Legislature to Act in Formation Of Kickapoo Water District

School Employees Hired by Board

In a recent meeting of the local school board of trustees, school employees were hired for the 1959-60 school year.

Bus drivers re-hired were T. G. Gleghorn, Mrs. Pete Gentry, Mrs. Jack Corley, Mrs. Ethel Cole and Mrs. T. E. Tidwell.

Lunchroom employees hired for another year included Mrs. Mary Walker, Mrs. T. G. Gleghorn, Mrs. R. W. Sims and Mrs. George Braswell.

Only two school custodians were hired for next year. They are Marvin Corley and Clayburn Webb.

Supt.-elect C. B. Barbee will be in Bronte Saturday and the school board will meet to interview applicants for teacher vacancies. Still to be elected in the grade school are the principal, and first, third and fifth grade teachers.

Vacancies in the high school include English and science teachers and band director. High School Principal Joe B. Simpson has signed his contract and will retain his position during the coming school term.

Harlin Lee, board president, said this week that the new superintendent would like to meet as many local residents as possible during his visit here Saturday. He invited local school patrons to come in and meet Mr. Barbee.

Lee also reported that much work has been done toward remodeling the vocational agriculture classroom and shop. The PTA gave the ag department \$700 for materials and the boys are doing the work. J. T. Henry is the agriculture teacher. Both the classroom and workshop are being completely re-done. The job will be completed during the summer vacation months.

A report on latest developments in the formation of a water district in this area indicate that the district may become a reality within the next few days.

County Attorney Frank Dickey and Precinct 1 Commissioner Fern Havins, both of Robert Lee, went to Austin last weekend and were assured by Rep. A. J. Bishop that he could get a bill through the special session of the legislature to create the district.

A steering committee, headed by F. S. Higginbotham, worked Saturday night and Sunday with Dickey getting the metes and bounds of the proposed district and other data together to send to Bishop.

The district was refused by Coke County commissioners recently after the county attorney advised them that the procedure being used to form the district was illegal.

If the district is approved by the legislature, an election will be called to have it okayed by the people residing in it. The election will also put the proposition of giving the district taxing powers.

Dr. Dean Adams Expects to Leave For Duty in Navy

Dr. Dean Adams said last Friday that he has received information that he will be called to active duty in the U. S. Navy some time this summer. He said he did not know the exact date of the call but that it would be some time between July 1 and September 1.

Dr. Adams has been in the Naval Reserve for several years, but has not served on active duty. He is a graduate of the University of Texas School of Medicine and has been associated with Dr. John R. Harris at the Bronte Hospital since July 1957.

Dr. and Mrs. Adams live in the south part of Bronte. They have a little daughter, Kim, who is nearly 2 years old.

Dr. Adams is offering his home for sale. He said he would probably be in the Navy either four or six years and will probably be stationed at the Naval Air Station at Pensacola, Florida.

Five local boys, Victor Ivey, Rex Harris, Greg Whalen, Rudy Phillips and Tommy Glenn Sims, have said they would play on a Pony League team.

The team will need \$25 to get in the Ballinger League and will need a little more money to take care of other incidentals. Persons who wish to contribute to the league should see one of the boys or either Ivey or Thomas.

The first game to be played by the new team will be in Ballinger on Thursday night, May 4.

Auto Wrecks Plague Area

A rash of automobile accident have plagued this area during the past few days. One woman was killed in a one-car wreck in Blackwell and two persons were injured in a two-car collision south of Bronte.

Mrs. Bruce O. Gibson, 45, of Turkey was killed early Sunday morning when the car in which she was riding with her husband skidded out of control and crashed into utilities poles. Mrs. Gibson was taken to a Sweetwater hospital but was dead upon arrival.

No one was hurt here in Bronte Saturday evening when the automobile of Billy Charles Wrinkle and a pickup driven by Louis Buckalew were in a collision on East Main street, now being used

as a detour for U. S. Highway 277. A charge of speeding was filed against Wrinkle and a charge of making an improper left turn was filed against Buckalew in Justice Court.

Mr. and Mrs. Homer Cornelius were hospitalized here Tuesday evening after their car was in a collision with an auto driven by Jack Harold Brice of Abilene. No charges had been filed in the case at press time Wednesday. Investigating patrolmen said that apparently the Cornelius car pulled out into the highway in front of the Brice car. The accident occurred four miles south of Bronte on Highway 277. Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius suffered head injuries and bruises, but their conditions was reported as good Wednesday.

