastern States. Now they are expanding the study to include several Southwestern States and Mexico. You may have been contacted on the issue or may have heard about it.

Outstanding results have been obtained in the Southeastern States where the blow fly is rather isolated. Sterile male flies were released over the infested areas. Their mating with the native female flies resulted in a majority of the eggs that were produced being infertile. If the process of the blow fly in the Southwest can be controlled, the program will be worth millions of dollars to Southwestern stock men.

It's still not too late to fertilize your lawn. And fertilizer will pay for itself on a lawn with the water saved during the coming months. Two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet of lawn is a suitable application rate.

The pecan nut case bearer will be making its debut in the near future, and may have in a few cases already. All indications now point to the period from May 25 to June 1 as being the most suitable during which to spray to control the casebearer. However, each yard or each bottom must be checked to find the exact time to spray. Get your sprayer in good working order then check daily for the case bearer eggs on the blossom end of the nuts. If you find several eggs in a tree and a few larvae hatched out, spray your tree. Spraying your tree too early or after the larvae is nearing maturity will be of little or no value.