Mrs. James Allen of Bronte was hospitalized in San Angelo Tuesday evening after her car was in a collision with a truck driven by Lester Vest of San Angelo. The accident occurred at the intersection of Highway 277 and the old Ballinger highway, running east out of San Angelo. A highway patrolman told The Enterprise that a charge of failure to yield right-of-way to a through highway had been filed against Vest. Mrs. Allen suffered a possible cerebral concussion and was under observation Tuesday night.

Jean Moore was the high ranking junior with a 92, while Reyes Olivas was high ranking junior boy with 90.

Carol Ann Sherrod, with a 92.88 and Kenneth Shaver with 89, topped the sophomore class. Gwen Kirkland's 87.75 and Bobby Allen's 85.25 was high for the freshmen.

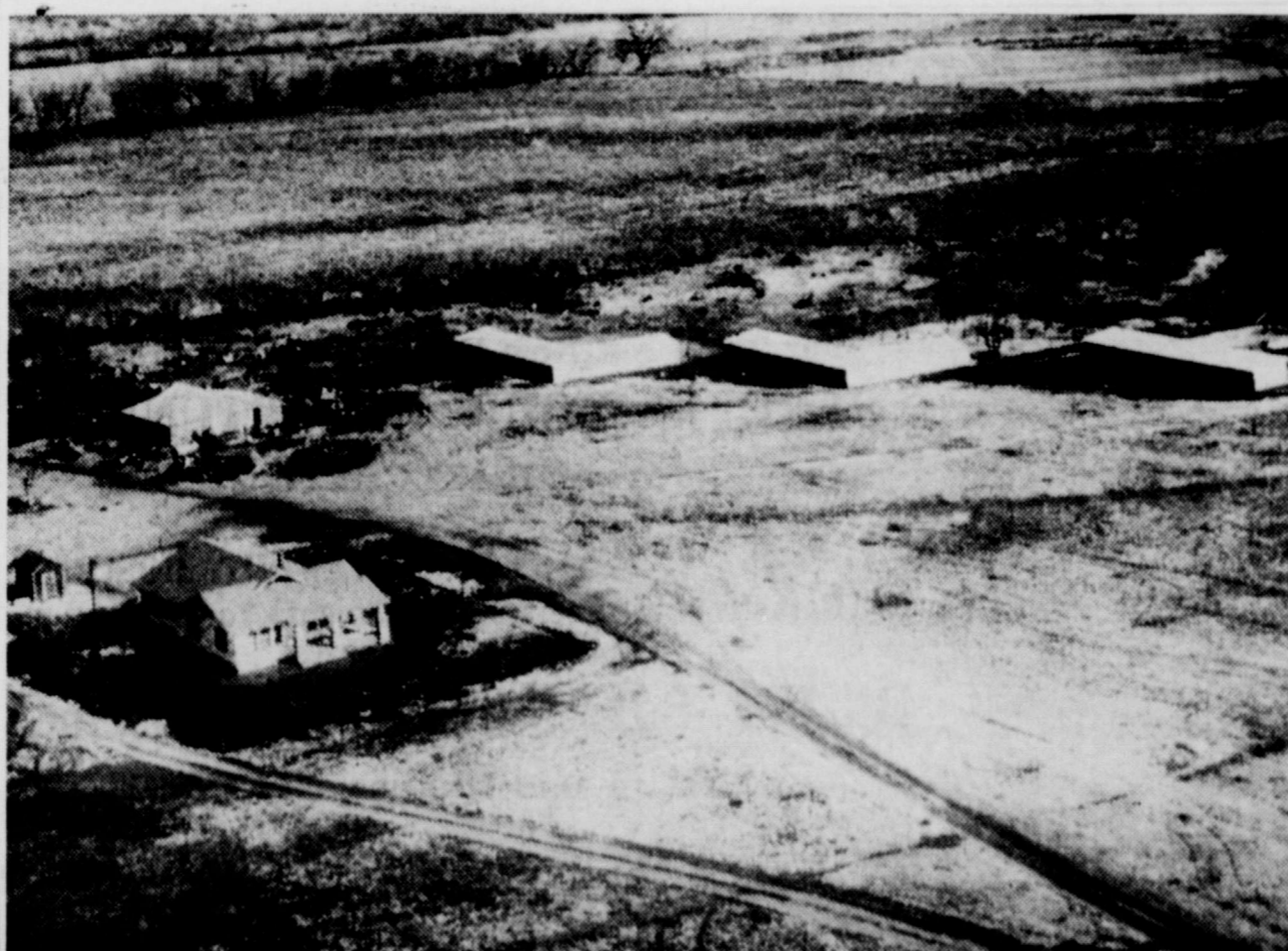
Frances Johnson Joins WACS

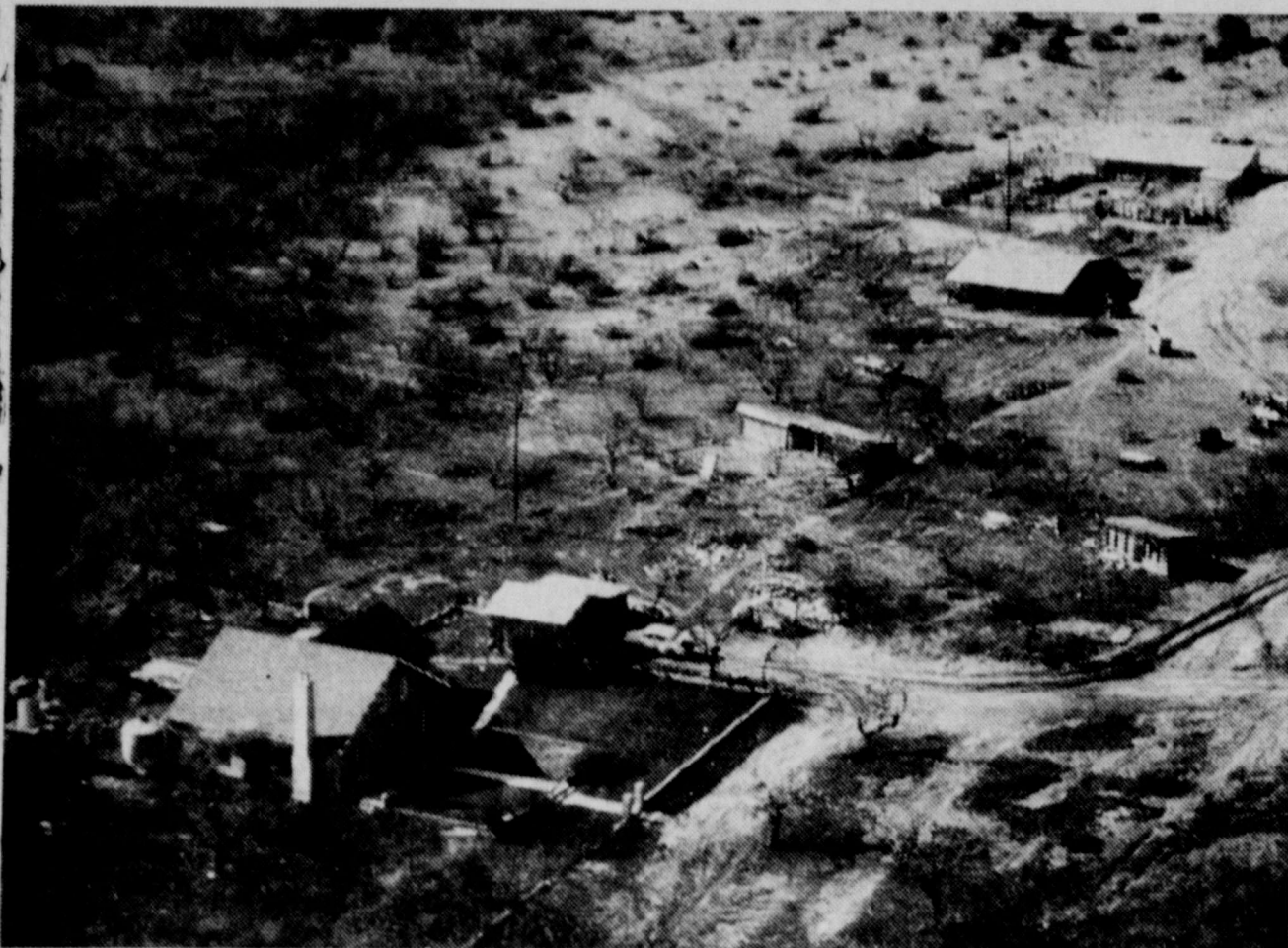

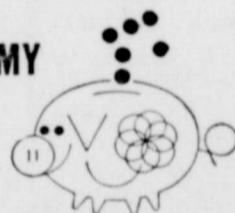

County Agents News Column

The pecan nut casebearer has made its appearance in a haphazard pattern. Some trees in Robert Lee had a heavy infestation of eggs, others had only a few. The same condition existed in the Bronte area on trees checked. Also, the eggs hatched into larva, or grubs, in the same pattern. As early as Monday larvae were found feeding in the second nut while on other trees, the first eggs had not hatched.

If you still have not sprayed, or if you sprayed one day last week, spraying would be in order. Make sure you use ample spray pressure to wet the nutlet cluster thoroughly. Fogging a tree will wet the tree, but will not penetrate effectively to the cluster where the casebearer does his feeding.
